FOR SCHOOL OPENING

CHUGIAK: E.C. Smith, Superintendent of Chugiak Schools, announced today double shifts would be held this fall until the completion of the school at Eagle River.

Smith said that the shifts would be divided according to the residence of the students, with the children from Eagle River attending the afternoon session and those from the rest of Chugiak attendinging the morning.

Smith explained that this would cause the least ammount of disruption when the Eagle River children were transferred upon the completion of that school. It would also be the most satisfactory arrangement with respect to bus transportation.

The exact division of the two areas has not yet been determined, Smith said, however the township line at mile 15 would be considered arbitrarily, but the actual balance of population would be the final deciding factor.

In order to abtain information which would determine which students would be assigned to either group; a pre-registration would be held late in August, at a date to be announced.

Smith stated that students would attend the school in their own area, and there would be no shifting of students from one area to the other to balance out classes as was at one time considered.

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SCHOOL IMPACT FUNDS EXPIRED

WASHINGTON DC: Congressman Ralph J. Rivers (D Alaska) has introduced a bill to extend for three years the temporary provisions of the Federally impacted school area laws. These laws, commonly referred to as P.L. 815 and P.L. 874, embody a long-standing program of federal contributtibutions . to public schools but which expired on July 1st of this year.

Members of congress have looked to the General Federal Aid to Education bill now hefore congress to extend impacted area funds provisions. It is now apparent that unless there is a breaking of the existing deadlock in regard to the general bill separate legislation must be enacted at this session to accomplish that purpose.

In commenting upon his bill, Rivers stated, "with many children from the military bases and other Federal installations receiving public schooling in Alaska, the State and its impacted school districts have been recipients of such Federal contributions for an aggregate of over \$7 million per year.

The same is true in a greater or less degree of 318 of the

nations 437 congressional districts.

With impacted schools throughout the country having already budgeted for the coming school year in reliance upon the extension of P. 815 and P. 847, a critical situation is impending.

Lest the deadlock on the main bill not be broken and the bill enacted, I have introduced a simple measure to extend PL 815 and PL 874.


Several of my colleagues have done likewise. With the impact money at stake, pressures are building up which result in one solution or the other, and my bill is designed to add to the pressure.'

GOVERNOR PROTESTS CHANGE IN POTATO SPECS.

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan today protested a recent change in military specifications for Alaska potato procurement and asked that it be reconsidered.

In a telegram to J.J. Weiss, of the Military Subsistence Agency's Purchasing Division in Chicago, the Governor said the change in specifications "will increase cost to the military and work an unnected (next col.)

(potatoes)

essary hardship on Alaska grow ers who have satisfactorily supplied the military with quality potatoes for the past 20 years."

Egan said the decision of the military also "represents a threat to other Alaska growers of agricultural products working hard to expand the State's agricultural productivity", he added. "In view of the long record

"In view of the long record of Alaskans in supplying military with quality products at competitive primes, I see no reason for discrimination shown in the recent change of specifications. I sincerely hope the decision will be reversed for bidding on September-October requirements."

The specification change involves an additional requirement that potatoes must be of "moderately skinned or better" quality. Alaska potatoes have tender skins when newly harvested, and would hine it difficult to meet the added apecification.


