SHOPPING IN CHUGIAK



Anyone who has ever had the urge to create beauty with pencil or brush, may now realize this ambition through a series of lessons being offered by one of Chugiak's most accomplished artists.

Joseph Turgeon, who has his art studio near his home off Jayhawk drive in Birchwood, is holding art lessons in three separate categories; basic drawing, basic drawing and water color and oil painting.

Each course consists of ten weeks of one night a week. Each session lasts two hours.

Mr. Turgeon said that his students need not have had any previous experience, nor do they need feel that any degree of talent is required. All that is necessary is that the student enjoy painting or drawing.

The classes have not yet begun, as a minimum of ten students is required before classes will start.

This brings the final total of funds raised to \$300.

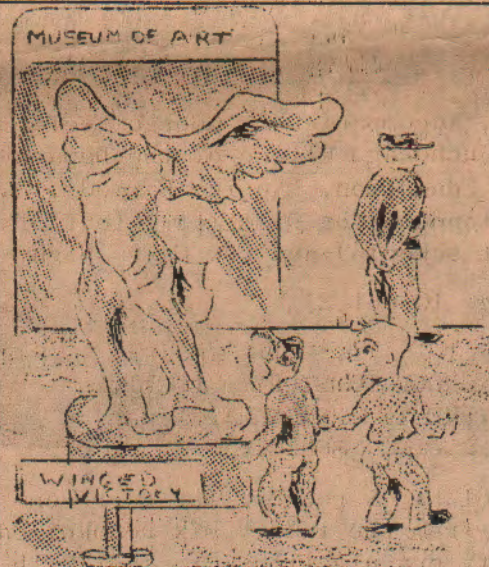
All events which were conducted by the youth in this community, included other dances, bake sale and car wash.

COOK FOR SEPTEMBER

Here is a company dish that can be thrown together quickly after a day at the office. This should be popular with working mothers.

CURRIED SHRIMP
(or Veal or Lamb)

- 1/3 cup butter
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. curry powder
- Dash chili powder
- Dash pepper
- Dash saffron (optional)
- Dash "Accent"
- 2 cups sour cream
- 2 tsp lemon juice
- 4 cups cooked shrimp
(2 1/2# shrimp, veal, lamb etc.)
- 1/8 tsp ginger (optional)

SAUTE onion in melted butter until soft
ADD garlic & seasonings
SAUTE two minutes, stirring constantly
ADD sour cream, lemon juice and ginger

ADD shrimp and heat
SERVE over brown rice

BODENBURG CREEK CLOSED

PALMER: The adoption of an emergency regulation closing Bodenbug Creek, tributary to Palmer Creek, mile 42, Glenn Highway, to salmon sport fishing has been announced by C.L. Anderson Commissioner, Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

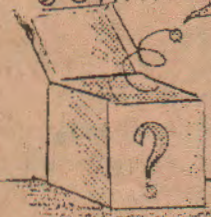
Bodenburg Creek is a shallow, clear stream that parallels the Glenn Highway for a short distance. Hage highway travelers have a rare opportunity to witness red salmon spawning without leaving the paved road.

Though only a few salmon utilize the area, this creek has a high esthetic value.

"It has been necessary to close this area to salmon fishing to prevent undue mol-estation of the spawning salmon", Alex H. McRea, Director, Sport Fish Division stated.

HINT: When making jam or jelly, drop a small piece of parafine on top of the hot preparation just after it has been poured into the jars. The heat of the mixture will melt the wax and allow it to spread effectively sealing the jar, and eliminating the dangerous of melting the wax over a burner.

"I would not want to make any recommendation to the people of the community until I had given the matter considerable study.



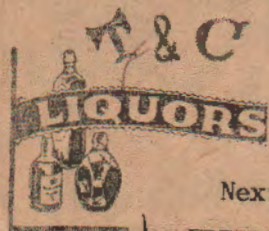
I would like to suggest that all the residents of Chugiak study the matter also. However, I do not feel that any action of a definite nature should be taken until after the meeting of the next legislature."

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

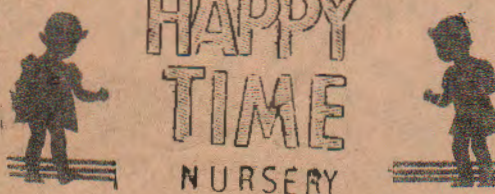

FLAG PRESENTED TO NAVAL VESSEL

JUNEAU: Alaska's flag soon will flutter in the breeze from the quarterdeck of the U.S.S. MOUNT MCKINLEY as the vessel deploys through Mediterranean waters.

The emblem was donated to the vessel by Governor William A Egan after a crew member, Richard Hogan, wrote the governor that despite the vessel's being named for a famed Alaska peak, it had no flag to otherwise denote association with the 49th State.

In a letter to Captain H. C. Lauerman, commanding officer of the MOUNT MCKINLEY, Egan declared:

"Just as the MOUNT MCKINLEY bears the name of the tallest mountain on the North American continent, we in Alaska feel strongly that our attainment of Statehood represents a high point in this Nation's effort to demonstrate its continued faithfulness to the principles of self-government upon which it was founded. "As such, the presence of the Alaska flag on the quarter-deck of the MOUNT MCKINLEY as it deploys through the waters of the Mediterranean and elsewhere, will symbolize our Nation's firm determination to protect and encourage freedom among all mankind."

Captain Lauerman said the Alaska emblem will be displayed on the quarterdeck beside the national ensign.

FREE GROUND SCHOOL CLASSES OFFERED

CHUGIAK: Free classes in aeronautical Ground School are being offered here to any persons, who are interested.

Joe Phillips, who is a junior high teacher of social studies at the Chugiak School, is also a licensed FAA ground school instructor, and is offering to teach a ground school here at no charge if enough interested students will sign up.

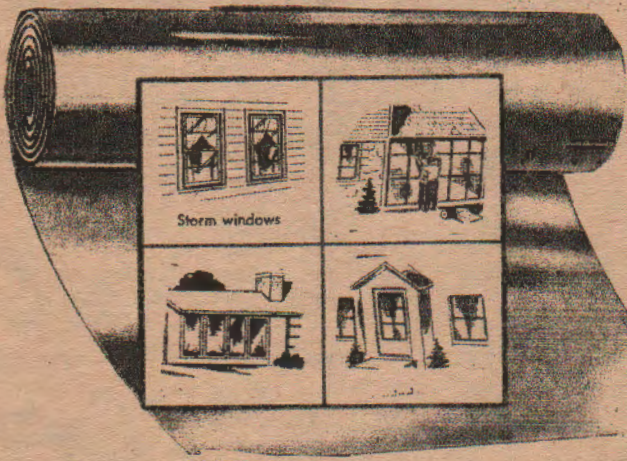

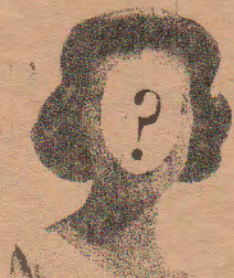

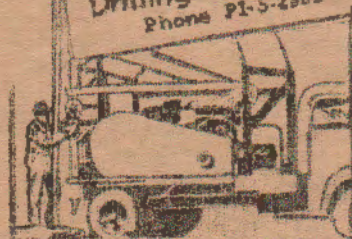

Henriches to organize a group to study the problems involved in providing adequate fall-out shelters for the two Chugiak schools.

Mrs. Long requested that the organizations each send a representative to form a group similar to OCHS for the purpose of making the study.

She explained the situation which would result in the event of a nuclear attack, whereupon all roads in the area would be closed to all but military traffic, making it out of the question for parents to get their children from school, or for buses to take the children home.

"If our children are to survive we must provide them with adequate shelter" Mrs. Long said. "While the lower levels of the school would provide some shelter, it would not be enough to protect them from a lethal dose of radiation."

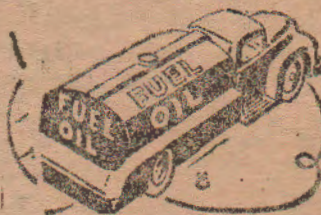

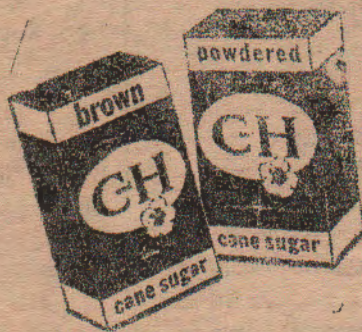
