:OCAL ATTRACTION

A local attraction is being publicized as a tourist spot in news releases which the Alaska State Division of Tourism is sending to papers in the South 48.

The release reads as follows:

"A unique cemetery and one of the oldest churches in Alaska --possibly dating hack to 1794, when Ezarist Russia sent its first missionary priests to America-provide an unmatched travel experience for visitors to the 49th State.

The Church is located at Eklutna Indian village, and is of the Russian Orthodox faith.

Altho the building is open for visitors, services are no longer held in the ancient log structure, but are held instead at a newer frame building which is also available for visitor inspection.

Most attention-getting feature at the village, however is neither of the church es but the cemetery there.

Row after row of graves-each covered by a little structure about the size of a large doll house-gives the burial place an appearance like no other in the world.

The covering of the graves with houses is a pre-Christian Indian custom.

Following the conversion of the Indians at Eklutna, the practice of placing the houses over the graves continued, but the houses themselves were each adorned with the three-barred cross of the Russian Orthodox Church, thus giving the appearance of tiny chruches.

The Eklutha village is Iocated between the cities of Anchorage and Palmer and is (Eklutna)

included in several bus tours out of Anchorage into Alaska's Matanuska Valley.



I have two small seasonal businesses, but neigher one of them has a net profit of more than \$300 - \$350. Can't I receive some credit for this work?

ANSWER: Yes, you can. Selfemployed people with mort than one business or trade during the year should combine the net profits (or losses) from all of the business activities that are covered by social security.

If the total net profit is \$400 or more, it counts for social security.

QUESTION: Do the recent changes in social security have anything to do with hospital care?

NNSWER: No, Hospital or medical care benefits under social security are not a part of these changes.

CARIBOU HUNTERS ENJOYING
HIGH SUCCESS IN DENALI
AREA

DENALI: The Denali Highway, leading to McKinley Park is currently providing the best caribou hunting for residents of the South Cantral and Interior portions of the State, the Department of Fish and Game advised today.

By September 10, at midnight 2,849 hunters had taken 1,703 daribou in that area, far more than had heen taken near either the Steese or Taylor Highways or from the Lake Louise area.

Moose hunting was reported to be excellent in all areas, including the Ligingood Road and the Steese Highway out of Fairbanks, the Taylor Highway out of Tok Junction, and the Kenai, Natanuska Valley, Denali and other areas accessible by road, as well as remoter regions accessible only hy airplane.

The Department maintains hunter checking stations in several areas, through which are obtained figures on total harvest, hunter success ratios and other information needed for proper mamagement of the States game population.

Department hiologists are requesting that successful hunters, whenever possible, turn in the lower jaws of all hig game taken, either at the checking stations, or

at Department offices.

The jaws are used to determine the ages of animals taken; this information, compared over a period of years, provides a clue to population trends and herd conditions.


