Troopers Assigned To Chugiak

CHUGIAK: Two State Troopers have been assigned to cover the Chugiak area, and will spend almost all of their time patrolling in this community.

This was announced by Lieut. E.L. Mayfield of the Anchorage office of the State Police.

Lieut. Mayfield, along with Martin B. Underwood, commissioner of the Department of Public Safety made this information known in an exclusive interview to the Knik Arm Courier.

CHILDREN?

The recent Civil Defense meet-
ing has brought home a spine
chilling fact that most of us
had not considered.

As one lady put it, "...I
had never given any thought
that our family might be sep-
arated during such a catas-
trophly. I could somehow face
the fact of trying to survive
if we were all together, but
the thought that my children
might be at school, and I
would not be able to go to
them frightens me beyond all
measure. I don't think that
I could stand being cooped
up in a fallout shelter not
knowing if my children were
dead or alive."

Yet, we must face the fact
that should a nuclear attack
come during school hours, we
would not be able to go to our
children. All we can do is
see to it that there is an
adequate shelter at the sch-
ool for the children and their
teachers to go to in the event
of such an attack.

This will require a commu-
nity wide effort, and one which
cannot be disregarded. This
is the first thing which the
local Civil Defense team must
do.

All other activities come
after we have crawled out of
our shelters and the clean-up
begins. When the bomb drops
it is every man for himself,
but what of our children?

To them we owe the debt of
survival and the chance to
come out of an attack alive.

If there is no one left al-
ive after the fallout period
there is no need for the
trained Civil Defense team.

Let us think first of our
children, if they are alive
after the attack then there
will always be someone to
keep our civilization going.

CHOCOLATE PUDDING

1/2 - 3/4 cup sugar
6 tbs flour
DASH salt

COMBINE and place in top part of double boiler over boiling water

ADD 3 cups milk gradually
ADD 3 squares unmelted chocolate

ALLOW chocolate to melt then BEAT with egg beater until blended

COOK stirring, until thick CONTINUE cooking for ten minutes stirring occasionally
ADD 1 tsp vanilla

(Nuts and/or raisins may be added)

POUR into serving dishes and allow to cool.

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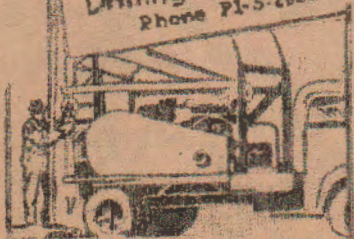

FALLOUT SHELTER SURVEY PLANNED

JUNEAU: Gov. William A. Egan announced today plans for the State Office of Civil Defense and other State agencies to cooperate with the Alaska District, Corps of Engineers, U.S. Army in a fallout shelter survey in Alaska.

The program is an outgrowth of the recent decision by President Kennedy to assign Federal responsibility for the Civil Defense program to the Department of Defense.

(Fallout shelter survey)

Directed by Colel Christian Hanburger, Alaska District Engineer, through the District's civil works program, the survey will determine the suitability of existing structures, both public and private, to serve as shelter space.

Selected architectural engineering firms will perform the actual evaluation and marking of acceptable structures.

Urging that all Alaskans recognize the survey as in the best interests of themselves and their neighbors, Gov. Egan gave the program his full endorsement.

"On the success of this program may hinge your life or that of a loved one," he said. "And it cannot be successful without the full cooperation of each of us."

Egan said he was advised that an initial orientation meeting with representatives of Federal and State agencies and municipalities will be held in the Alaska District Engineers office in Anchorage on September 13th.

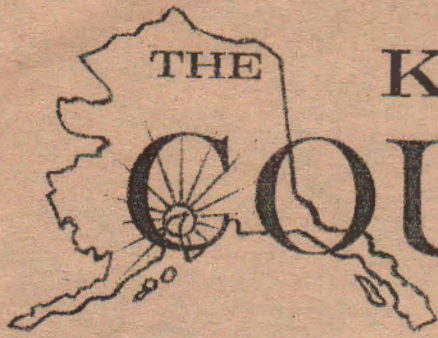

would get no help from the rest of the United States. "We are considered expendable", he said.

Disney went on to describe what would be required for survival in this area.

Fallout shelters would provide adequate protection in Chugiak he said, this area is relatively protected; more so even than Palmer making evacuation useless.

Each family should have on hand not less than two weeks supply of food water and fuel for heating.

He stressed that of major concern was providing some fallout protection at our schools, as should the bomb fall, the children and teachers would not be able to return to their homes.

Chugiak CD Director Ray Henriches is calling for volunteers to investigate the matter of school shelters.

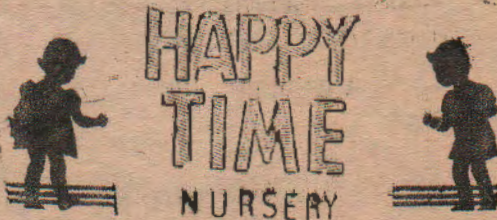

It was learned that contrary to popular belief, fourth class city status would not entitle an area to representation on the borough assembly. Only first class cities are entitled to that representation.

It was also learned that as a fourth class city an area did not assume financial responsibility for schools and road maintenance, but under 3rd, 2nd or 1st class status they would.

The group was informed that the obligations and requirements for 3rd and 2nd class cities were the same as for a 1st class one, with the exception that an area must have a minimum of 400 permanent inhabitants to qualify for first class status.

Should there be a move to incorporate in any of the above classes, a petition must be circulated and a representative number of signatures obtained (next col.)

Following this a hearing would be scheduled and then an election held in the area, with over 50% of the votes in favor required to approve it.

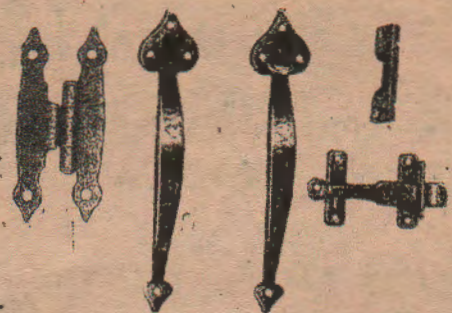

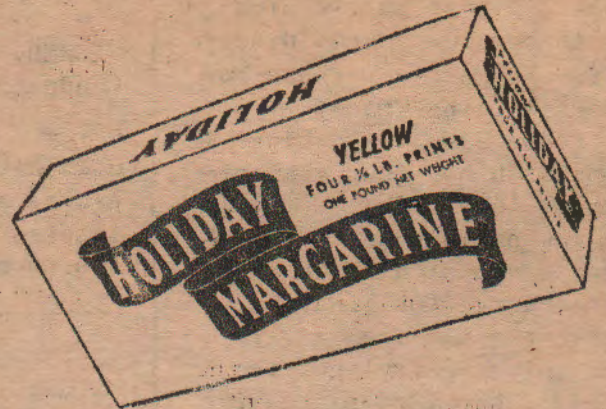
