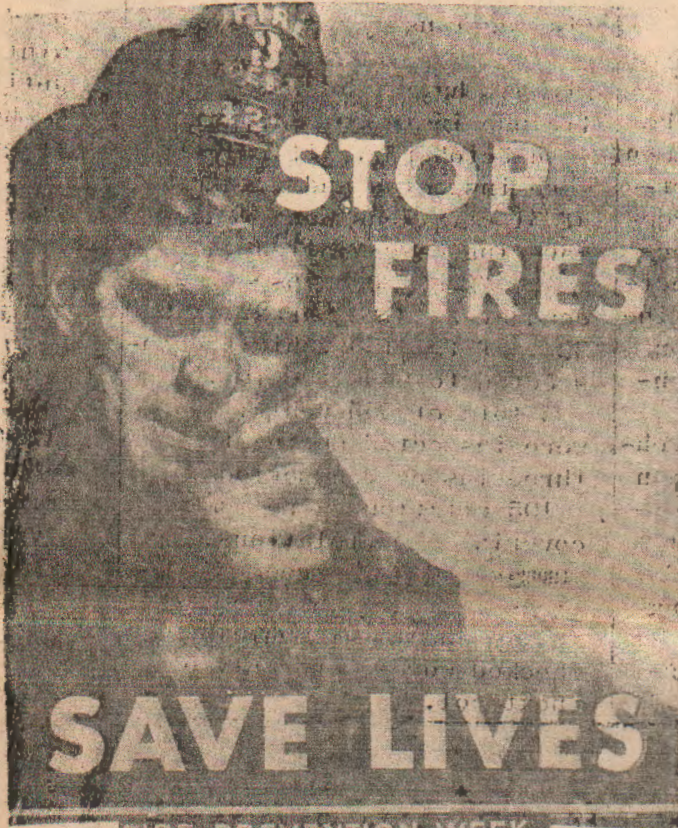
EAGLE RIVER SISTERS IN WRECK

EAGLE RIVER: Max Clement, manager of the Katanuska Telephone Association, announced today that the local office will open on November 1st.

This will be a joint office, shared by both the MTA and the Katanuska Electric Association.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

EAGLE RIVER: A collision between a motorcycle and an automobile at mile 13 on the Glenn Highway Monday afternoon sent one teen-aged sister to Providence Hospital with a broken leg, Rowena K. Burns, age 16, driver of the motorcycle escaped with only bruises, while her sister, Francks K. Burns, age 14 suffered a probable fracture of the right thigh.

The girls had been proceeding south on the Glen Highway when a car driven by Don Merrill of Birchwood pulled out of a driveway into their path.

Dr. Marshall Simpson of Eagle River was summoned and administered emergency treatment and the girls were then taken to Providence Hospital by the ambulance belonging to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

The State Trooper at the scene stated that he felt that the quick thinking and skill exercised by the girl driving the motorcycle kept both sisters from receiving more serious injuries.

He said that apparently when she saw that the crash was inevitable she laid the motorcycle over on its side and slid into the car, rather than striking it head on, which could have resulted in both girls in being catapulted over the car and possibly being killed.

Both girls are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Burns of Coronado Drive in Eagle River. Their father operates the Harley Davidson Motorcycle Sales Shop at that location.

Merrill was cited for failure to yield right of way.

ARCHITECT SHOWS PLANS FOR CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL

CHUGIAK: Wayne Hull, chairman of the Chugiak Advisory School Board stated that he has been shown a set of plans which are being considered for the construction of Chugiak High School.

A team of engineers and architects from the Department of Public Works have been in the area conducting a survey of the land which the Advisory School Board had recommended for a high school site.

Hull said that the plans which were shown to her were for a building which would house 400 students with a maximum of 700. It would be for grades 7 through 12 and included; 12 classrooms, 2 science rooms (one general and one physical) 2 business rooms (typing and business machines) 1 home economics room, 1 industrial arts room, 1 arts and crafts (cont page 7 col 2)

RESULTS OF PASSENGER
VEHICLE INSPECTIONS

ANCHORAGE: On October 3 and 4, 1962, the Alaska Department of Public Safety and Department of Commerce jointly conducted the two more announced passenger vehicle inspections at the motor vehicle inspection station located on the Glenn Highway near Anchorage.

On October 3, 1962, 94 vehicles were inspected between 1pm and 3:30pm by State Police and Commerce personnel.

26 Citations were issued covering violations ranging from defective brakes and steering mechanism to operating a vehicle (next col.)

(inspections)

without having an operators license in possession.

On October 4, 111 vehicles were inspected and a total of 31 citations were issued covering 66 violations.

The first such inspection conducted September 27, found 32% of the 150 vehicles inspected to be defective.

A total of 355 vehicles were inspected during the three inspection periods.

105 citations were issued covering 173 violations. A summary of the three inspections indicate an excess of 28% of the total vehicles checked were improperly equipped (next col.)

ipped or maintained. It is planned that the two departments will continue to conduct similar unannounced vehicle inspections at this as well as other locations in the area.

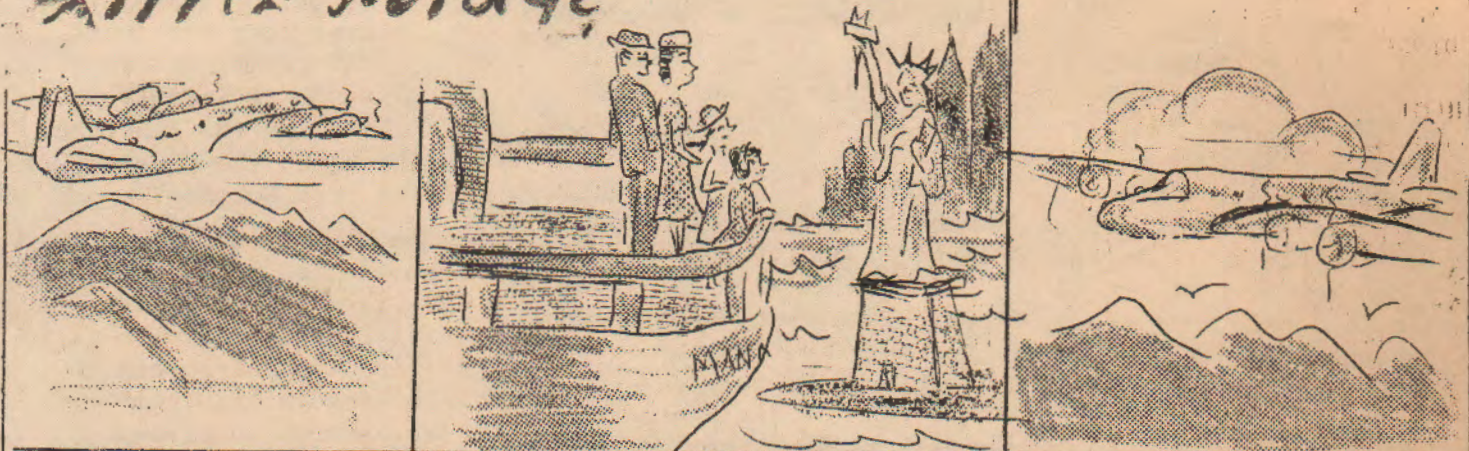

COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR OCTOBER
MARIE PETRANOVICH

Marie said that each year, when the numerous Petranovich clan meets for their annual picnic at the Peters Creek Camp grounds, it is understood that Marie will provide the baked beans.

Here is the recipe that is so popular with her family.

OLD-FASHIONED BAKED BEANS

- 1# navy beans
 - 1 qt cold water
 - 1 small onion
 - 4 tsp salt
 - 2 tsp cider vinegar
 - 1/2 tsp prepared mustard
 - 1 tbs brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup catsup
 - 1/8 tsp pepper
 - 1/4 cup molasses
 - 4 sliced salt pork
- PICK and wash beans
ADD the cold water
COVER and simmer for 30 min.
DRAIN and keep the liquid
PLACE sliced onions in casserole.
COMBINE other ingredients
POUR on the onions
ADD the beans and hot liquid.
PLACE salt pork on top
COVER and bake at 275° for 3 1/2 to 4 hours
REMOVE cover 1/2 hour before beans are done to brown pork slices
SERVES 5 to 6.

BUILDINGS ON THE MOVE

EKLUTNA: Five 22' x 28' frame buildings began a trek from the Army supply depot at Eklutna to Seward where the Army maintains a rest camp.

The first leg of the trip took place without incident at 3am on Monday morning, and arrived two hours later at the weighing station at mile 11.

The convoy stopped along the way at several points where there was room for state police to direct traffic around it, otherwise the entire highway was blocked and traffic halted.

The trip was planned to be made in a series of jumps, and the entire move was expected to be made in five days.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

FIRE AT DUMP EXTINGUISHED

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. pumped approximately 1,000 gallons of "wet water" on the Birchwood dump last Sunday extinguishing several fires which had been ignited there.

Chief Wallace defined "wet water" as water to which a chemical had been added which greatly increases its wetting characteristics.

State Police had requested the Fire Co. to extinguish the fires as the burning was not controlled, and the trash at the dump extended into the wooded area surrounding the dump.

Wallace reported that the dump appeared to be a crawl with maggots and felt that the area was a public health menace.

Wallace took advantage of the opportunity to break in several new firemen in the handling of the equipment.

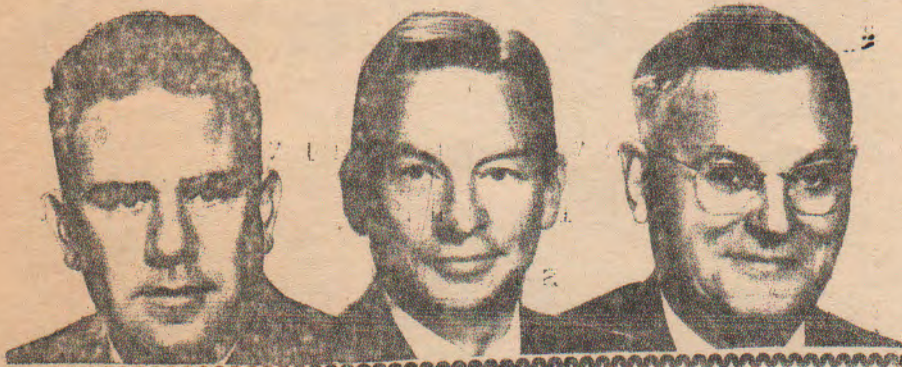
Mrs. Boroughs is suffering from a severe case of bronchitis plus other complications.

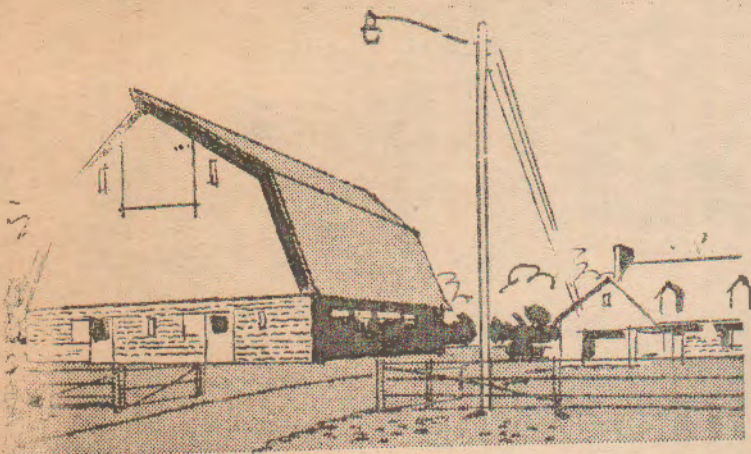

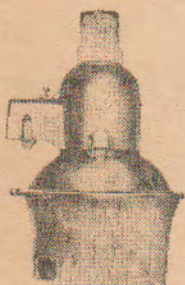

MTA CONTRACT STILL TIED UP

PALMER: Max Clement, manager for the Matanuska Telephone Association said that the contract for the outside plant at the Eagle River sub-station was still tied up.

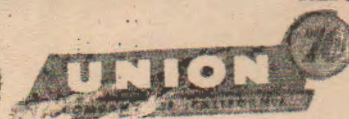
