CIVIL DEFENSE MEETING FRIDAY

CHUGIAK: On October 19th at 7:30pm, a meeting will be held at the Chugiak School for the purpose of initiating a Civil Defense Plan for the Chugiak Civil Defense District.

Kelven "Gene" Benito, newly appointed director of the Chugiak Civil Defense District said this.

"In the September 1962 issue of USSR (Soviet Life Today), there is an article which should be read and absorbed by every thinking person in our United States.

Under the guise of "Peace" can be read the ominous thoughts and intentions of the rulers of the Soviet Union. I would like to quote the article in part:

"Modern weapons cannot in any way be compared to the old ones. The explosive force of just one powerful hydrogen bomb is many times as great as that of all the explosives used in all the

CHUGIAK: The Executive committee for Operation Chugiak High School and the Chugiak Advisory School Board have gone on record as being in favor of the passage of proposition #2, on the ballot of the November 6th General Election.

This proposition deals with primary and secondary schools throughout the State of Alaska, and specifically, in the Capital Improvements bill which it refers to, allocates the sum of \$1,200,000 for the construction of a High School in Chugiak.

At a meeting held last night at the Chugiak School, it was decided to conduct an all-out campaign on the local level to urge voters to vote yes on the proposition.

Several methods are planned to stimulate local voters to turn out and vote for the proposition. Each school child will be asked to write a letter to their own parents urging them to vote "Yes" on proposition two. Also the school children will make posters to be displayed throughout the community urging a "yes" vote.

Another plan, is to have the teen-agers carry "picket" signs at the shopping center and other prominent places in the community shortly before the election, pointing out their stake in the "Yes" vote.

The main goal is to try to get every eligible voter in both local precincts to the polls on November 6th and also for everyone to urge their friends elsewhere in the state to back the school bond proposition.

The School board and the OCHS committee both feel that an all out concerted effort to get out the local voters is the main object in this election.

A BIG STAKE

In the coming election, the residents of the Chugiak community will have the biggest personal stake than at any other time in the history of the state.

Proposition number two on the ballot deals with bonds which will be used to finance the construction of a high school in this area.

The Capital Improvements program to which the proposition refers obligates the sum of \$1,200,000 of the five million dollars for the const-

struction of a high school in the Chugiak area.

Many may have gotten the impression that because of the initial site selection survey that the construction of Chugiak High School is a certainty.

This is not true. The funds for the preliminary survey were appropriated at the last legislature, but these were only sufficient to make the survey and to draw up initial plans for the school, the

money to build the school must be voted in by the voters of the State of Alaska next November 6th.

As residents of Chugiak our interest in this election has been reduced to a very personal level.

Each additional voter that comes to the polls, and votes yes on proposition number 2, makes Chugiak High School that much closer to being a reality.

Many may take the attitude that their vote will make little difference in the final outcome, but this attitude multiplied by many can cause us to lose our high school.

This is one election where the residents of both local voting precincts should feel it their duty to get out and vote.

This is something we owe to our children and to our neighbors children.

November 6th is "D Day" for Operation Chugiak High School. Let us also make it "V (for victory) Day".

1# Mince Meat
1 cup raisins

1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs (separated)
2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1½ tsp baking powder
½ tsp soda
½ tsp salt

ADD raisins, nut meats, sugar, butter, vanilla and egg yolks to mince meat

BEAT thoroughly

SIFT together, flour, soda, baking powder and salt

SIFT again

wars in history, including the first and second World Wars.

Nuclear-missle war erases the line between the battle-field and the rear entirely. What is more, it is the civilian population that will be the first prey of the weapons of mass annihilation. In a war of that sort, just a few thermonuclear bombs are liable to wipe out entire states, let along the biggest industrial centers with opopulations of many millions."

In its entirety, the article methodically points out the Soviet viewpoint that a new war is closer today than ever before in the history of the world, and that civilian population will be "first prey".

This is the viewpoint of the enemies of our way of life.

Should war again be thrust upon this nation, there will be no "rear lines". The civilian population will not be situated thousands of miles from the fighting lines with many long months to prepare for the defense of their homes. should the need arise. Defense against nuclear warfare poses such problems that only months or years of preparation in advance of hostilities will permit a community, or a family to survive.

The United States government and our State of Alaska has compiled a complete and coordinated Civil Defense plan that will give us the opportunity to devise our own community Civil Defense Plans.

They will assist us in every way ppssible, but will do nothing unless we do our part."

SCHOOL AGE POPULATION UP 138%. During the 1950-1960 period, Alaska's school age population increased at the highest rate of growth in the nation. Annually, it increases more than 10%, meaning that more classrooms, teachers and related facilities are necessary just to keep pace. To meet this need, nearly 30% of the State budget has gone into education. Since statehood 88 classrooms have been constructed in state-supported schools and an additional 27 are under construction today.

EDUCATION QUALITY IMPROVED. But, Alaska's first elected State government has done more than merely see to it that sufficient facilities and teachers are provided. Teachers' salaries have been raised and additional benefits given to teachers. Teachers' requirements have been strengthened.

MORE EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES. To meet the urgent need for more and better school facilities in rural areas, Governor Egan urged the Legislature to place on the November ballot a bond issue for construction of new elementary and secondary classrooms in many localities, and he is working for voter approval of this far-reaching program.

SCHOOL FINANCING IMPROVED. Legislation was enacted at Governor Egan's request to improve the method of school support in Alaska to make it more equitable to all taxpayers.

UNIVERSITY IMPROVEMENTS LAUNCHED. Backed by the largest appropriations in its history, the University of Alaska is rapidly improving its facilities and at the same time is becoming one of the most respected arctic research institutes in the nation. Establishment of the Marine Sciences Institute at Douglas will further enhance the University's role in Alaska's future.
