SCHOOL CARNIVAL THIS SATURDAY

CHUGIAK: Gene Benito, Civil Defense Director for the Chugiak District announced that work is beginning today on a school fall-out shelter that would accommodate 500 persons.

Two acres of land adjacent to the Chugiak School have been allocated by the State of Alaska to the Department of Civil Defense for the purpose of constructing fall-out shelters.

Benito stated that D-7 bulldozer is being loaned to the local district by the Department of Civil Defense and is being moved onto the land today. Dallan Oberg, heavy equipment operator from Peters Creek has offered to operate this dozer in clearing the land. Also, Jack Brittain, a Birchwood contractor has offered the use of a second D-7 and will also furnish fuel, and an operator. Brittain also has offered two welders and operators the use of his well drilling rig and a third D-7, if necessary.

Benito made the following statement to the residents of the Chugiak Civil Defense District:

"The time has come when we no longer have any choice in the matter whether we should prepare for war or not.

Our only hope to survive this day and age is for each and every individual to step forward and do his part to try to provide shelters for our community and school (cont page 9 col 3)

Two years ago in conjunction with pointing out our other classroom needs of the community, a petition was circulated by the Chugiak PTA urging the State Department of Education to construct a high school in this area. Subsequently, Operation Chugiak High School, a committee consisting of representatives from 26 Chugiak organizations came into being June of the following year, 1961.

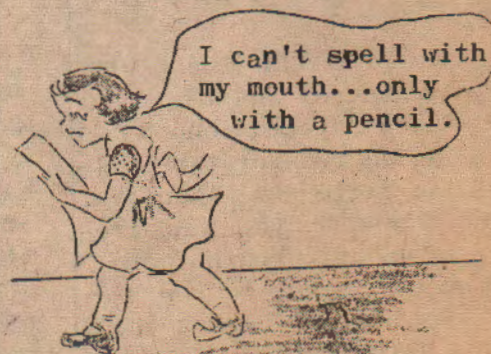

Shall the State of Alaska issue its general obligation bonds in the principal sum of not to exceed \$5,000,000 bearing interest not to exceed 6% per annum and maturing in not to exceed 30 years from the date of issue for the purpose of paying in part or all the cost of acquiring constructing, equipping and improving certain elementary and secondary public schools within the state and as provided in the Capital Improvement Program for the state dated March 1962.

COOK OF THE MONTH

The recipe which Marie gives us this week is a family favorite, which she learned from her Yugoslavian in-laws.

KIDNEY STEW AND POLENTA

- 1 large or 2 small beef kidneys
- 1 medium sliced onion
- 1 1/2 tsp bacon drippings
- 1 can tomato paste or 1 can tomato sauce
- Dash of Garlic Salt
- 2 cup water
- Season to taste

SELECT only fresh kidneys
WASH and remove tissue and fat
CUT into small pieces, using only red meat.
DICE onion
PLACE in skillet with kidney and bacon drippings
COOK over medium heat until kidneys turn a grey color
ADD tomato sauce or paste and water
COVER the stew and simmer for 1 hour
ADD more water as it becomes too thick

POLENTA
The polenta should be started before the stew. In a 4 quart pan, bring to a rolling boil 6 cups water a 1 tsp. salt.
ADD 3 cups yellow corn meal (next col.)

(cook)
STIR to mix
* Lumps will form, but will cook out
TURN heat to low and cover to steam.
* It will be very thick
TURN occasionally with a spoon (preferable wooden.)
COOK for one and one half hours until done.
* The mixture will be like a moist cake.
Serve the stew over the polenta.

MORE JOBS THAN EVER BEFORE. More Alaskans are working and receiving better pay than ever before in Alaska's history. At the same time Alaska Department of Labor figures, for the week ending September 2, 1962 showed an insured unemployment rate of 2.7%, the lowest level in many years. State sponsored programs are training workers in new and needed skills.

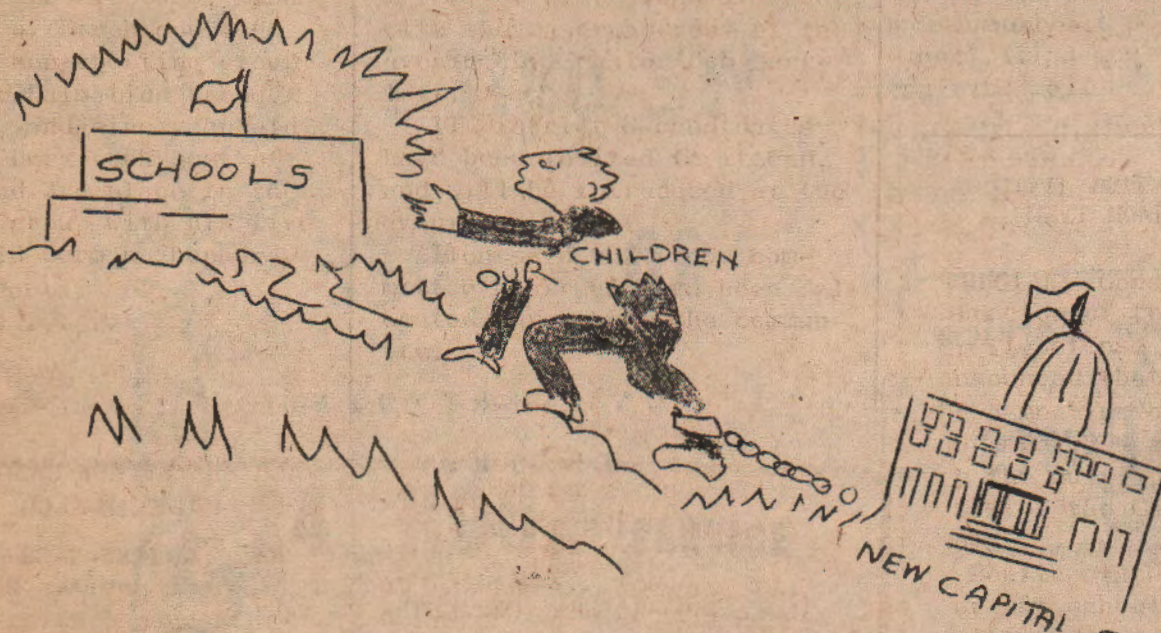

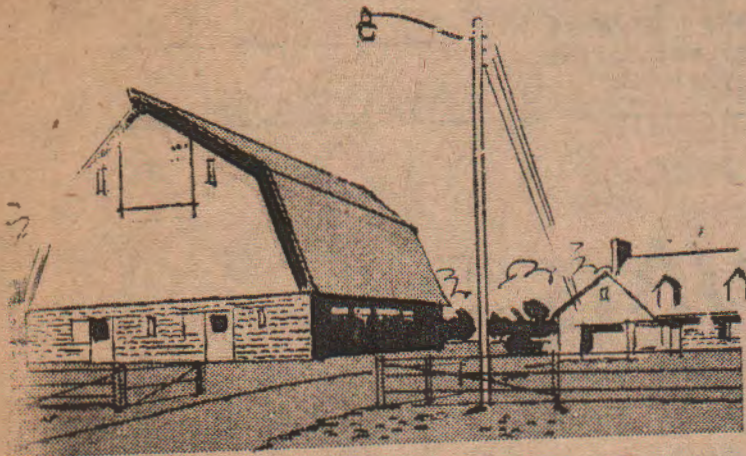

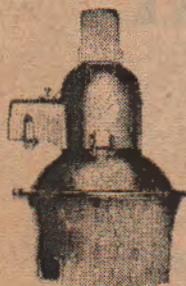

We are going to have to stop letting the dollar interfere with our better judgement, because a dead man can't spend money.

The time has come when we are going to have to think in terms of survival and not mere pleasure.

We had a Civil Defense Meeting October 19, at which time it was voted to start the clearing of land acquired through the Department of Civil Defense for sheltering the children of the Chugiak School and local residences.

Donald Lowell, State Civil Defense Director said we could use a D-7 cat to help in the preparation of shelters. This cat is being delivered to the Chugiak School today.

We are fighting a time limit with the weather, but this will be a start. We can use these next few months very effectively in the manner of getting organized and stock piling materials. We also tried to acquire land in the Eagle River Area for school shelters, but there is no land available through the state close enough to assure occupancy. We will have to ask for donated land or for a reasonable lease, so construction of shelters can begin there. It would not take much land, and in time could save many lives. It would be a very good thought to know, if in the event of an attack, that your children will have adequate shelters at school. Then you could think in terms for trying to provide for those at home.

Our plan is to use gunset huts with steel reinforcing over and center bracing in the middle. This would no doubt work.

the area, as of right now, which may be used in starting this shelter plan.

The Federal Government will stock any shelter which will accommodate fifty or more with two weeks rations per person.

They will also supply radiation equipment, plus extra rations which will probably be available, figuring 10 square feet per person.

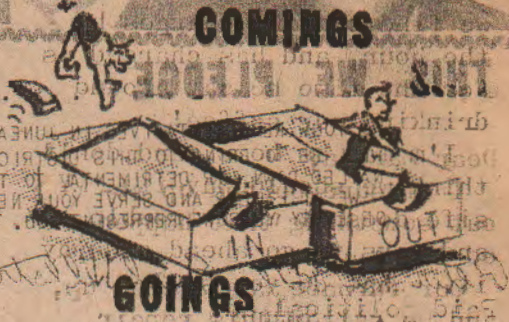

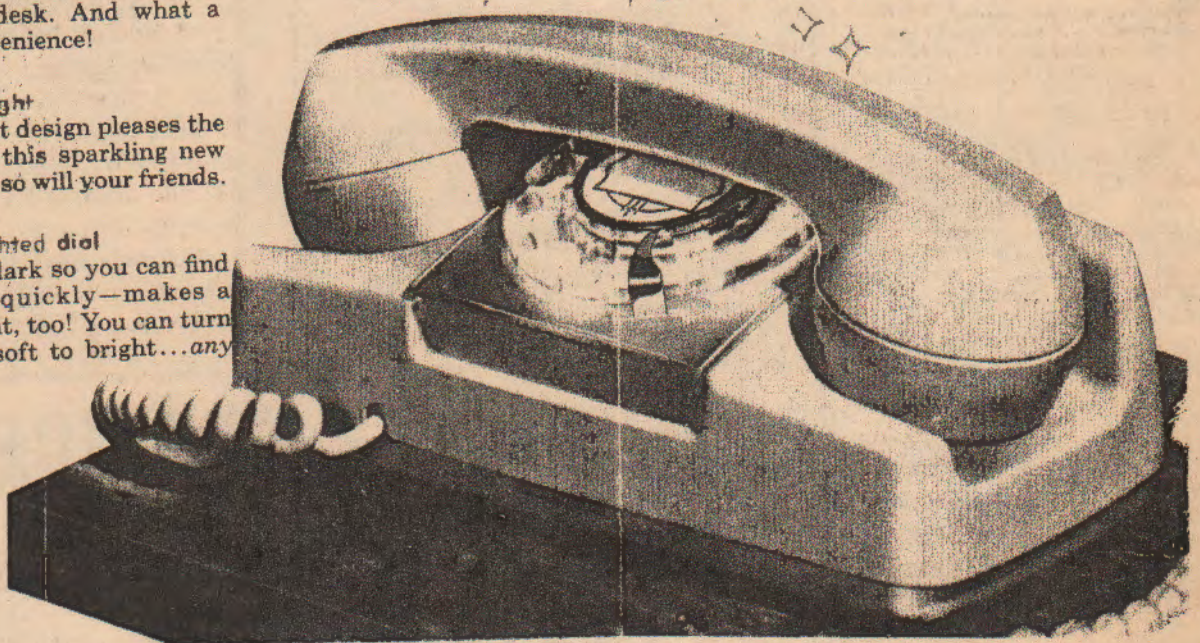
