

Benito stated that D-7 bulldozer is being loaned to the local district by the Department Civil Defense and is being moved onto the lan. today. Dallon Oberg, heavy equipment operat or from Peters Creek has offered to operate this dozer in clearing the land. Also, Jack Brittain, a. Birchwood contractor has offered the use of a second D-7 and will also furnish fuel, and an operator. Brittain also has offered two welders and operators the use of his well orilling rig and a third D-7 if necessary.

- BONDING PROPOSITION No. 2 (Ch. 122, SLA 1962)
- State General Obligation School Construction Bonds \$5,000,000

Shall the State of Alaska issue it's general obligation bonds in the principal sum of not to exceed \$5,000,000 bearing interest not to exceed 6% per annum and maturing in not to exceed 30 years from the date of issue for the purpose of paying in part or all the cost of acquiring constructing, equipping and improving certain elementary and secondary public schools within the state and as provided in the Capital Improvement Program for the state dated Warch 1962.

MORE JOBS THAN EVER BEFORE. More Alaskans are working and receiving better pay than ever before in Alaska's history. At the same time Alaska Department of Labor figures, for the week ending September 2, 1962 showed an insured unemployment rate of 2.7%, the lowest level in many years. State sponsored programs are training workers in new and needed skills.

GREATER PROTECTION PROVIDED. Liberalization and strengthening of the Workmen's Compensation Act, increases in the minimum wage, and extension of the Alaska Wage and Hour Act to cover thousands of workers not previously protected these are some of the benefits working men and women have gained since statehood. Furthermore, Workmen's Compensation hearings are now held frequently, contributing to speedy settlement of claims.

EMPHASIS ON INDUSTRIAL SAFETY. On-thejob accidents have been sharply reduced. Fatalities from industrial accidents fell off from 33 in 1959 to 11 in 1961, and 6 in the first eight months of 1962.


CIVIL DEFENSE TO MEET MONDAY
