CHUGIAK: The current Cuban crisis stirred local Civil Defense activity, as was evinced by the large crowd that gathered at the Monday meeting.

Approximately sixty persons met to discuss local shelter plans with Gene Benito, Director for the Chugiak Civil Defense District.

Benito explained that to participate in Civil Defense activities, this district must draw up a formal Civil Defense plan, which must be submitted to the state Director. A planning committee was nominated and they will meet next Saturday, in the multi-purpose room of the Chugiak school at 7:30pm.

Members of this committee are, Ed Willis, George Allen, Bob Freer, Wm. Banks, Bill Glafke, Jack Stewart, Dallan Oberg, Walter Bowen, Jack Brittain, Les Todd, and Alton Pembroke.

Problems to be encountered in the plan to bury quonset huts for shelters at the Chugiak school, and also plans for establishing permanent Civil Defense Headquarters in the area were discussed.

Benito explained that funds are badly needed to meet current and future expenses, and the the residents of the community must be prepared to offer some financial support.

George Allen started the donations with the pledge of \$50 toward the Chugiak shelter and said that he would contribute a fifty dollar donation toward any other public shelter to be constructed in the Chugiak Civil Defense District.

I feel he isn't being fair, and I want you to tell me what you would do about this situation.

American Beauty

Dear American Beauty, As an American of any kind, you have the right to vote as you please as much as anyone else.

I agree that your husband is being unreasonable trying to force you to give up your vote, just because it doesn't agree with his.

The Taylor is usually closed early in October, according to Sam E. Johnson, State Maintenance Engineer.

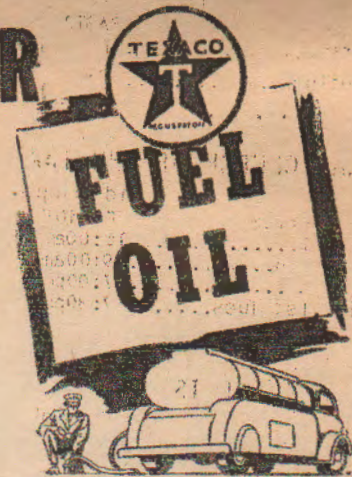
Johnson cautioned hunters going into the area to be aware of possible severe storms which may strand hunting parties this time of the year.
