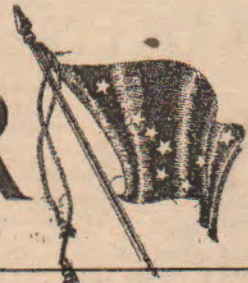

STATE MAY BUY SCHOOL SITE

ARMY MEN SAVE FIRE LAKE HOME

FIRE LAKE: Quick action on the part of members of an army convoy saved the Fire Lake Home of Ray Gay from being destroyed by fire last Monday morning.

The convoy was passing the Gay home near Lower Fire Lake, when they noticed smoke issuing from the house.

Upon investigating they discovered that a divan in the living room appeared to be on fire.

Although the house was dangerously superheated, and likely to be engulfed in flames at any moment several of the men put on gas masks and after determining that the house was unoccupied, carried the burning divan outdoors and extinguished the flames with a garden hose.

Both the Chugiak and Eagle River Fire Company's responded to a call and took over the task of securing the fire and completing the investigation.

CHUGIAK: Leonard Lowell, Director, Division of Buildings Department of Public Works has indicated that the State may purchase the land on which Chugiak High School will be built.

In a public notice, which Mr. Leonard's Department has circulated throughout the community, Leonard stated: "...The State of Alaska will accept proposals for the purchase of a parcel of land upon which will be constructed a State School facility. The land must be not less than 20 acres in size, nor greater than 30 acres, and located within a four-mile radius of the existing Chugiak School in Section 17, Township 15, N. Range 1 W., accessible to an all-weather road and electrical service.

Proposals will be accepted until 2pm, November 20, 1962, by the Division of Lands and should be mailed or hand-carried to the Division of Lands, State Department of Natural Resources, 344 Sixth Avenue, Anchorage, Ala.

Proposals should be in letter form and reveal the location of the property, the legal description, statement on condition of title, number of acres, a sketch of the parcel showing shape, location within Section and Section number, and the price. The envelope should be plainly marked, "State School Facility at Chugiak Proposal."

SHELTER EXPERIMENT PROGRESSING

CHUGIAK: Gene Benito, Director of the Chugiak Civil Defense District reported that the project of the experimental burial of a quonset for the use as a fall-out shelter at the Chugiak School is progressing rapidly.

Benito said. "The Shelter project at the Chugiak School is underway, and things are progressing as planned. One quonset has been set back in the hill for experimental burial.

First bracing must be installed, and in all probability it will be next spring before it will be put to the test.

"This coming Saturday, a second quonset will be moved into the shelter area for the Civil Defense meetings and training programs throughout the winter.

PALMERL The board of Directors and the management of the MEA will continue their work toward eventual construction of a mine-mouth generation facility at Sutton, according to Mason Lazelle, MEA manager.

He stated that additional property has been acquired at the Sutton site, which now fulfills all the basic requirements for a plant.

Water supplies have been proved by drillin and there is adwquate space for a plant of any conceivale size.

MEA has consistantly insisted that any plan for provision of future generation which includes MEA must also consider the feasibility of a mine mouth facility.

Lazelle said tht REa has adopted the stand that no funds will be available in the area for future generation plans which do not meet the needs of all borrowers.

"We feel that this position will be of value in securing consideration of the sutton site as one of the alternatives available to the area cooperatives." he said.

BUTTERSCOTCH BROWNIES

MELT over low heat
 1/2 cup butter or shortening
 REMOVE from heat
 STIR in until blended
 1 cup light brown sugar (firmly packed)

COOL
 STIR in 1 egg
 SIFT together and stir in:
 3/4 cup flour
 1 tsp baking powder
 1/2 tsp salt

STIR in:
 1/2 tsp vanilla
 1/2 cup coarsly chopped walnuts

SPREAD in well greased 8" square pan
 BAKE at 350° for approximately 25 minutes or until a slight imprint remains when touched with finger.
 DO NOT OVERBAKE
 CUT into bars 1" x 2 1/2".
 Makes about 1 1/2 doz.

TIPS FOR MILADY

A pump type atomizer, such as those that come with window cleaner, or certain types of wave setting lotion comes in handy when ironing.

The empty bottle may be filled with plain water and used for dampening clothes as you iron (the fine spray is just right); or fill the bottle with a liquid starch solution and use for spray starching.

Mix the liquid starch to the same strength as you would use for dip starching.

The atomizer should be cleaned after using it for starch spraying simply by pumping clear water through it.

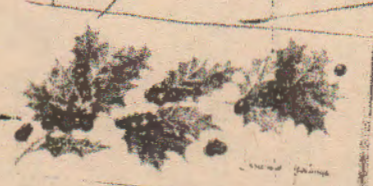

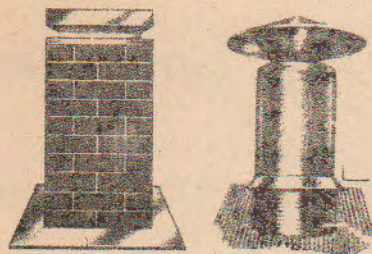

If you can't convince her of this, then just take over that phase of the marketing yourself, and bring home the fresh items and let her worry about the rest.

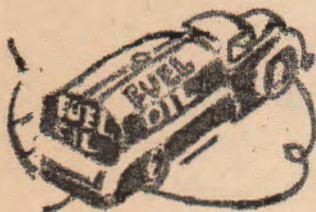

it determines to be best suited for school purposes and at the most reasonable cost considering all factors including cost of site, access road cost, clearing, soil bearing value related to foundation cost, proximity to residential area, exposure, drainage, electricity and water. The seller should be willing to enter into an option agreement with the State to sell the parcel anytime the State elects to buy within a period of six months, for the price specified. The State would pay the seller \$1,000.00 for this option, which \$1,000 would apply toward the total price if and when the State exercises its option.

"The State reserves the right to reject any or all proposals."

Wayne Hull, Chairman of the Chugiak advisory School Board stated that the State has by no means rejected the State owned land sites which were previously recommended by the school board. He said that the state is taking into consideration the possibility that it might cost the State less in the long run to purchase private owned land which is already cleared then it would to attempt to build on a site that might require extensive clearing and leveling before it would be suitable for school construction.

He also said that the school board intends to abide by their original ruling that they would recommend only land which lies between the line dividing the Chugiak and Eagle River voting Precincts and Peters Creek, and between the Chugach Range and Cook Inlet on the West.
