YOUTH PLUNGES OVER CLIFF

BIRCHWOOD SEEN AS HIGH SCH. SITE

BIRCHWOOD: An area located on the Birchwood Road approximately one mile from the junction with the Glenn Highway at mile 17, has been recommended as a site for Chugiak High School.

Wayne Hull, chairman of the Advisory School Board stated that although this land is presently under Federal control and classified as a Forest Reserve, steps can be taken to reclassify it.

Hull said this is the best site of all that have been considered in the community.

Hull recently conducted an aerial survey of the entire community in an attempt to determine the most desirable location.

He felt that the site in Birchwood appeared to be the best when viewed from the air, and subsequent investigation of ground parties confirmed this.

The site has been recommended to the State Department of Education for their further approval.

CIVIL DEFENSE ACTIVITIES

CHUGIAK: Ed Willis, Public Information Officer for the Chugiak Civil Defense District appealed to the men of the community to turn out for a work party this coming weekend.

Willis said that even an hour of work at a time would be of that much help.

Plans for the weekend are to strip the inside of the Quonset in preparation to installing bracing, and to move a second Quonset on to the property to be used for meetings and training.

The work party will report to Civil Defense Headquarters at the site next to the Chugiak School.

At the regular Monday meeting a film was shown on radio-logical Defense. It was highly informative, and dealt with Fallout and Fallout Hazards on a National Scale as well as at the community level.

EKLUTNA: Fifteen year old James Gardin of Anchorage escaped death and injury following a plunge down a fifty foot cliff to the frozen waters of the Eklutna River last Saturday.

Gardin and his companion 15 year old Mike Smith, also of Anchorage had been hunting in the area of the old Eklutna Dam, when Gardin decided to investigate a ledge on the bank of the river. He slipped and fell a few feet down the steep bank. Smith

was attempting to help Gardin back to safety when the boy again slipped and fell the rest of the way down the gorge to the river.

When Smith received from Gardins signals that he was unhurt, he attempted to walk out and get help.

Darkness came over Smith before he was able to make his way out to the highway, and he became lost in the vicinity of the Thunderbird campground.

His cries for help were overheard by Robert Forrest of Spenard who was hiking in the area, and he led Smith to the highway and they both drove to the Peters Creek Shopping Center, from where the State Police were summoned.

Smith and Forrest returned to the river along with Herman Chiligan an Eklutna native who is employed at the Peters Creek Shopping Center. Along the way they were joined by two military men, SP4 David Moore and PFC Ed Harrat of Fort Richardson (cont page 9 col 1)

In the past displays were separated into three groups, private residences, commercial displays and Churches or civic groups (i.e. schools, clubs etc.)



This is a very worthwhile project, and the Courier would be willing to assist any group of individuals or organizations that might be interested in reviving the contest.

COOK FOR NOVEMBER
FRAN NEWTON

This week, Fran gives a new way to serve that popular Alaskan seafood, salmon.

This may use either canned fish, or cooked fresh salmon.

SCALLOPED SALMON

2 tbs butter
2 tbs onion (chopped)
1/4 cup diced celery
2 tbs chopped green pepper (optional)
2 tbs flour
1 cup milk
1/4 tsp salt
2 cups flaked salmon
Fine buttered bread crumbs
MELT butter in pan
ADD onion, celery and pepper
FRY over low heat
BLEND in flour
ADD milk gradually
STIR until thickened
ADD salt and salmon
POUR in buttered casserole
TOP with crumbs
BAKE in moderate oven (350°) until crumbs are brown.



OUR CLASS TOURS THROUGH THE NEW SCHOOL





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
