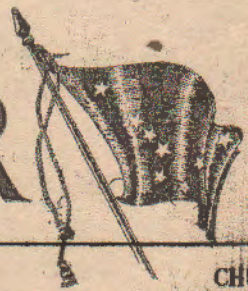

MEAT BALLS WITH MUSHROOM SAUCE

COMBINE:

- 1# ground beef or moose
- 1/4 cup cornmeal
- 1 tsp chili powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1/4 cup onions finely chopped
- 2 tbs. green pepper, finely chopped
- 1 egg beaten
- 1/2 cup water

FORM into small balls.

ROLL balls in flour.

2 tbs flour

HEAT in heavy pan or skillet.

2 tbs cooking oil

BROWN meatballs thoroughly.

MIX TOGETHER

1 can condensed mushroom soup

1/4 cup milk

ADD to meatballs in pan.

COVER tightly.

COOK gently over low heat.
