LOCAL ELECTION RESULTS

CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL ASSURED

Yesterday, November 6, 1962 Alaskan voters approved a bond issue which included \$1,200,000 for construction of a High School in the Chugiak area.

Two years ago a petition was circulated by the Chugiak PTA pointing out among other classroom requirements the need for a High School in this area. Between these two related events, enough action took place to fill a very large book.

Many hours by many people has spread the name "CHUGIAK" throughout the length and breadth of Alaska. Although the successful culmination of all these efforts is a High School for this area, an interesting by-product developed.


PTA GROUPS TO MEET

CHUGIAK: Staff officers for the Chugiak Civil Defense District were chosen at a meeting of the planning committee, held last Saturday at the Chugiak School.

The position of Fire Chief is still unfilled. Director Gene Benito stated that this is a most important position, and as yet there has been no nomination to this position. This election has turned out to be a real cliff-hanger, with the voters and candidates really getting their money's worth this time.


One issue, thank heaven, seems certain, Proposition #2 has passed, and we will get our High School.

Of her first recipe, Fran says, "This is so simple to make and so good. It's well worth getting some cottage cheese and keeping some dill on hand."

DILLY CASSEROLE BREAD

BAKE at 350° for 40-50 minutes

SOFTEN 1 pkg dry yeast in $\frac{1}{4}$ cup warm water
COMBINE in mixing bowl
1 cup (country) cottage cheese heated to lukewarm
1 tbs sugar
1 tbs Frenchs inst. minced onions
1 Tbs butter
1 tsp dill seed
1 tsp salt
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp soda
1 unbeaten egg

(dilly) Casserole Bread)

ADD 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ to 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sifted flour to form soft dough, (beating after each addition, cover.

LET rise in warm place (85° to 90° F) until light & double in size (50 to 60 minutes)

STIR down dough

TURN into well-greased 8 inch round (1 $\frac{1}{2}$ or qt) casserole

LET rises in warm place for 30 to 40 minutes
BAKE at 350° for 40 to 50 minutes until golden brown

BRUSH with soft butter
SPRINKLE with salt.

BUSINESS UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT


PETERS CREEK: Allen's Grocery at mile 23, has been sold and is now being operated by Art and Lorraine Johnson of Eagle River,

The store will remain open for business during the transition period, but the Jonshons plan a grand opening sometime around the first of December.


The Allens still plan to reside at the mile 23 location until after the first of the year.

SCHOOL C.D. PLANS REVEALED

CHUGIAK: Chuck Smith, superintendent of the Chugiak School system, revealed the plans which will be followed at both the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools in the event of a nuclear attack.

Plan "A": In the event of only a flash or loud sound as a warning, students will be instructed to "Duck and Cover", and get under their desks.

In the event of an imminent attack of 10 minutes warning, students will be directed to school halls.

Plan "B": If the warning is 15 minutes or more, walking students would be directed to proceed immediately to their homes and stay there if their parents are not at home. Under this plan, parents are advised to instruct their children as to the shortest route they should take to their home.

They also should give them alternate instructions as to what to do if parents are not at home.

Bus Students will proceed to halls of the school to await further directions.

PLAN "C": If the warning is 1 hour or more, under this (next col.)

(C.D. plan)

plan, walking students will be dismissed immediately and should follow the same directions as for plan "B".

Regular transportation will be provided bus students.

Bus students would be held in readiness for the regular schedule which would start as soon as possible.

The transportation route would operate on the udentile school to home routes, with less stops and some short-cut routing.

The above instructions are subject to change.

In the event shelters are provided or new Civil Defense plans are received, new directions will be issued at once.






