MAN KILLED

GOAT CREEK: Stanley McCallum of Goat Creek was dead on arrival at the Valley Presbyterian Hospital in Palmer, following being struck down by a car last Saturday.

McCallum aged 79, had apparently been walking down the side of the road when Earl Goodrich of Palmer first saw him.

Goodrich said that McCallum turned and started to cross the highway in front of him.

Goodrich applied his brakes but the car skidded on the icy pavement and McCallum was struck down.

Goodrich transported McCallum to the Palmer Hospital in his car, but, the man was dead on arrival.

McCallum has lived in Alaska for 46 years and had no living relatives in the state

Radio Communications training will soon be held in that building, Benito said.

He also stated that he has spoken to a Mr. Davidson, General Manager for the Alaska Railroad.

Davidson told Benito that he will attempt to release to the Chugiak Civil Defense District a number of underground storage units now being stored at Birchwood. These are designed for ammunition storage and designed to be buried.

Benito felt that these, together with the Quonsets would provide sufficient shelters for both schools.

Benito added that help is always welcome at the weekend work parties which are held at the Chugiak headquarters.

WHITE TAFFY

COMBINE
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
1/2 tsp vinegar
1 tsp cream of tartar

BOIL without stirring until brittle stage.
POUR into buttered tins
WHEN cool enough to handle
PULL until white and glossy
STRETCH out and cut with scissors.

**Desired flavoring may be added

ALSO chopped nuts may be added while pulling.

CEREAL CHEWS

1/4 cup butter or oleo
1/4 lb. marshmallows
1/2 cup candied fruit, peel & dates chopped fine
2 cups puffed dry cereal
MELT butter in top of double boiler
CUT marshmallows into 4 or 5 pieces each (or use miniature)
ADD butter
STIR til melted and thoroughly mixed.
ADD cereal and fruit
MIX lightly
POUR into 8" ungreased square pan

LADIES CLUB PLAN DINNER

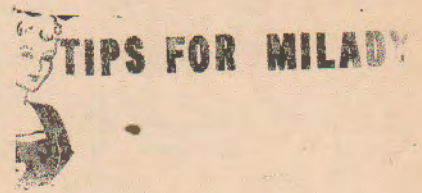

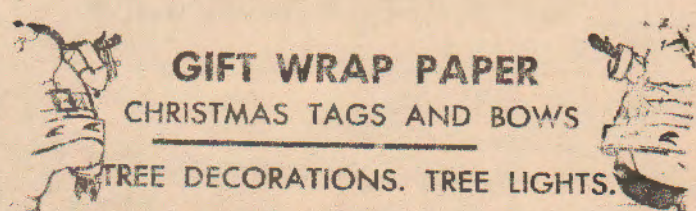

Both the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies responded but were unable to save the frame dwelling.

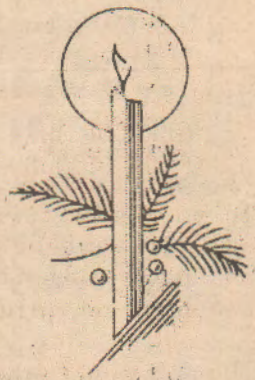
Williams was at home alone, when the fire broke out. An overheated stove was blamed.

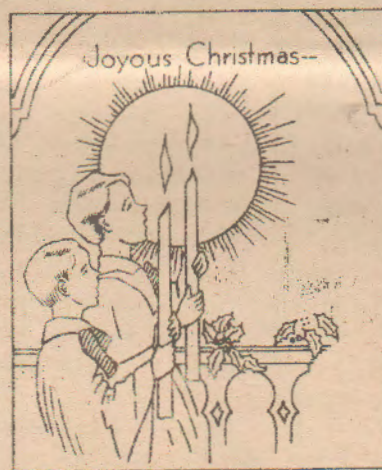
UTILITIES DRAWING WINNERS
