

THREAT TO SCHOOL ADDITION OPENING

EKLUTNA COMMUNITY HALL DEDICATED

EKLUTNA: The new Eklutna Community Hall was dedicated last Saturday, at the annual Christmas dinner held at the village.

This dinner is presented each year for the residents of the village by George Allen of Peters Creek.

This year the dinner was held in the newly completed community hall.

Allen explained that the hall was built by the residents of the village with funds made available to them under the depressed Area act. He explained all of the funds were used to pay the wages of the village residents who worked on the hall, in that way helping many of them to keep off the relief rolls. He said that the material used for building was either donated, or procured by the residents themselves. The men cut hauled and fitted the logs of which the building is constructed. Allen himself donated a building which was taken apart by the men and the materials used in the construction of the hall; and Allen also donated the roofing material.

Special guests at the dinner were State Senator elect, Nick Begich, John Alcantra of the Governors Office in Anchorage, and Walter Gerde, Federal building inspector.

CYCLISTS PERFORM COMMUNITY SERVICE

EAGLE RIVER: Members of the last Frontier Motorcycle Club, of this community fulfilled their pledge to be of service to the community whenever called upon.

When the State Police called their attention to the dangerously icy condition of heavily graveled Cornado Road in Eagle River, the club members responded by thoroughly sanding the street.

This road is not maintained by the State, and was coated with glare ice.

Club members obtained a pick-up truck and hauled numerous loads of sand on to the road.

The State Police have asked that their thanks be expressed to the club and members.

EAGLE RIVER: The opening of the addition to the Eagle River School may be delayed, according to Dale Pierson, President of the Eagle River PTA.

According to Pierson, desks and other furniture for the new classrooms have not arrived, and according to information which he had received have not even been ordered.

Pierson stated that he has sent wires to Governor Egan and to the acting commissioner of Education informing them of this situation.

In these wires he pointed out that the opening date of the addition was scheduled for January 2nd.

Plans had called for the furniture to be assembled during the Christmas vacation. Other functions which will be affected by the delay in opening were an open house by the Eagle River PTA, which was scheduled for January 8th, and the beginning of the hot lunch program, scheduled for January 14th.

Pierson pointed out to both the Governor and to the acting Commissioner, that presently students at the Eagle River School are on double shifts.

Furniture for the new classrooms had been ordered by Chuck Smith, superintendent of the local school system on October 17th, 1962.

Pierson stated that one suggestion that he had received was that Superintendent Smith attempt to borrow enough furniture from local schools until such time as the new furniture arrives.

**COOK FOR DECEMBER
LAVERNE NEGER**

For her final recipe, Laverne departs from Christmas goodies to offer us a hearty main dish.

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS

- 6 med. green peppers
- 3 cups ground meat (cooked)
- 1 1/2 cups cooked rice
- 1 onion chopped
- 1/2 cup cooked tomatoes
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 8 oz. can Tomato Soup

CUT a cap from stem end of each pepper

REMOVE seeds

DROP in boiling water

LET stand for 5 minutes

CHOP pepper caps and mix

with meat, rice, onions

tomatos, salt, and

1 tbs. parsley.

FILL peppers with this mixture

STAND them in a skillet in which 1/2 cup of water has been added

COVER

COOK on high heat till steam escapes

SWITCH to simmer and cook for 30 minutes

The accident occurred on December 17th.

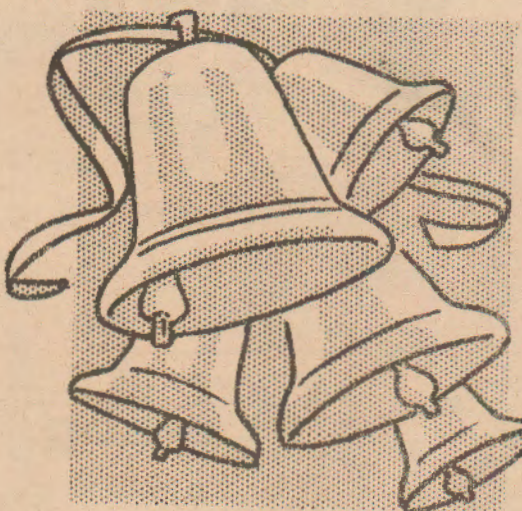
STATE FAIR BOARD HOLDS ELECTION

I also would like to thank George Allen for donating a big portion of this hall. He supplied the roofing, the floor, the windows and the doors. I also

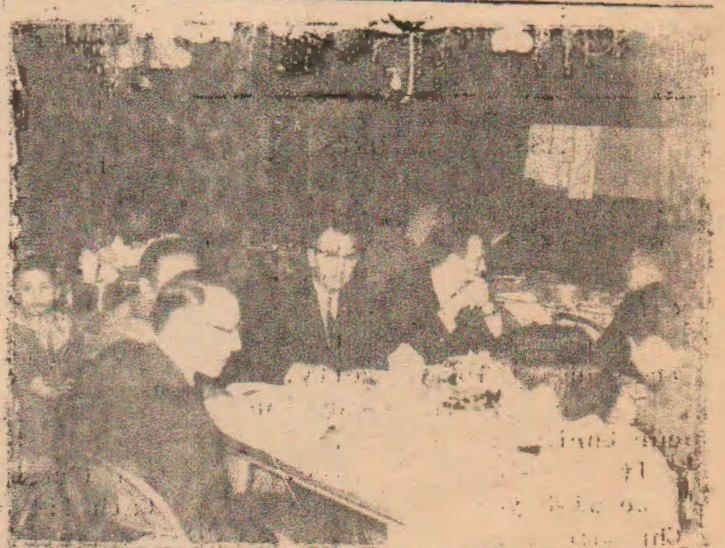

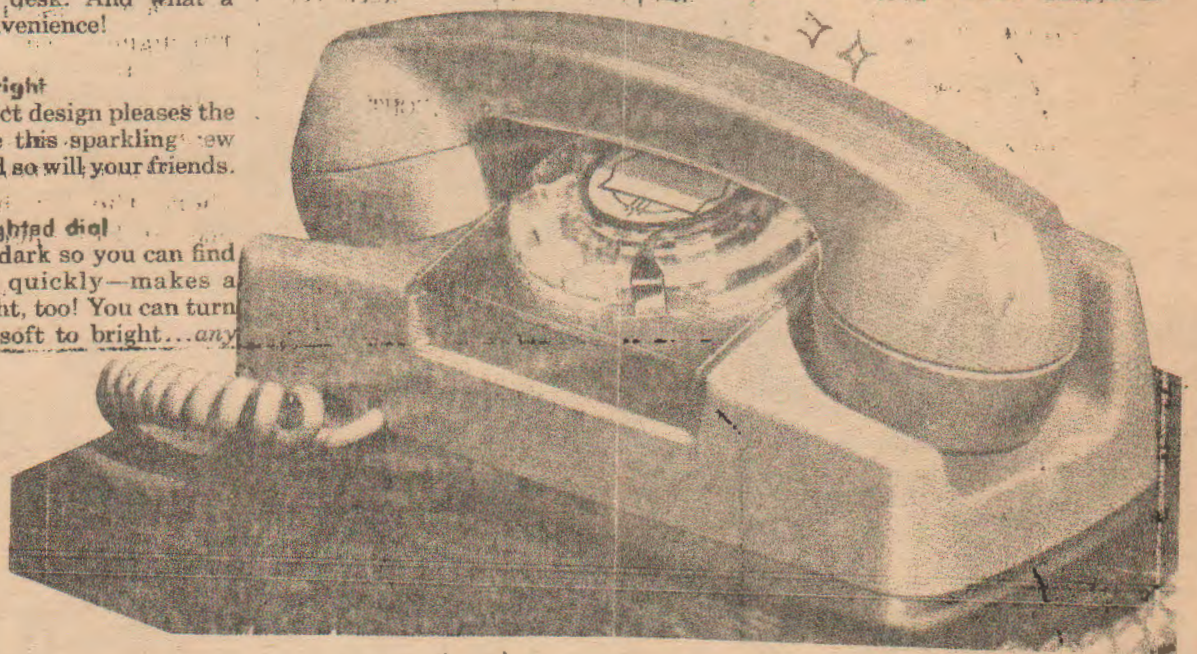

into the rear of it.


Damage to Mrs. Lamoreaux

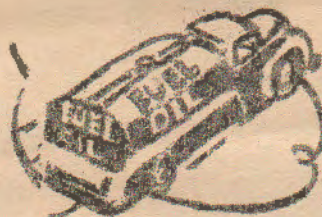
