Games between the local teams have special significance because the team winning two out of the three games scheduled will represent the Chugiak School system in the game against Kenai.

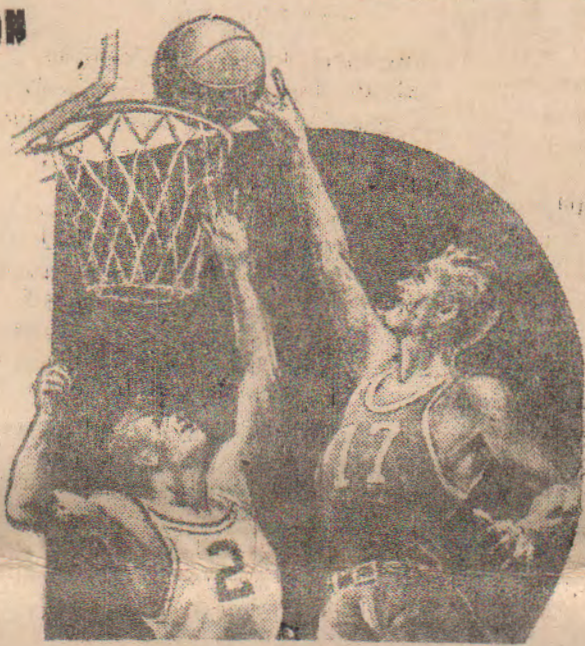
This game will be played at Kenai, and the top local team will travel to the city for the game.

which they are addressed.

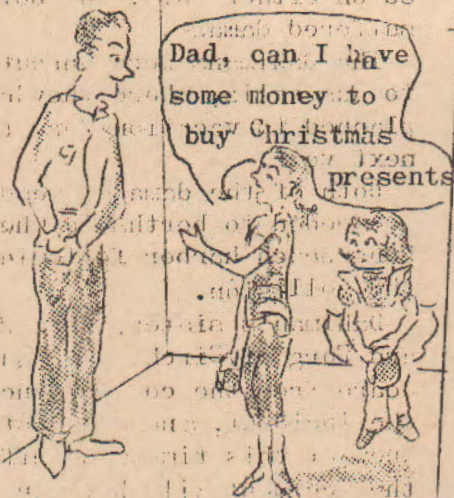
This can save many hours of work for the Post Office staff.

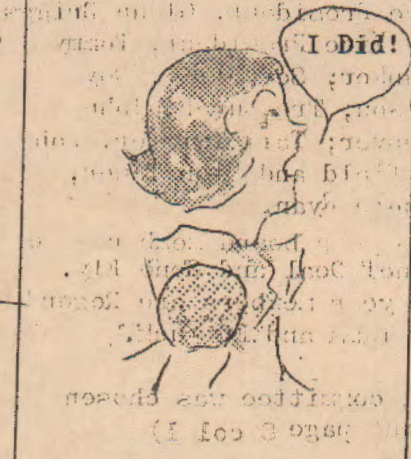

We especially asked Laverne to be our Cook for December, because we knew she would have some novel recipes for Holiday goodies, and she has obliged with several, such as the following:

FRUITCAKE CUPCAKES

- 1 cup Wesson Oil
- 1/2 cups brown sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 2 tsp salt
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 2 tsp allspice
- 1 tsp cloves
- 1 cup juice (pineapple, orange or apple)

- 1 cup more sifted flour
- 1 cup thinly sliced citron
- 1 cup chopped candied pineapple
- 1/2 cups whole candied cherries
- 1 cup seeded raisins
- 1 cup chopped figs or dates
- 3 cups coarsely chopped nuts

COMBINE oil, sugar and eggs
BEAT for 2 minutes
SIFT 2 cups of the flour, baking powder salt & spices.

STIR into oil mixture
ALTERNATE with fruit juice
MIX other cup flour with fruit & nuts

POUR batter over fruit
MIX thoroughly
POUR into 24 paper baking cups set in muffin tins
PLACE pan of water on lower oven rack
BAKE 1 hour in slow oven (275°)

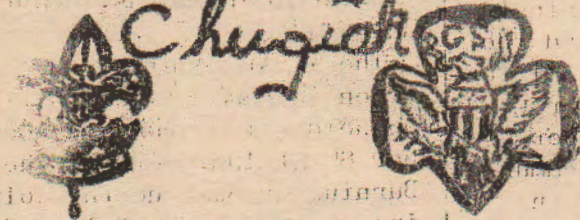

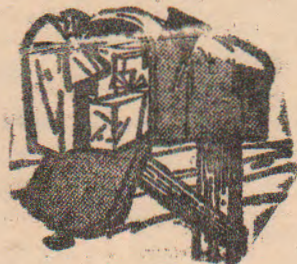

ACCA TO HOLD SQUARE DANCE

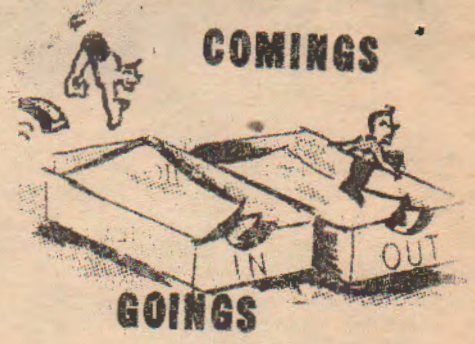

Pricilla Bacon, Public Health nurse was prevented by poor roads from coming to school to administer the tests.

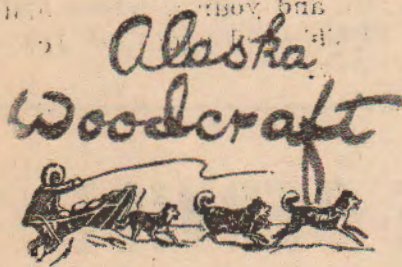

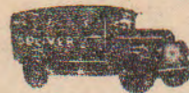

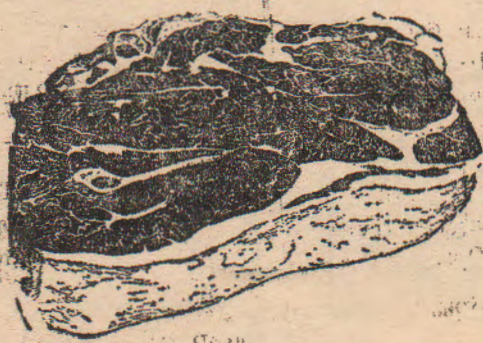
