EAGLE RIVER: Five school children were bitten by one of the many dogs which habitually frequent the Eagle River School grounds last Monday.

Eagle River Principal
Ed Ryan reported that
this particular cog
had bitten one child
at the noon recess;
and a short time later, when one of the
teachers took a group
of youngsters out for
afternoon recess this
same dog attacked and
bit four more youngsters

before she was able to get the group back inside the build-ing.

According to the teacher, the dog was snarling, and did not appear to have heen playful.

In two cases the teeth of the dog had penetrated the childs clothing and blood was drawn. These two youngsters were taken to the office of Dr. Marshall Simpson for tetanus shots.

Principal Ryan reported the matter to the State Police who contacted the owner of the dog.

The dog's owner regretted the incident and agreed to keep the animal confined until it could be determined if the dog might he rabid.

Ryan has long deplored the number of dogs which hang around the Eagle River School. He stated that there are usually from fifteen to twenty dogs on the premises at all times. In almost every instance the dog is a pet who has followed some child to school.

CHUGIAK CHICKEN

A familiar sight to motorists along the Glenn Highway every morning is the many groups of small children waiting to be picked up by the school bus.

At some of the points extremely large numbers of children congregate sometimes twenty or more.

It has been brought to our attention that at least at one of these stops the children are amusing themselves with a very dangerous game. It is the local version of the game "chicken".

The rules for the game here seem to be that when a car is approaching the children will take turns dashing across the road in front of the car, the main idea being to see how close they allow the car to come before they run out.

One motorist noticed this group of children playing and scuffling alongside the road and blew his horn to warn them, thereupon a small boy ran out in front of his car and across the road. He blew his horn a second time and another child followed in the path of the first one. Then to really complicate matters one of the many dogs who also seem to a permanent fixture of every bus stop dashed out into the road and stayed there. The driver of the car attempted to miss the dog and his car skidded on the icy road and he came very near plowing into the group of children.

Needless to say this person was very shaken by this experience, and is wondering what can be done about this situation.

Unfortuantely the school authorities have no jurisdiction over children before they board the school bus, at this point their behavior is the responsibility of their parents. (next col.)

MOOSE TOLL HIGH ON RAILROAD

ANCHORAGE: Accidental killing of moose along the tracks of the Alaska Railroad has been unusually high this winter.

According to Mr. Frank, chief dispatcher for the rail-road at least eighty of the animals have been killed by trains in the month of December alone, with the total climbing in January.

Frank said that attempts to keep the moose off the tracks have been made by putting an auxiliary blade on the train snow plows and clearing a shoulder along the tracks for the moose, who are attempting to escape the deep crusted snow. This has helped some, but the animals will still get on the tracks and mefuse to get off. Even when the engineer is able to stop the train in time to keep from hitting the moose, the animals will charge the locomotives and usually injure themselves that way.

> CREAM OF TOMATO SOUP WITH TUNA SANDWIGHES

SOMP.

1 qt milk (powdered or evaporated milk may be used)

2 cups tomato juice

1 slice onion

l tsp salt

4 tbs. flour

1/8 tsp pepper

4 Tbs butter

COOK Onion with tomato juice MELT butter

ADD flour and seasoning MIX with hot tomato juice COOK until smooth and thick COOL to lukewarm

ADD cold milk a little at a time, stirring constantly. HEAT and reseason if necessary

SANDWICHES:

1 can tuna 1 chopped hardboiled egg 2 Tbs mayonaisse Salt & pepper to taste 1/2 cup chopped celery MIX and spread on buttered

SEATTLE: The keel for Alaska's second big ferry was laid last Friday at the Puget Sound Bridge and Drydock Company in Seattle --almost a month ahead of schedule.

B.E. (Lew) Lewellen, Director of the Alaska Division of Marine Transportation, said he received word of the early keel-laying from Philip A. Spaulding, Seattle marine architect who designed the ferries. Lewellen said the new date doesn't necessarily mean that the second vessel will be completed ahead of its scheduled completion date of January 1, 1963.

The director said that the State did not have any celebration pplanned for Friday, and said that no name has been announced for the second ship as yet.

The keel laying for the third vessel for the Southeastern ferry run is scheduled for June 7th.



QUESTION: My regular work is not covered by the Social Security Act. But I take time off each Christmas season to buy and sell trees for profit. I've done this for several years. Could I qualify for benefits on this work? ANSWER: If your income from Christmas tree sales--after deducting expenses connected with this business -- is at least \$400.00 per year, you are eligible for social security coverage. You should ask your nearest social security office about getting a card and paying taxes on your income.

SALE OF IVORY WITHOUT PERMIT BRINGS FINE

FAIRBANKS: Sale of raw ivory without a permit authori ing the sale resulted in a fine of \$500 and a 60 day jail sentence for a (next col.)

Fairbanks man on his conviction in court there. The jail
sentence and part of the fine
were suspended on condition of
good behavior for one year.
The court also ordered confiscation of the ivory involved.

The regulation prohibiting purchase or sale of raw ivory without a permit was written to remove the incentive for excessive harvest of walrus for their tusks alone.

Before this regulation was adopted by the Board of Fish and Game at it's first rule making session, large numbers of walrus tusks were sold to tourists at a fraction of the talue the ivory attains when fashioned by skilled Alaskan ivory carvers.

The permit requirement not only reduced the incentive for taking far more walrus than are needed for food and carving purposes, but also assured that the ivory would fall only into the hands of carvers so that maximum value would be realized from all tusks taken.



JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan said today that he has asked Post Office Department Officials to investigate the activities of an Eastern promoter whose advertisements in various national publications have mispepresented employment opportunities in Alaska.


The Governor said the request, latest in a series of moves aimed at halting the erroneous statement, followed reports which indicate the promoter has switched his base of operations from Newark New Jersey to New York.

Indications of the sift were contained in three advertisements now appearing in January and February issues of various national publications. Content and format of the advertisements, as well as the name of the advertiser, Practical Research Co. are the same as in previous protested advertisements, but a return address of a post office box at the Lenox Hill Station, New York, New York, has replaced the former Newark address.

In a letter to Chief Postal Inspector Henry B. Montague, outlining steps which he has taken to terminate the company's misrepresetations, Gov. Egan said it now appears obvious that the company has no intention of abiding by assurances it had recently given to Attorney General David D. Furman of New Jersey that it (conf page 11 col 1)


