The thief had gained entry by breaking out the large window at the front of the store and made away with a 22 caliber pistol and a box containing approximately \$100 in small change.

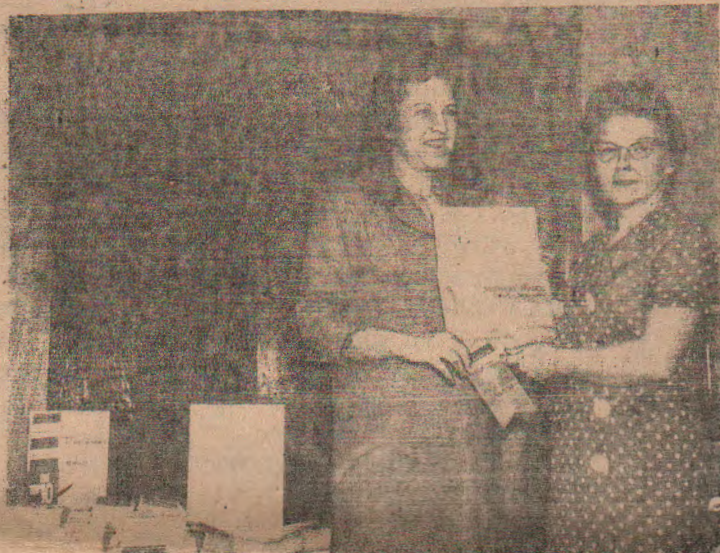
The time of the burglary was definitely set at 12:40am, as when the thief entered the store he broke an electric circuit which stopped an electric clock.

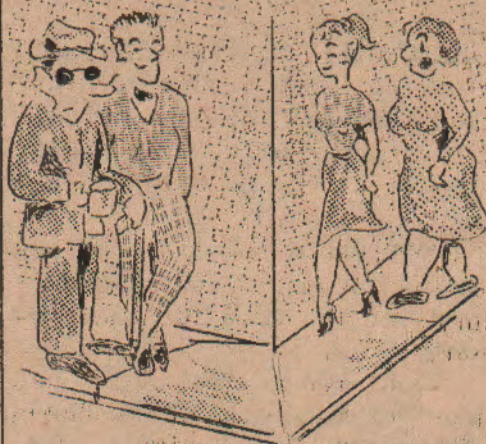
Thursday, left empty handed, although considerable damage was inflicted to the building.

OPEN LETTER: ATTENTION, Patents and Other Interested Persons.

In regard to a PTA for the Eagle River School, the following are my views on this subject.

1. If we had an organized PTA before the Eagle River School opened, we would have had an appropriate "Open House" when classes began at Eagle River Elementary. This would have been befitting the opening of a new school which every parent, student & teacher is proud of and would have been an occasion we would have all enjoyed.

A favorite ingredient in baked goods is dates, for our January cook. This is reflected in her second recipe containing this nutritious fruit.

DATE COOKIES

CREAM:

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup Crisco

ADD:

- 3 eggs (one at a time)

CHOP:

- 1 cup dates fine

POUR:

- 2 tbs. boiling water over dates

ALLOW to stand

COMBINE:

- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 1 tbs soda
- 1/4 tsp cloves
- 1 tsp cinnamin

ADD to sugar mixture

ADD dates and broken nut meats to taste

DROP from spoon on greased baking sheet

BAKE at 350° for 20 minutes.

This makes a tender, spicy cake-like cookie.

River area and perhaps preferring to hold office in the Eagle River PTA...these persons should be given, I think, first choice as to WHICH PTA they wish to belong and given their respective office for the remainder of this school term. Replacements could then be elected for the vacancies or new offices.

4. It only seems logical to me that each of our two grade schools should have their own PTA organization, each working independently for their own respective school and children and the needs thereof.

5. The money currently in the PTA treasury could be divided. The \$1.00 paid by the Eagle River parents going to the Eagle River PTA and the remaining staying in the Chugiak PTA treasury. This should be MORE than fair. The Eagle River PTA treasury would be quite small, but we're a new school, just starting, and our funds can grow as our school grows. Fund raising projects could be undertaken (bake sales, dances, fashion shows, movies, etc.) and many parents in the Eagle River area would give their full support and likewise parents of the Chugiak students would be more inclined to support projects sponsored by THEIR school for THEIR children.

6. On projects such as the annual carnival, movies, supporting O.C.H.S. etc...these are the type things which we can cooperate on and with each school having its own PTA, we are bound to have a larger, more interested group. I believe this will be substantiated by the signatures collected on a petition, which I plan to present at the Feb. PTA.

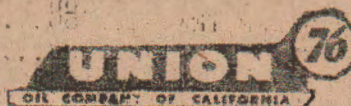
She went on to say that since at the present time no means has been worked out to make the library available for the use of students at the Eagle River school, these students are not being asked to contribute any books.
