EAGLE RIVER: Eleven year old Ralph Jones of Eagle River is lying in Providence Hospital with a broken back, suffered in a sledding accident last Monday.

Ralph and two companions had been taking advantage of an unscheduled vacation from school caused by icy roads, and had taken an akiho (a army surplus toboggan-like affair used for hauling supplies) across the Eagle River and were sliding down the steep embankment of the fill leading to the new bridge.

The akiho struck a protruding rock and broke in two, throwing the three boys onto the icy slope.

Several other boys who had been watching the incident, managed to lift the severely injured Jones boy onto the remains of the akiho and were able to drag him across the frozen surface of the river ice, and up the hill to his home.

Dr. Simpson, of Eagle River was summoned, and after administering emergency treatment, transferred him to Providence hospital in his stretcher equipped station wagon.

The two other boys, Randy Mauldin, 16, suffered a injured wrist while the third Don Fore 12, escaped with bruises.

The Jones boy's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Herman Jones, of mile 13.

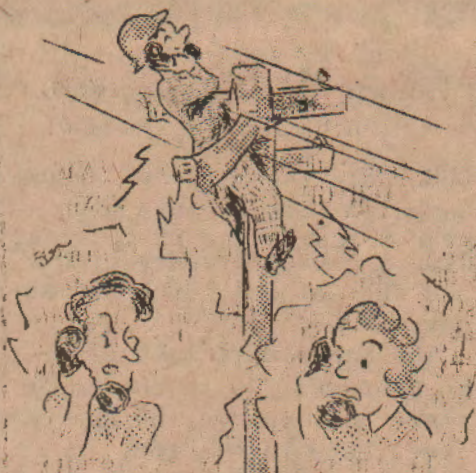
when the car he was driving ran into a stalled army truck and trailer near the Eagle River Shopping Center.

**OPEN LETTER to Ethel McAllister and other interested PTA members.**

This letter is in response to your Open Letter in the January 17<sup>th</sup> issue of the Courier, regarding the Eagle River School. Apparently there is some misunderstanding of the status of the Eagle River School Building and of the Resolution passed unanimously at the December PTA meeting.

1. The matter of the Open House for the Eagle River building is an administrative function. The PTA has nothing whatsoever to do with holding an open house. NO PTA has. However, the PTA has offered to help in any way when the time comes. No one is more anxious to hold an Open House than Mr. Smith, Superintendent of Chugiak Schools and Mr. Ryan, Principal at Eagle River, but they wish to wait until the building is completely furnished. Right now things are rather makeshift at the new building. I am sure Mr. Smith would be glad to discuss this with anyone. All they need do is ask him.

2. Probably this is the most misunderstood fact of all... the Eagle River building is not classes as a separate school by the Department of Education. The Chugiak and Eagle River buildings are considered administratively as one school. In effect it is just the same as if the State had (cont page 5 col 3)

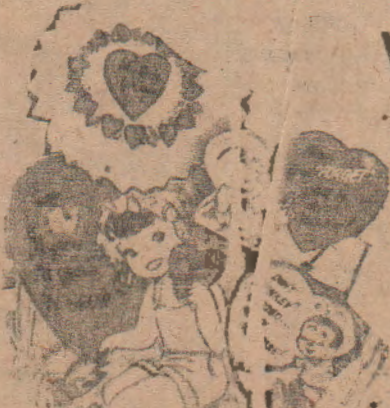

In the third quarter Chugiak finally got their range and Lester Stephens sank two baskets to narrow the gap to 12-7 at the end of the quarter.

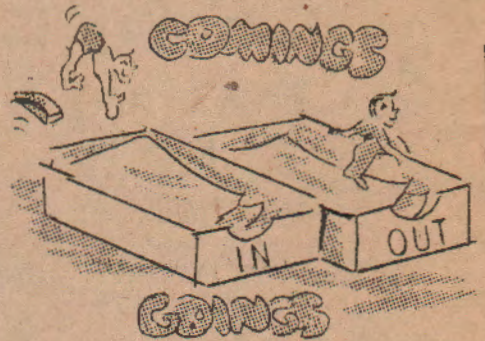
But, in the fourth quarter, Eagle River again took possession, and ran the score up fast for a final score of 24-3.

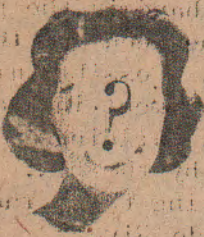

leased ten more quonsets to house the overflowing student population instead of building the beautiful new building (which thank heaven they did). There are two buildings and 6 quonsets in use at the Chugiak location now. That makes nine buildings in use in all, but no matter how many feet or miles separate them, they are all one school. Maybe next year Eagle River will be a separate school, but right now it is not.

That brings up the question of two PTA's for one school. As far as I know, no answers have been received from State or National as to whether they would grant a Charter to a second PTA for the school, but assuming they would, would it be practical right now?

The committee appointed at the October meeting to look into the matter of dividing the PTA felt that if would not be practical at this time and gave all their reasons at the November meeting and offered a Resolution to postpone final decision until the March meeting. The March meeting was chosen because it would be the meeting just prior to the April elections of officers for next year. Then is the decision is to divide, the Eagle River PTA could elect its officers in April for Installation in May. The Resolution could not be voted on at the November meeting for lack of a quorum; but was presented again at the December meeting at which time it passed unanimously.

3. In the matter of the present officers choosing which school they would serve, this would not be possible. They were elected officers of the Chugiak PTA and would serve out their terms as such unless they resigned and left a vacancy to be filled, which I don't think they would do with only two more meetings to go until the election.

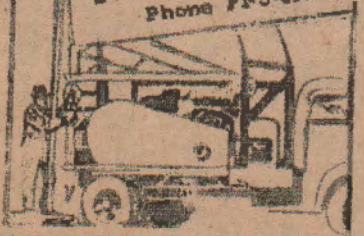

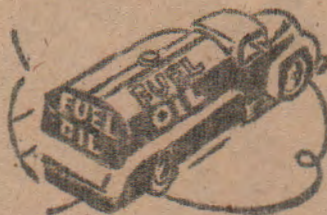

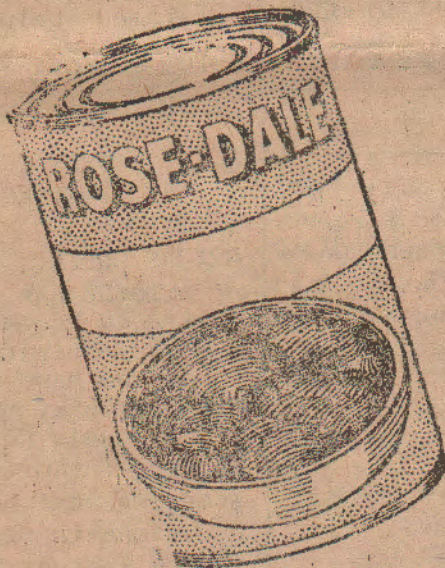
