The store has installed a "Regiscope", a dual lensed camera which photographs both the check and the writer at the same time.

This gives the store a permanent record of every check cashed at the register, which protects not only against those who would pass a bad check, but also offers protection in case checks are ever stolen.

Manager of the Market Basket, Bob Wilson, stated that any and all checks which are now cashed at the store, including those of store employees will be thus recorded.

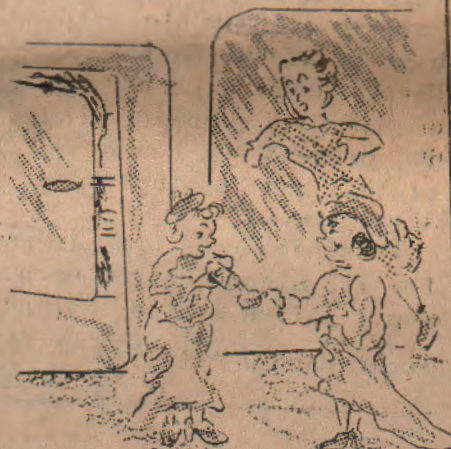

A HARD WEEK ON MOOSE

The past week has been a particularly hard one on moose.

State Police have a record of three separate accidents in which cars driven by local people have come afoul of moose with considerable damage to the vehicles as well as the unfortunate animals.

Weather conditions have caused the moose to venture much more upon the cleared road areas than is customary. The recent spells of warm weather followed by cold have caused a hard crust to form on the snow. The moose break through this crust and the sharp edge is painful to their legs, causing them to seek the relief found on the cleared ground on the roads.

The police have issued repeated warnings to motorists to be on the lookout for moose on the road shoulders these days.

If a moose is seen crossing ahead of the car, it is usually safest to assume that it is a cow, and will be followed by a calf.

One trick that has saved many a motorist from an inevitable clash with a moose is to blow the horn of the car in a series of short blasts.

This will many times cause a moose which is heading across the road to turn and head back the other way.

It is at night, however when most of the accidents occur.

The moose reflect almost no light and are almost impossible to see in the lights of an oncoming car.

There is little advise that can be offered except a caution to keep on the lookout at all times.

After teaching there a year, she attended the University of Alaska at Fairbanks for one summer and then went on to teach at Kodiak.

George and Lois were married in 1957 and continued to live at Kodiak where there two oldest children George Jr and little Lois were born.

The Ante's came to Chugiak in the month of March 1960, having bought a home on Mt. Eklutna Drive at mile 23.

Since moving to this community their family has grown to include little Gracie, who was born last October.

Lois, still teaches school but now only as a substitute.

Her little family keep her pretty much to home now, and she finds little time for the athletic activities which used to keep her busy in the past.

DATE NUT BREAD

(next col.)

3/4 cup chopped nuts
1 cup chopped dates
1 1/2 tsp baking soda
1/4 cup shortening
3/4 cup boiling water
2 eggs
1/2 tsp vanilla
1 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups sifted flour

COMBINE nuts, soda & salt in mixing bowl
ADD shortening & boiling water
ALLOW mixture to stand 15 minutes

STIR to blend
BEAT eggs slightly
ADD vanilla
STIR in sugar and sifted flour

ADD to date mixture
DO NOT OVERMIX

PLACE in greased 9"x3"x5" loaf pan

BAKE 1 hour at 350°
COOL before slicing.

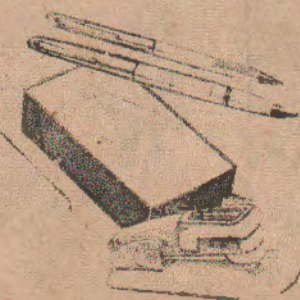

has already turned in a copy of the petition with 119 signatures from this area.

Allen went on to say that he had gotten these signatures in just a few hours, and that of all those who he approached, only four had declined to sign. These four gave as their reasons that two of them did not fully understand the petition, one was a newcomer to the state, and only the fourth felt that the capital should remain in Juneau.

Allen stated that if this was any indication of the feeling of the voters of Chugiak, the outcome of any election on the capital move would, from this area at least be obvious.

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF NEW JERSEY PROMISES NO MORE FALES ADS

NEW JERSEY: The Attorney Gen- (next col.)

(New Jersey)

eral of the State of New Jersey has advised Governor William A. Egan that a Newark, New Jersey, promoter has given assurance he will place no future advertising concerning purported employment opportunities in Alaska.

Similarly, advised Attorney General David D. Furman, assurances have been obtained from the advertising manager of the New York Mirror that it will carry no such advertising in the future.

Furman's assurances came in response to protests by Governor Egan that despite previous assurances that advertising of purported job opportunities would be halted, the advertisements were continuing to appear in various newspapers and national publications.

The New Jersey official said investigation by his office's Consumer Frauds Bureau showed that the advertiser had attempted to cancel existing advertising commitments, but was unable to do so in all cases because of the advance make-up required by the publications.

Egan protested the advertisements, which held out the lure of plentiful employment at high salaries, after being advised that a number of families had found it necessary to appeal to the Salvation Army and other welfare organizations after arriving in Alaska, and finding that promised jobs did not exist.

In addition, the Governor has written to all newspapers, periodicals and to (next col.)

radio stations whose use of the advertisements has been brought to his attention, urging their cooperation to halt future advertisements of this nature.

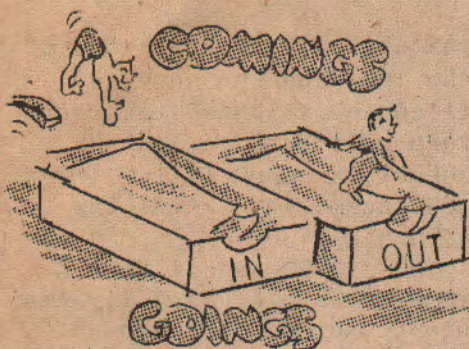

NEW HIGHWAYS ADDED THIS PAST YEAR

JUNEAU: More than 60 miles of new highways, at a cost of over three million dollars, were added to Alaska's Highway system during the 1961 consttuction season, according to R.E. Stickel State Construction Engineer for the Alaska Division of Highways.

Construction operations on an additional 204 miles, costing over \$10,000,000 have been suspended for the winter, but will be rwsumed again in the spring Stickel said.

Listed among the completed projects were nine miles between Clear and Rex and 20 miles between Nenana and Clear, both on the Fairbanks McKinley Park Highway, and seven miles from the Kuzitrin River to Coffee Creek on the Nome-Kougarok Road.

ALIENS MUST REPORT

JUNEAU: Districk Director B. R. Oates of the Immigration and Naturalization Service estimated that 3300 aliens will report their addresses in Alaska during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program.

The immigration official said that 3000 aliens reported their addresses during January 1961.

Oates said that all non-citizens except those in diplomatic status, foreign representative of certain international organizations and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, are required to file the address report.

He added that any alien who wilfully violated the address report requirement may be fined up to \$200, imprisoned for 30 days and deported.

In addition, aliens who are not in the United Stated during January must report their addresses to the service within 10 days after their return.

Address report cards will be available at the I&NS office and local U.S. Post Offices.

TAX FORMS TO BE MAILED SOON

JUNEAU: Commissioner of Revenue Peter Gatz, has announced that the revised 1961 Alaska Net Income Tax and School Tax Return will be mailed to all Alaska taxpayers, within a few days.

The amended school tax law passed during the 1960 legislature became effective January 1, 1961.

School tax withheld by an employer will be shown as a part of an annual income tax and school tax withholding statement, and may be claimed as a credit on the new return to be filed on or before

April 15, 1962.

Self-employed persons, Federal employees and others who were not subject to the school (next col.)

tax withholding provisions of the law, and who have not filed an estimated tax return will declare and pay school tax when filing the new income and school tax return.

The \$10.00 school tax is imposed on all gainfully employed persons 19 years of age or over, except unemployed married women, persons in the active military service of the United States, paupers, insane persons and persons permanently disabled from earning a living.

Commissioner Gantz stated that under the new procedure the Department of Revenue does not issue school tax receipts.

School tax withheld by employers will be shown on annual withholding receipts. Federal employees and self-employed persons include school tax with declarations of estimated tax during 1961 or on their final return.

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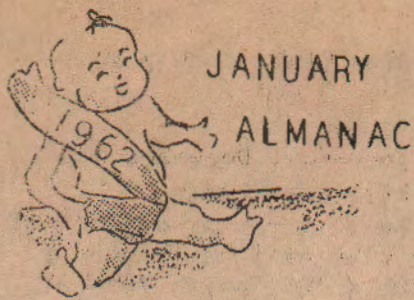

evening. When King returned about half hour later he was bleeding profusely from an ugly wound below his eye.

Initial examination did not indicate what type of weapon had been used to shoot the dog; however the next day, Robinson was able to follow the trail of blood to a home approximately three quarters of a mile from his property.

There several juveniles admitted to having shot the dog with the arrow, however, they claimed that they had been target practicing and had shot King accidentally.

The accident occurred sometime between 10:30 and 11pm.
