STEERING COMMITTEE TO STUDY LOCAL PROBLEMS

CHUGIAK: A steering committee, to study local problems in relation to the formation of a borough was appointed at the general meeting held last Thursday at the Chugiak School.

The propose of this group is to make a study of the costs for schools, roads, etc. of this area in relation to the ability to produce the money to take care of these costs. Also to establish a more definite tac basis then the rough estimate which has been quoted.

This group hopes to determine what is the smallest area which Chugiak can afford which will also afford the area the maximum representation and in that way arrive at what might be called an ideal size borough.

Members of this committee are William Kincannon, Wallace Randall, Ralph Anderson, Richard Stevens, Phillip Lamaroux and Elmer Richardson.

SOAKED CHILDREN WAIT IN VAIN FOR BUSES

CHUGIAK: Shivering and soaked to the skin, students of the Chugiak and Eagle River schools waited in vain for the buses on Monday morning.

The youngsters went dutifully to the bus stops when the customary announcement of "no school due to icy roads" was not given over local radio stations.

Superintendent of Chugiak schools, Chuck Smith had checked the roads the night before and had not found them in sufficiently icy condition to warrant cancelling school the following day. However, by morning the conditions had worsened to the point that the bus drivers hesitated to make the runs without a definite word from Smith.

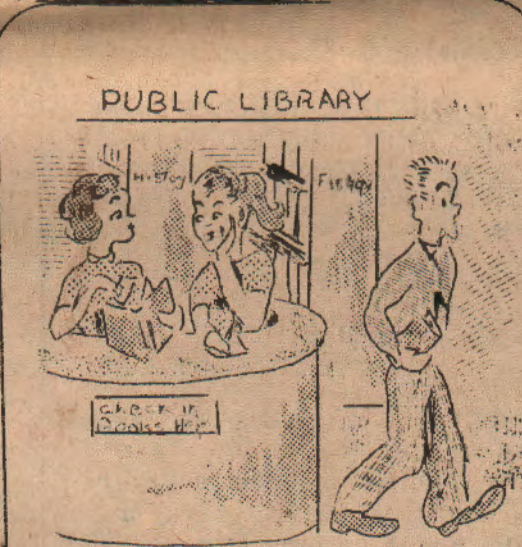

COOK FOR FEBRUARY LOUISE JUHNKE

BUTTERMILK PIE (makes 2 pies)

MEASURE AND MIX:

- 3 tbs. flour
3 cups sugar
pinch of salt

STIR INTO ABOVE MIXTURE:

- 1 1/2 cups cultured buttermilk
2 eggs (beaten)
2 tsp vanilla

MIX thoroughly

POUR into two unbaked pie crusts.

SPRINKLE top generously with chopped nuts.

BAKE 10 minutes in 400° oven

REDUCE heat to 350°

BAKE 30 to 40 minutes!

CHAPTER III: In the early days of Chugiak History, travel on the Glenn Highway, sometimes known as the Palmer Highway, was extremely light.

Park's were contemplating a business at what is now known as Parksville, and they conducted a traffic survey to determine the feasibility of their plan. During a nice warm Sunday in spring, they counted as high as twenty cars in one hour. This, I believe was on a holiday.

During the cold winter days one did not pass a stalled car on the highway, but stopped with an offer to help. The unfortunate might be your neighbor and he might be there without help for more than an hour.

In the winter, the narrow trail, optimistically called a highway, was as slick as it is now, without the advantage, most of the time of gravel.

In the spring it was plagued by "frost boils," great puddles of soupy mud with no apparent bottom.

One of the largest of these which appeared every year was at mile 18, right in front of the present Gib Reid residence.

One simply hit these full force and with the prayer that they would be able to get through without hanging up. To stop or stall was simply to sit and wait for someone with a long tow line to come along and snake one out.

Summers meant clouds of choking dust. It was always advisable to space driving so that two cars were not traveling together.

A great deal of aid to travelers through Chugiak were the trucks of Mielke Way and Matanuska Maid. Drivers of these trucks always stopped to offer assistance if needed.

One extremely windy, slippery night (famaliar?) a Matanuska Maid truck spent over an hour helping cars up Fire Lake Hill.
