## Pistol Fells Moose

EAGLE RIVER: A shot fired from a 44 caliber pistol felled a charging cow moose last Monday morning.

James A. Hayden of the Artillery Road had been walking in the woods photographing moose when an enraged cow charged him.

Hayden managed to dodge the animal, and fired point blank at her with the pistol which he had been carrying with him.

Although the shot killed the cow, her yearling calf refused to leave the area, and the State Police had to be called to stand off the orphan while the Department of Fish and Game dressed out the carcass.

The State trooper reported that the calf is still in that vicinity and might be dangerous. He suggested that children not be permitted to wander around in that vicinity.

WASILLA: Robert Vroman of Wasilla, spokesman for the Matanuska Valley-Susitna Borough Boundary Committee today denied that they plan to petition that the boundary of that borough be set at Peters Creek.

Rumors concerning the Peters Creek Division had been causing considerable concern to residents of that community as well as to those residing in sister communities of the greater Chugiak Area.

Vroman stated that the rumor had probably been started by mention of the fact that Peters Creek had been recommended by the State School board as a division between school districts.

He went on to say that when the petition is presented for approval it would indicate the Knik River as the borough boundary line.

George Allen, Democratic Chairman for the Chugiak precinct expressed considerable relief at Vromans denial.

Allen said that it would have been a tragedy if the recommendation of the school board had been followed.

"Palmer has the highest school taxes in the entire state" Allen stated. "The children in Peters Creek would have to ride thirty miles every day on a school bus, or else their parents would be forced pay tuition in order for them to continue attending the Chugiak School. Also, they would not be able to use the Chugiak High School when it is built."

The lease, which will run until October of this year, will be on the basis of 30% of the net of any receipts to go to CBA. After October, the Club will again meet with the CBA Board of Directors and on the basis of the first years receipts a permanent lease will be effected.

The lease will include the use of the Carnival Hall and any of the other buildings on the grounds, with the Motor Cycle Club to stand the expense of any heat or lights when the Hall is in use.

The Club plans to lay out a "TT" Type track and hold a number of races, with one big race this summer which they plan to have competition from all over the states.

The track will in no way interfere with the Little League Ball Park, and it will not be on the highway side of the grounds at all.

The grounds and hall will still be available for community use when the club is not using them.

Work on the track will begin as soon as weather permits.

SIFT TOGETHER:

- 1 cup flour

- 1 tsp soda
- 1/2 tsp salt

ADD to dry ingredients:

- 1 beaten egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 tsp almond flavoring

POUR in:

- 1 can (303 size) fruit cocktail juice and all.

MIX quickly

POUR into greased 7x12 pan

SPRINKLE top with:

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup nut meats (pecan, walnut or filbert)

BAKE at 325° for 50 minutes

## CHUGIAK IS FIFTEEN By Leslie F. Petrow

CHAPTER 15: February of 1947 slipped into March much as it is doing this year. Spring came on with nice warm days and with it came the beginning of the flow of settlers that was to increase and continue.

As soon as the snow was gone the Fetrow house began to go up at its present location. At that time, Mile 19 was 1/2 mile farther north than it is now.

Vernon Haik started a small cabin at mile 20, where he later started Spring Creek Lodge. Fred and Dorothy Hasekoester took a site adjoining that of Verne and just north of him. Hal Noggle settled his homestead on the shore of Upper Fire Lake and built the house that now is the residence of the Tom Towne family.

The first fire in the community occurred on the 4th of July when a fire-cracker thrown from a passing automobile lighted oil-soaked dry grass around the fuel drums for the Diesel generator at Fire Lake Lodge. In order to prevent the drums from exploding, holes were shot in them. All the men in the area turned out to fight the fire and it was confined to the brush and moss on the lake side of the highway, covering little more than one acre.

Hal Noggle brought his D7 tractor down but the fire was under control by the time he arrived and it was not used.

Cloyce and Justine Parks began construction on the big log dining room that had long been planned. It was built just north of the frame store now known as Parksville, but burned to the ground a few years ago.

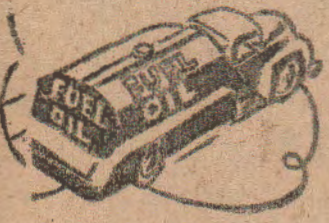

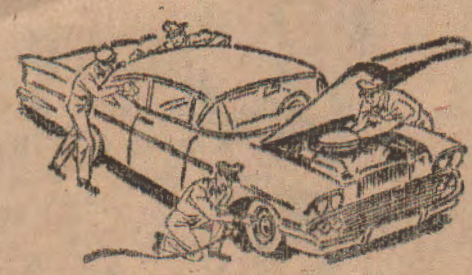
