DROPPED

CHUGIAK: Plans to institure emergency dog control measures here by the Department of Health have been dropped following an investigation by John R. Kuhn, District Sanitarian.

In a report of Bruce D. Adams, Regional Sanitarian, Kuhn stated that he personally saw no signs of loose or roving dogs in either Chugiak or at the Eagle River, School.

He felt that instead of ravaging packs of semi-wild and hungry dogs roving the area, there were instead large numbers of reasonably well-fed pets which followed the neighborhood children to school in the morning.

Kuhn felt that since this is an unincorporated area with no functioning local legal entity, laws, regulations, enforcement processes or personnel; it is his opinion that those persons concerned should first attempt correction of the dog nuisance problem through their school system, magistrates' court, state police or civil suit before any emergency public health proclamation be considered.



CHANGE IN MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSE EXPIRATION DATE PROPOSED

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan today asked the Alaska Legislature to change the expiration date of motor vehicle registrations.

Under existing law, registrations now expire December 31st of each year and new license plates must be displayed on all vehicles by February 28.

The bill transmitted to the House for introduction, would change the expiration date to March I and permit display of the previous year's license plates until May 31st.

Egan said the present February 28th deadline occurs at at time when substantial number of Alaska's workers are unemployed. He said the proposed bill "would lessen the financial impact on those who are without an adequate source of income during the winter months."

PETERS CREEK FUEL CHUGIAK IS FIFTEEN By Les Fetrow

7 February 1947 the community of Chugiak was born, though it did not even have a name at that time.

Residents along the highway gathered together in the home of Paul Swanson to form a community club, whose purpose was to promote the community which was sure to grow here and to provide a social group.

Present at that first meeting were Paul and Margaret Swanson and their daughter Martha and son Steve, Cloyce and Justine Parks, Henning (Johnny) and Ruth Johnson and their daughtets Gail and Sherrie, Jim and Marie Mc-Dowell and son Bruce, Simon Media and his wife Bobbie, and the latest arrivals on the highway Les and Dottie Fetrow and son Larry.

Those not present but living on the highway at the time included the owners of the old Fire Lake Lodge, the Pippels at mile 14, and the Glenn Briggs at mile 13. Dale Briggs was building his home but had not yet moved into the community.

At this first meeting the club was formed with Cloyce Parks as President. A committee was appointed to draw up by-laws for the club, which was to meet again within a month to adopt the by-laws as written. Refreshments were provided by the hosts, the Swansons.

There was no electricity in any home at that time, nor were there telephones. The only business along the highway was the old Fire Lake Lodge. Most of the homes were within the area of Mile 19. Traffic was extremely in light, limited to not more of than 3 cars per hour on a contain busy Sunday afternoon.

The Glenn Highway, more commonly known as the Palmer Highway, was hardly more than a two lane road, with gravel surface. It crossed Eagle River about half-mile upstream from its present crossing, came down what is now known as Homestead Road and wound serpent-like up Fire Lake hill, passing close to Upper Fire Lake, but not within view of Lower Fire Lake, which was concealed by the dense growth of brush. 
