Every once in a while it becomes necessary to discuss the feature known as "Letters to the Editor" and to once again make plain the COURIERS position to anything printed in that column.

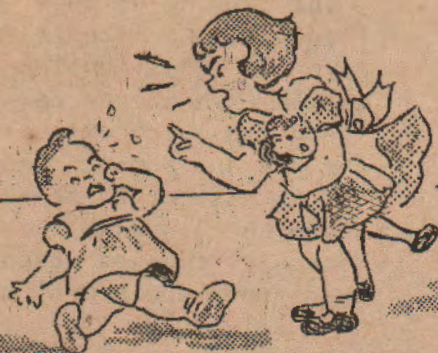
In all newspapers and magazines which permit their readers to air their views in such a column the letters published therein usually deal with controversial subjects and the writers sometimes express themselves

quite warmly.

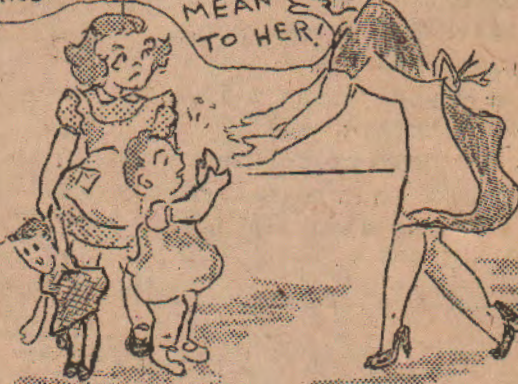

COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR MARCH
MARY LOU BRIGGS

For her final recipe, Mary Lou give us a Hearty One Dish Meal, which finds a tasty way to use those last few scraps of that Sunday Ham.

HAM-CORNBREAD DINNER RING

FILLING:

- 1 pound ground cooked ham (2 cups)
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 tsp prepared mustard
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce

DOUGH:

- 1 cup Corn meal (white or yellow)
- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 3/4 cups milk

SAUCE:

- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 2/3 cups milk
- 1 1/2 cups defrosted frozen peas

COMBINE all ingredients for filling

SIFT dry ingredients for dough

CUT in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs

ADD milk and

MIX lightly until dry ingredients are dampened (add more milk if necessary to make soft dough)

TURN out on a lightly floured board and knead a few seconds.

ROLL to form 11"x16" rectangle.

SPREAD with ham filling

ROLL up like jelly roll

SEAL edges

PLACE on cooky sheet

CURVE to look like "horse shoe"

MAKE 12 cuts with scissors

about 1 1/4 in apart 2/3 of way into roll.

TURN each section on its side.

BAKE in hot 425° oven 20-25 minutes

SERVE hot with sauce

SAUCE:

COMBINE soup and milk

ADD peas

COOK 5 minutes stirring frequently.

CHAPTER VIII: Scouting activities in Chugiak recently prompts a review of Scouting in this history of the community.

Boy Scout activity began with a meeting at the home of Dale Briggs in 1951. By this time the community was only four years old.

Among those at the meeting were Dale Briggs, Bill Cairns, "Chick" LeDeaux, Vern Haik, Bill Stephens, Les Fetrow and Walt Williams of the Scout office.

Dale Briggs became the Committee Chairman. The Chugiak Community Club sponsored the Troop and their Institutional Representative was Les Fetrow. "Chick" LeDeaux was appointed Scoutmaster with Glenn Briggs, Mickey Briggs, Bill Cairns Jr., Dennis Christian and Jerry D. Fly as scouts.

Cub Scouts were a Den of the Salvation Army Pack of Anchorage. They included boys from Eagle River to Eklutna.

The first Girl Scout Troop was started by Dorothy Steeby in Birchwood. This troop later became the troop now under the leadership of Elsie Oberg. The Brownie Troop was sponsored by the Chugiak Homemakers Club, with Cleda Stephens as leader.

In 1956, the Boy Scout Troop was split with the Eagle River Troop still sponsored by the Chugiak Community Club. In 1958 the Community Club was dissolved and no sponsor has since been found for that troop. The new Chugiak Troop was sponsored in its first year by the Chugiak VFW Post. After that first year the sponsorship was passed to the Chugiak Methodist Church, where it remains. At the same time, the Salvation Army dropped the Chugiak Den of Cubs and the Chugiak Methodist Church assumed the sponsorship of a Pack.

Since the beginning of Scouting within the community, there have been Brownie Troops and Girl Scout Troops established in Eagle River in addition to those in Chugiak, but there still no interested, capable sponsor of Boy Scouts in Eagle River.

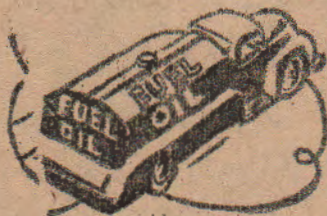

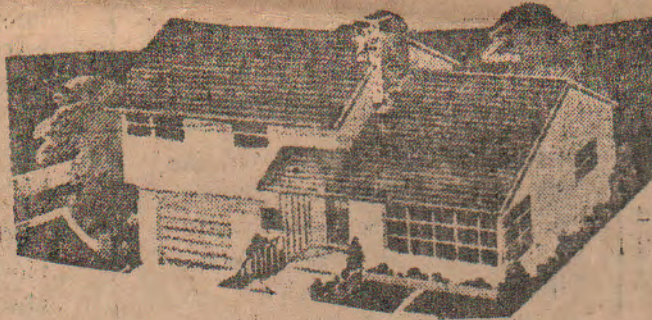

these before any further action is taken in changing the borough law.

The first resolution deals with amending the law to give more equitable apportionment of the borough assembly to sections outside of first class cities.

The second resolution urges that the law be changed to a requirement of 25% of the voters in each precinct as opposed to 25% of the voters in each area outside incorporated cities be required to petition for the formation of a borough.

The third resolution asks that the mandatory date for the formation of a borough be extended from July 1, of 1963 to July 1 of 1965.

The final resolution deals with Sec. 6.10 of Article VI of Chapter 146, H.B. 17, which concerns the formation of sections within the borough.

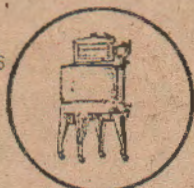

GREEN THUMB HINT



Time has arrived for many of us to begin our indoor plantings for later transplanting to garden or greenhouse.

One way to hurry the germination of seeds by several days to a week, is to plant the seeds in plastic cups or small flats and secure a sheet of plastic wrap (such as Handy Wrap or Saran) over the top with a rubber band.

Do not remove this until the plants have appeared above the dirt and have grown until they are touching the surface of the wrap.

This miniature greenhouse keeps the small plants in an atmosphere that is moist and of even temperature and most conducive to rapid germination.

1962 SPORT FISHING REGS NOW AVAILABLE

JUNEAU: The 1962 Sport Fishing regulations Pamphlet is available for general distribution, Alex H. McRea, Director, Sport Fish Division of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game announced today.

Copies of this pamphlet may be obtained from any of the Department of Fish and Game Offices or license issuing agents.

The 1962 edition contains several changes which are designed to simplify its use. The State is divided into seven areas. Each area is listed separately with its complete fresh and salt water regulations. In the centerfold is a map of the State which outlines the various areas.

The pamphlet, which is light green in color, was illustrated by two of the Sport Fish Division biologists; Jeremy Sexsmith of Kodiak and Edward Cramer of Anchorage.

The changes in the regulations for sport fishing are outlined below. The only areas with no changes are Kodiak-Afognak Islands and the Arctic-Yukon-Kuskokwim drainages.

A new daily fresh water bag limit for Southeastern has been added consisting of 2 king salmon and 5 silver salmon daily over 20 inches in length.

The smelt (hooligan) limit in Turnagain Arm is now 20 lbs. or 200 smelt, whichever is least restrictive, and they may now be taken with hook and line throughout the state.
