Parents Meet To Discuss Low Grades

ALLEN URGES PROTEST AGAINST BOROUGH PETITION

OLD CHUGIAK: A group of concerned parents met last Saturday afternoon with two members of the advisory school board to discuss what they considered to be a high incidence of failures in arithmetic among seventh and eighth grade students at the Chugiak School.

Although the meeting was presided by two of the advisory school board members (Gib Reid and Walter Pippel) there was some question as to whether this would constitute an official meeting of the board, since superintendent Chuck Smith had not been able to attend due to the basketball tournament in Palmer.

Both Reid and Pippel agreed that the regulations governing the meetings of the advisory school board were not clearly defined and were open to question.

The meeting was an orderly discussion with the parents trying to determine what factors might be contributing to the poor grades among the students.

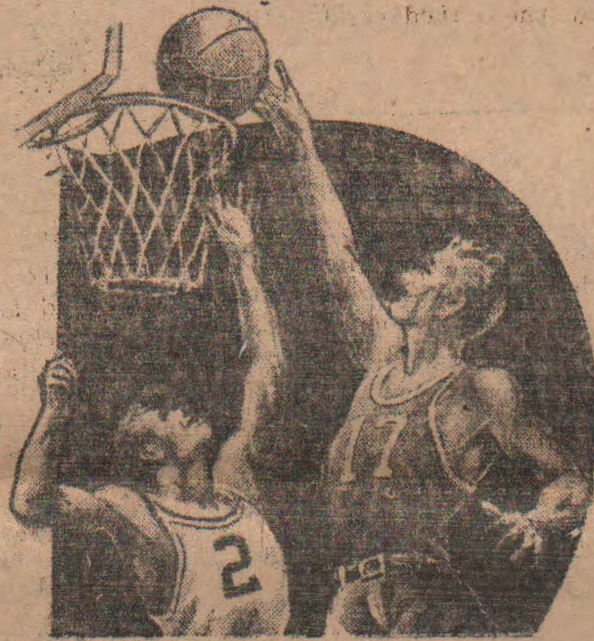

Allen stated that the extension of two years granted last week by the legislature was the reprieve that residents of Chugiak needed to give them a chance to try again for a state built high school.

"Once we become a part of a borough" said Allen, all chance of a High School from State Funds ceases."

"We probably would not get a high school here in less than ten years and then it would all come out of our own pockets".

Allen went on to say that with the possibility of one or more local representatives being elected to the next State legislature and with a new administration in Juneau, he feels that the chances of having Chugiak High School included in the 1963 budget are excellent.

"However", he added, "if we go into a borough, then our last chance is gone."

Allen felt that a delay of two years in the forming of the borough would save the people of this district thousands of dollars in taxes.

Allen felt that everyone who possibly could should attend the meeting to be held in Anchorage this coming Saturday and protest the forming of the borough at this time.

"If enough of us speak out" Allen said "they will have to listen."

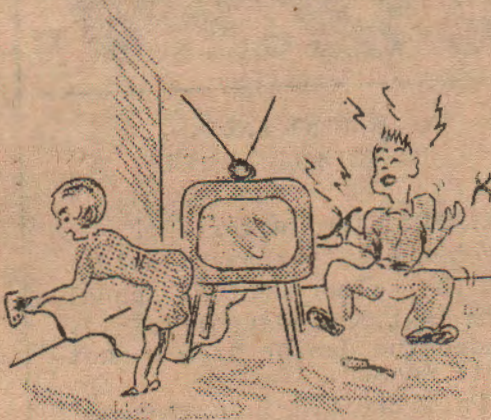

The Cook of the Month

Our cook for March is a quiet unassuming little woman who has seen more Alaskan adventure than most of us dream of.

Mary Lou Briggs came to this state in 1931 to join her mother who operated a string of trading posts in the northernmost part of Alaska.

Mary Lou had just finished school, and when her mother wrote that she was lonely, she hopped a freighter and joined her mother at Kotzebue.

It was while she was living there that she met Glenn who was Unit Manager for the Federal reindeer herds in that area.

They were married and continued to live in Kotzebue until 1940 and then were transferred to Teller and then to Nome.

They left Alaska during World War II, returning to Washington State. However, after the war they again returned to Alaska, but this time not to the far north, but to Chugiak, an area which they previously looked over and liked the looks of.

It was 1943 when they settled in this part of the State. They had brought a small herd of hogs with them and began a hog ranch on a 160 acre homestead which they purchased in the Eagle River area. It is this same ranch which they later sold to the John Vanovers that is still in operation there.

Mary Lou and Glenn were instrumental in the development of that part of the community, building many lovely modern homes and then selling them. They are presently engaged in operation the Eagle River heights subdivision, a modern development complete with water (next col)

and street lights.

They were also instrumental in the establishment of the Eagle River Shopping Center.

The Briggs are presently living in their newest home, not yet completed but showing promise of being a real dream house with a high vaulted living room surrounded with picture windows and a breathtaking view of the Chugach Mountains. At present their livestock consists of an aging Pomeranian named Rascal.

Mary Lou has helped build every one of the five different houses that the Briggs have occupied in Eagle River, it is she who does all of the finish work.

In the community Mary Lou has also been active. She worked at all of the Chugiak Spring Carnivals and is one of the original members of the Chugiak Belles.

One would not expect her to have much time for hobbies, but Mary Lou has always been interested in Ceramics, and

has made many lovely original pieces which she fires in her own kiln.

Recently she has taken up mosaic tile and has made some beautiful trays and a coffee table combining the tile with ceramic leaf patterns which she made herself using Alaskan foliage for her patterns.

Last year she conducted a class in mosaic tile work for some of her friends.

Mary Lou is one of our real pioneers in this community, and the rest of us owe many of the conveniences we now enjoy to her efforts and those of her husband Glenn. It is with great pleasure that we will share her kitchen with her this month.

RAW VEGETABLE RELISH

- 1 small head of cabbage
- 5 or 6 carrots
- 6 small onions
- 3 large green peppers
- 3 red bell peppers (nice for added color)

CHOP all these vegetables

MIX in ½ cup salt

LET STAND 3 hours

DRAIN well

ADD:

- 4 cups vinegar
- 1½ cups sugar
- 2 Tbs celery seed
- 2 tbs mustard seed
- 8 small red chili peppers (approximately)

MIX well

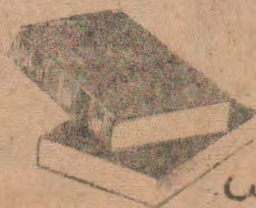

The PTA is purchasing the Cookies for re-sale.

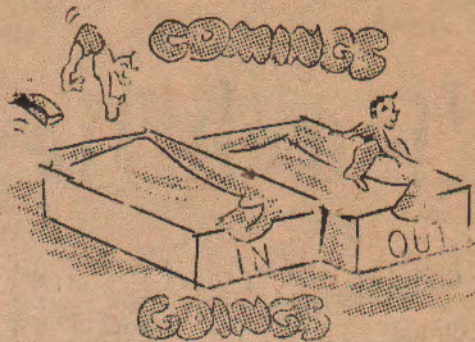
ACQUAINTANCE COFFEE TO LAUNCH BOOK DRIVE
