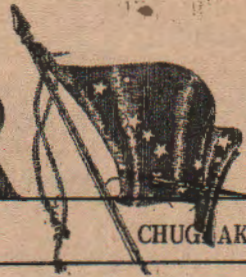

ED WILLIS IS NEW SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER

EAGLE RIVER: Ed Willis, of Eagle River was elected to the Chugiak Advisory School Board last Monday at the annual election held at the Eagle River School.

Willis was chosen over a slate consisting of four candidates by the eighty eight voters present.

Other candidates for the seat were Mrs. Jack (Jo) Frankfourth, Charles Carter, and Louis Zib.

Willis, who is at present President of the Chugiak PTA and Co-Chairman of the OCHS Executive Committee will be replacing Walter Pippel who had drawn the one year term at the election in 1961. Willis will serve a three year term.

Upon his election, Willis stated that he would work primarily for the welfare of the Children of Chugiak and secondly for the schools.

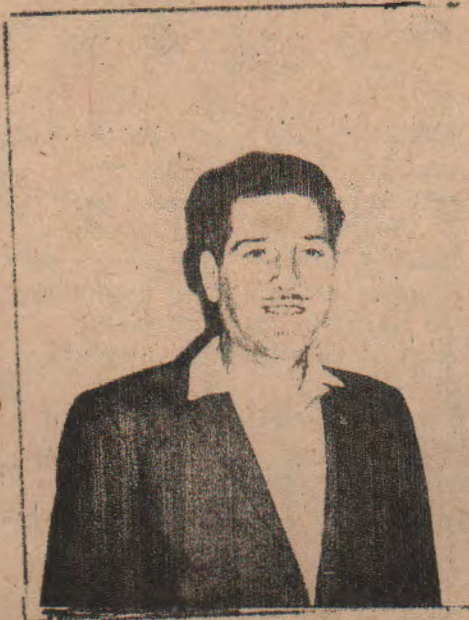
SPEED LIMIT TO BE INCREASED AT CHUGIAK SCHOOL

CHUGIAK: The present speed limit on the Glenn Highway at the Chugiak School is being increased from 25 mph to 45 mph, according to Fred F. Kohls, Traffic Engineer of the Traffic and Urban Section of the Division of Highways.

In a letter to Chugiak Superintendent Chuck Smith, Kohls stated that the increase was being made in accordance with a request from Captain E.L. Mayfield of the Alaska State Police.

JUNEAU: The first tangible victory for Operation Chugiak High School was achieved yesterday with the approval by both houses of the State Legislature of Governor Egans proposed bonding issue which includes one million two hundred thousand dollars for the construction of a High School in the Chugiak Area.

This bonding issue will be on the ballot of the general election next November, and if approved would assure the beginning of the construction of the school in the summer of 1963.

OLD CHUGIAK: Mrs. Irma Thomas, of Eagle River, reported that several items were missing from two cabins which she had recently purchased.

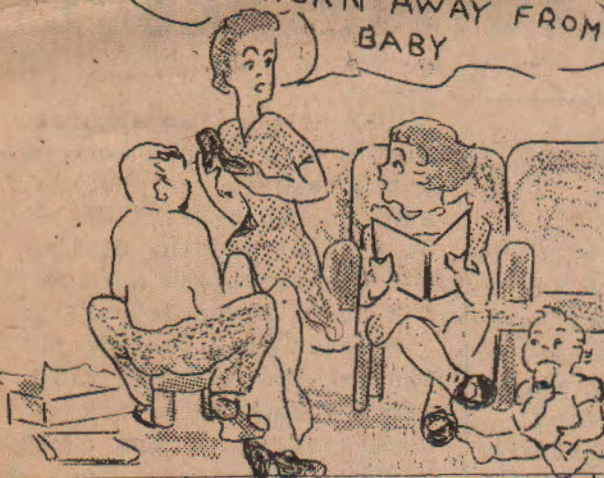

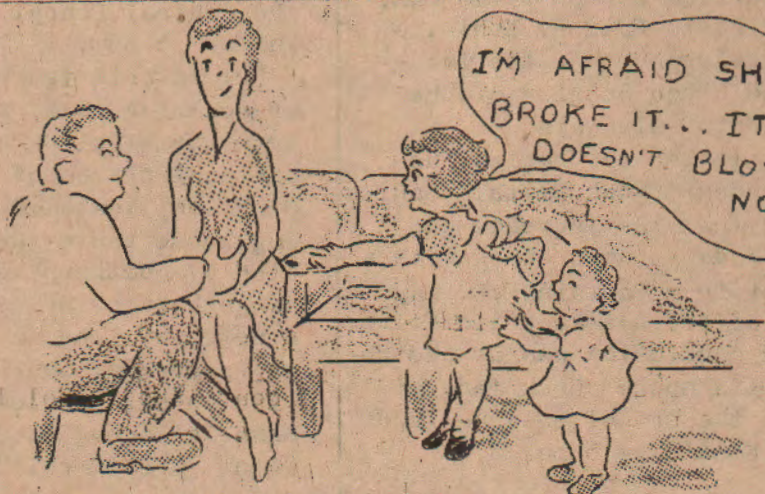

Committee in compiling the OCHS report, and the over five hundred letters written to Governor Egan by the residents of Chugiak urging him to include a high school for this area in his budget.

A direct outcome of Willis' timely trip to Juneau was the including in the budget of \$75,000 for the advanced planning for Chugiak High School. This could apply to the design of the building, land acquisition etc.

With the approval of this budget by both the house and the senate, Willis feels it will not be long before steps toward laying the groundwork on the school design could begin and that this phase would not have to be delayed until the bonds are approved by the voters.

Willis stated that the "beach-head has been established, now it is up to us to move up the rest of the way."

The following sections of the bylaws of the Matanuska Electric Association, Inc. are noted here for the information of consumer-members intending to attend or vote at the 1962 Annual membership meeting, which will be held at 8:00 o'clock p.m. April 14, 1962, at the Palmer Central School Auditorium, Palmer Alaska.

- 1. Article 11, sections 5 and 6 prohibit voting by proxy. These sections are in accord with the provisions of Chapter 93 of Sessions Laws of Alaska, 1959, part 5.
2. Article 11, section 7 states that a person who is an owner, officer or employee of a business which is a member of MEA, can vote for such member but must have written authority signed by the governing authority of the business, or a duly empowered officer.

Copies of the ByLaws are available at MEA in Palmer, and collection agencies in Eagle River and Wasilla.

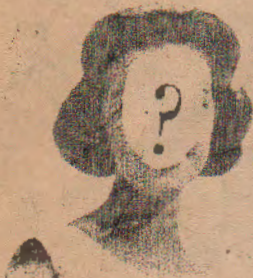

and it was felt that the present 25mph speed limit is unnecessary and unenforcible.

Kohls stated further in his letter that the portable school signs which had been placed in the middle of the road by the Chugiak VFW were in violation of a regulation which governs State Highways which participate in the Federal Aid program.

Smith was requested to remove these speed sentry from the middle of the road and requested not to place them at any location adjacent to the road that they could be seen by approaching motorists and be interpreted by them as a device for controlling or regulating traffic.

Kohls stated that the state intends to install standard school crossing markings at the Chugiak School at such time that road conditions permit, he also stated that the 45 mph sign posts will be installed at the earliest possible time. He said that at present frozen ground prevents the installation of such signs.

CHURCH BROKEN IN TO

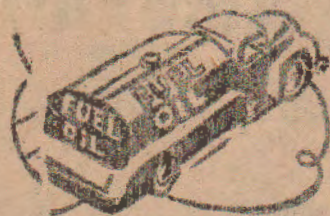

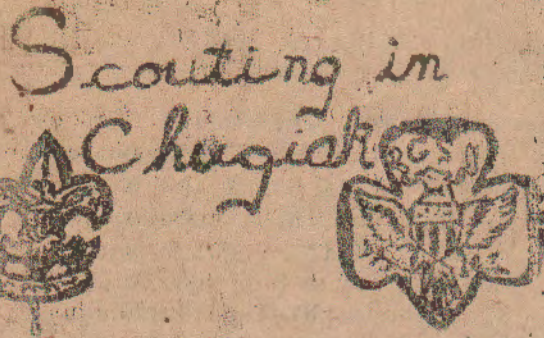
POPULAR RESTURANT TO REOPEN

WHEREAS continuously increased traffic since the investigation of 16 June, 1961 increases the hazards and the opportunities for a tragedy to occur and

WHEREAS this investigation was conducted at a time when school had been recessed for the summer, and

WHEREAS the community of Chugiak-Eagle River disagrees strongly with the conclusions drawn from this investigation, and

WHEREAS both organizations and individuals feel that these signs, in themselves a local effort to promote safety have a positively decelerating effect on motorists passing through the zone;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Chugiak-Eagle River PTA Association, meeting in joint session at Eagle River on 10 April 1962 respectfully but strongly urge you to reconsider the request made by Mr. Fred Kohls on 22 March 1962 and instead authorize continued use of the traffic sentrys and

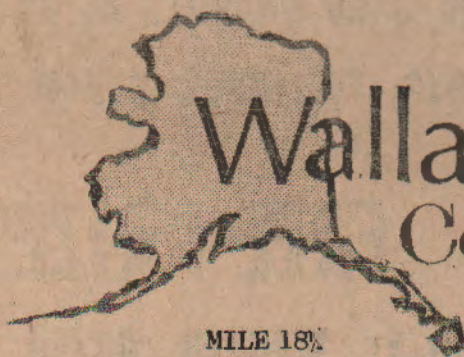

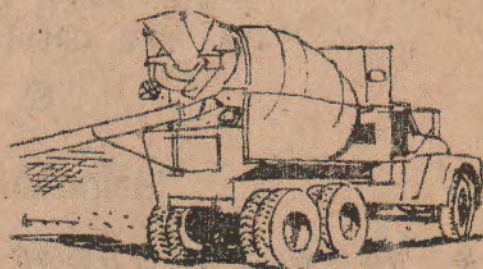

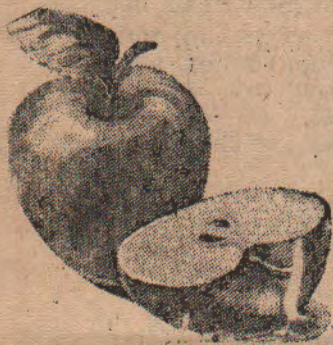
