I would like to introduce you to my burough. One of the first principles of government is that all powers of government are de-rived from the people. Where you have people you have gover-nment. Therefore you have to have people to administer rowhave people to administer government to.

Where there are people there are problems. In order to solve problems people give up their individual rights to solve these problems to a group or body to solve their problems for them.

When the majority of the people have the same problem to be solved, they find it more econ-omical to solve them through a governing body, than each one solving his own problems. This b nding together to solve problems of common nature is the beginning of government.

Factors which mate it eas-ier to form a workable gov-ernment that is economical are; (1) A distinct geograph-ical community. (2) A commun-ity socially and economically related. (3) A community that has a transportation medium, such as roads, streets and freeways. (4) A community that has population sufficiently arge to provide economic base to support its government. Nost Alaskan communities are distinct areas composed of small cities with an area im-meciately surrounding these cities. The Cook Inlet Basin Factors which mate it eas-

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our friends from the Peters Creek, Birchwood, Chugiak and Eagle River areas who made the trip to Palmer last Saturday evening to attend the membership meeting and election to the Board Of Directors of the Natanuska Electric Association. It was the largest turnout we' ve seen there. We didn't elect a local man to the Board, but we did make a better showing than we have since the amendment bf the Bylaws to eliminate proxy voting.

ment bb the by the synthesis of proxy voting. In retrospect, it is interesting to analyze the results of the election. From the outset it was apparent that it was a battle between the members of our area and the members of the Sutton area. On the first ballot the Sutton area received a total of 268 votes, our candidates received a total of 208 votes and all other areas a total of 126 votes.

This being an elimination of the low man on each ballot until a majority is voted for two candidates, it was voted from the floor to drop the 5 candidates receiving the lowest number of votes and to vote on the remaining 4 candidates on the second ballot. The results of this count showed that Mr. Tucker of Sutton bad received 167 votes, Mr. Mayr of Sutton 139, Virgil Flint 137 and John Steeby (cont_page 8 col 2)

is the only area in Alaska where large rural areas exist. Areas composed of cities and immediate surburgs have problems of the same nature.

This is the thought behind our present Burough Act. The burough proposes to solve com mon problems by exercising regulations in the area outside and inside the city with one sweep. This is what is meant by areawide problems being solved by areawide powers.

Problems which are not common to the city and its suburbs are regulated separately. In order to solve areawide problems the burough act proposes a burough assembly composed of city and suburban members. Problems peculiar to the city would be solved by their city council.

Problems which are peculiar to the suburbs are solved by the burough assambly.

The organized burough is usually known as area government. It may have within its boundries cities, its suburbs and in some cases rural areas beyond the suburbs.

pare for the second phase and total success. We are now "or the beach", so to s eak and making preparations to move inland to a successful conslusion, A HIGH SCHOOL IN OUR AREA!

Just where do we stand today? As a direct result of the OCHS organization, the many dedicated individuals connected with it, and the individual efforts of every citizen who wrote Gov ernor Egan a letter; we now stand to gain our objective, a High School, construction beginning in 1963, the moment Governor Egan's recommended school construction bond issue passes in the general election, Nov. 6, 1962.

Also, as a result of a member of the OCHS group appearing before the House Finance committee in Juneau, \$75,000 was included in Governor Egans budget for Chugiak School plan ning.

However, all of our efforts would have been in vain had not our petitions fell on receptive ears. The moment the Department of Education and Governor Egan were convinced of our need for a High School the wheels were set in motion by the administration to fulfill thie great need.

In a telegram dated March 8 1962 to the OCHS group, Gov(OCHS)

"Bond proposal offered by me to Legislature today included \$1,200,000 for construction of Chugiak High School, classroom additions at Eagle River School A recommendation made by Governor to the Legislature does not always mean that the Legislature will pass favorably on the matter. Today, however we can say that this Legislature did pass favorably on the recommendations, and it goes before the people on November 6 for their acceptance or re-

jection. During this past year the OCHS group also met on many occasions with the Legislators from this area who were also convinced of our need for a High School. As a result of these meetings, and by way of fulfilling a promise to the group, Bruce Kendall, Minority Leader in the House of Repres-entatives, introduced H.B. 455 "An act appropriating the sum of \$1,200,000 for the construction of a High School in Chugiak.

The strategy used by the Min-ority Leader in its introduct-ion, it's timing, and the fact that it was a direct approp-riation out of general funds at a time when most Legislat-ors, including the Minority Leader and members of his party, were trying to limit the size of the State Budget all combined to make it impossible to get out of the Finance Com-mittee and on the floor of the House for action where it's chances for survival were all but nil.

In fact, the day the OCHS



representative flew into Juneau, March 31, to try and get this Bill out of Committee it was too late for it to have been transmitted to the Senate even if the House had reacted favorably. A quick determination was made by the OCHS representative before going before the Fin-ance Committee that this bill was already a "dead horse", and deslite the Minority Leader's recommendation that pressure be brought on Governor Egan to get this Bill out of Committee. the decision was made to pursue the only logical route open, urge passage of the bond issue proposal. The \$75,000 for sch-ool planning was also included in the budget by the Finance Committee at this time. This came as a very pleasand and unexpected surprise. Because it is now a matter of

public record let us examine the record and see how our Legislat-ors reacted to the Governor's Bond proposal and the Gover-nors Budget as it came out of the Finance Committee, which in-cluded \$75,000 for Chugiak Sch-

ool planning. It was vitally important to Chugiak that the following measures be passed on favorably. A NO vote can only be interpreted as a vote against the Chugiak High School.





The first of these sessions will begin on April 29th and anyone interested in taking part is to be there at 2pm with their dog on leash.


