CAR HITS CHILD AT BUS STOP

PETERS CREEK: Six year old Ginger Lee Mackey is in fair condition in the 5040th Air Force Hospital, where she was rushed following an accident at her school bus stop at mile 22.

The bus was approaching, when Ginger darted out into the path of a car driven by John W. Hughes, 17, of Birchwood.

Hughes told the state police that he had seen the bus approaching, and then the child appeared in front of his car, he swerved in an attempt to miss her, but was unable to do so.

Ginger was underneath the Hughes car when he came to a stop, but the State Trooper was unable to determine whether or not the wheel had passed over her body.

An army Major who was traveling with a convoy which arrived at the scene of the accident almost immediately is credited with bringing prompt medical assistance to the scene.

He immediately radioed for an Army Helicopter and Doctor, and while waiting for them to arrive, he kept the injured child warm and comfortable.

A call for an ambulance which had been made by the State Police was cancelled when the helicopter arrived, and the child and her mother were evacuated to the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

Latest report on Gingers condition listed her injuries as a broken left leg and broken bones in her left shoulder, as well as cuts and abrasions about her head and

STATE INVOKES SEVERE PENALTY FOR GAS STEALING

BIRCHWOOD: Two local youths are now serving six month sentences in the Federal Jail for siphoning of gas from a parked car.

State police apprehended the pair early Friday morning after numerous reports of the theft of gasoline had led them to investigate the matter.

Both of the youths confessed after the police discovered a siphon hose and other equipment in their car. They admitted to having taken approximately three gallons of gas from a Mercury which had been parked on the Birchwood Road.

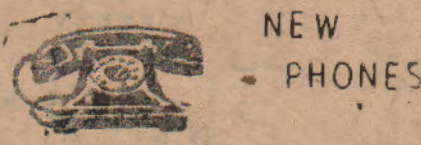

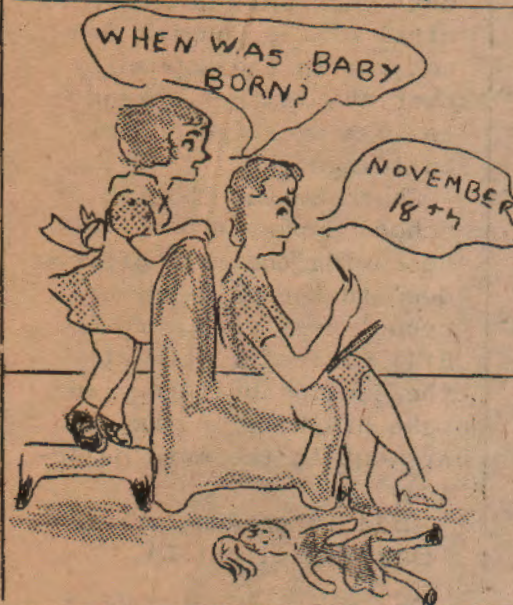
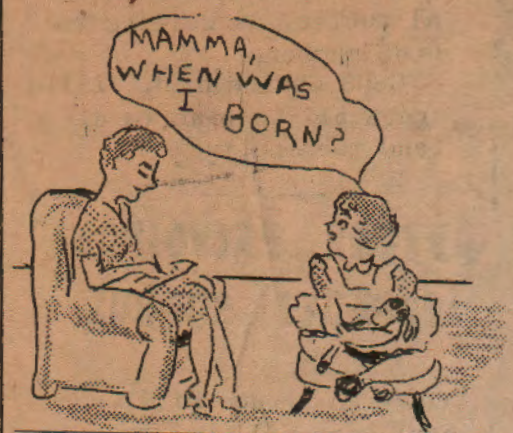

person should question any phoney promises. You hold the power in your hands whether you would decide you would like to form some kind of city government. You also hold the power in your hands to decide whether you would like to form this area into a 2nd class Borough (school Borough). When you stop and think that you are deciding whether government will or will not be, then this makes you the most important person in the world.

In many respects, Alaska has been an unorganized borough since 1913. This was made official by law Oct. 1, 1961, when the present borough act became effective. Prior to Oct. 1, 1961, the type of local government which served Alaskans was the city, and special service district, and the independent school district. Since the borough act became effective the only type of local governmental units allowed will be the city, the organized borough and the service area. Public utility districts and school districts can no longer be incorporated.

Every unit of local government must become either service areas, cities or parts of cities, or organized boroughs or parts of organized boroughs by July 1, 1963. Let us glance

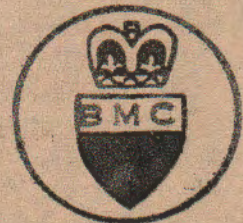

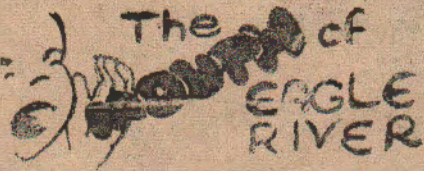

at these three units of government.

(1) THE SERVICE AREA. Take for example the small village of Dillingham Alaska. This area has to do something by July 1 1963. It probably would not meet the standards to incorporate into a city. Then it surely would not meet the standards incorporate into an organized borough. The only choice left to Dillingham would be to petition for a service area in the Alaska unorganized borough.

The legislature would create this service area by general law or by special act.

(2) CITIES or parts of cities. Any unorganized area such as ours which meets the standards for incorporation as a city must become a city or annex to a city or become part of an organized borough or become an organized borough by this deadline. Any area which incorporates into a city would be

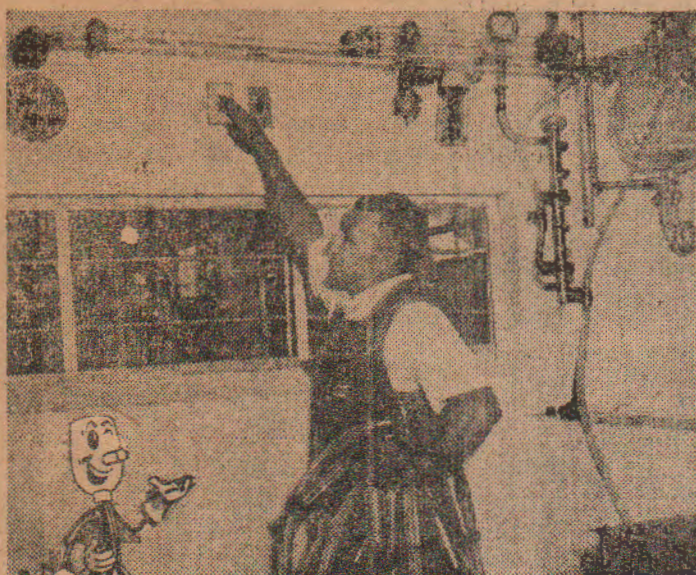

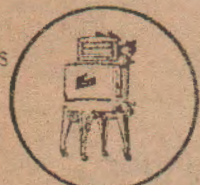

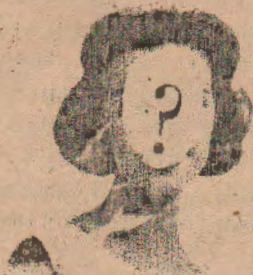

With the passing of Easter, we are reminded that there were no Easter Services the first two years of the community. The first Easter service in Chugiak was the Easter of 1949.

By the spring of 1949, the Chugiak Community Club was well organized. A minister, Rev. Rosignol of the Assembly of God was holding Sunday meetings in the home of Milton Wyatt at Mile 19 (old highway). The Chugiak Community Club decided to have an Easter service. The home of Fred and Dorothy Hasekoes-ter was selected as the place for the service.

Those who attended included all of the members of the Community Club. Rev. Rosignol conducted the worship service at 6:00am. Singing for the service was accompanied by a guitar.

After the service, the women of the club prepared breakfast. The dishes were done by the men of the club.

This community breakfast became an annual Easter event in the years following and for several years it was prepared by the Chugiak Homemakers Club. Rev. Rosignil's work in the community resulted in the Chugiak Chapel, the first church in the community with Rev. Wilburn Craig as the first pastor.

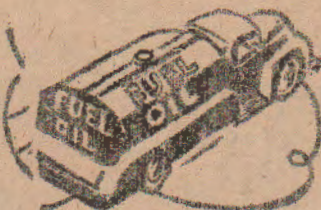


