ARSON SUSPECTED IN HOMESTEAD FIRE

CHUGIAK: State Police are investigating the possibility of arson in sonnection with a fire which completely destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Thillman Mallace May 5.

The Wallaces were not at that time occupying their house, which was located on a remote homestead high on the side of a mountain in Chugiak, but were living at their place of business at mile 18%.

They first learned of the fire when the Fire Chief of the Eagle River Fire Department casually mentioned seeing smoke in that direction on Saturday, May 5th. He had assumed that Mallace might have been doing some burning at that time.

There seems to be discrepancies between our community and that of the city of Anchorage in this respect. Are we interested socially, culturally and economically with Anchorage? We seem to have more unity among our own local communities than with the city of Archorage. (next col.)

This social and cultural integration of our own communities sets the stage for a government that provides a minimum of service consistent with the needs of our own communities. The type of government which will provide a minimum of service consistent with our needs is the Second Class Borough.

The geographic and economic unity of our local communities strengthens our position to form a Second Class or School Borough. Cur ability to form any kind of local governextical.)

ernment in this area will be completely stifled if we allow ourselves to go into a borough with Anchorage.

We must take some forward steps real soon, or we will always regret that we did not. There will be those who will make the common cry, "This action is premature!" This common cry has been shouted by the propertied and privileged classes since colonial days. If we had all taken this attitude we would still be living in caves.

Any positive forward action that people take is premature. But what is mature action? It is better to do something even though you make a mistake, than to do nothing.

A school borough will be concerned mostly with schools. This will be a step forward in the movement for universal free education. 



eHUGIAK: Both the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Cos. under a mutual aid argreement will be charging \$250 per call for answering of Fire Calls for persons who have not paid the \$25 subscription fee for either Fire Co.

Art Wallace, Chief of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. stated that residents in the areas served by both the Fire Companys who carry Fire Insurance on their properties may obtain a "Rider Policy" for a nominal fee whereby the insurance company would pay the \$250 charge for answering the Fire Call in the event eithe the Chugiak or Eagle River Company responded.

Wallace went on to say that individuals who do not subscribe to Fire Protection from either the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company or the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Dept., and do not carry Fire Insurance Riders either would in the event they have a fire and summon either Fire Department, would be billed \$250 per call and under the mutual Aid Argrement this sum sould be collected through the small claims court.



requiring every town with fifty or more householders to establish an elementary school, and those of one hundred householders a gram mer school as well. Another vital force in the movement for free popular education was the demand of enfranchised labor for free schools.

The Workingman's Party of the late 1820's and 30's placed first among its demands a free public school system supported by taxation. This demand was soon sponsored by the major political parties and was given vitality by the Jacksonian program of destroying monopoly and priviledge in every form.

In the 1830's and 40's the movement for free public schools took on new vigor, especially in the newly created states. Here the people were convinced of the need for education as a basis for the successful management of democratic political institutions.

As early as 1779, Thomas Jefferson proposed that Vir ginia be divided into districts, in each of which a school should be supported (next col.) (my borough)

This brought forth the common cry, "this action is premature."
