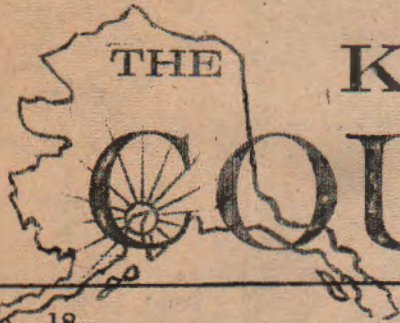

CHUGIAK HONORS GOVERNOR

CHUGIAK: Governor William A. Egan, was feted from one end of Chugiak to the other, last Thursday, when Operation Chugiak High School paid homage to him and his efforts toward getting a high school for this community.

The festivities began at the northern most end of this highway community, with a dinner at the Half-Way House at mile 23.

There, as the guest of OCHS, the governor and a number of members of the State Legislature along with representatives of the 26 OCHS member organizations, dined until it was time to leave for a public meeting scheduled for 8pm at the Eagle River School.

A mile long motorcade, led by a state police Patrol Car and escorted by members of the Last Frontier Motor-Cycle Club of Chugiak (the two lead cycles carrying the American Flag and the Alaskan State Flag) made its way from the Half Way House to the southern most spot of Chugiak, where a color guard consisting of members of boy and girl scouts from Chugiak troops escorted the Governor and his party into the school.

MILITARY ASSISTS IN 2 LOCAL RESCUES

GINGER LEE MACKEY, who last week was seriously injured when struck by a car while running for the school bus, is slowly recovering at the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

In addition to multiple fractures of her leg and arm, Ginger may have an injured larynx, and one lung does not appear to be functioning properly.

Ginger's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Mackey of mile 22 have asked that any of Ginger's friends who may wish to send her cards can do so by addressing them to Ward 6A at the 5040 Hospital.

CHUGIAK: Prompt response by military helicopters were responsible for the rapid evacuation of four seriously injured men, victims of two separate accidents last weekend.

The first evacuation took place on Saturday, when Alvin Lamoreaux, was removed to the 5040th Air Force Hospital, following an accident which took place on a remote mountain side above Peters Creek.

Lamoreaux along with Lloyd Severance of mile 21½ were in the process of bringing two track-type tractors down from a homestead located in the mountains beyond Ski Road, when the one which Lamoreaux was driving hit a slippery spot on the narrow road and overturned and plunged down over the steep embankment. Lamoreaux attempted to jump clear, but his foot became lodged between the tracks and the guard, and he was carried over the bank with the tractor.

Severance attempted to free him, but when he was unable to do this, he went after help, running down the mountain to the homestead of Sterling (Bud) Whaley.

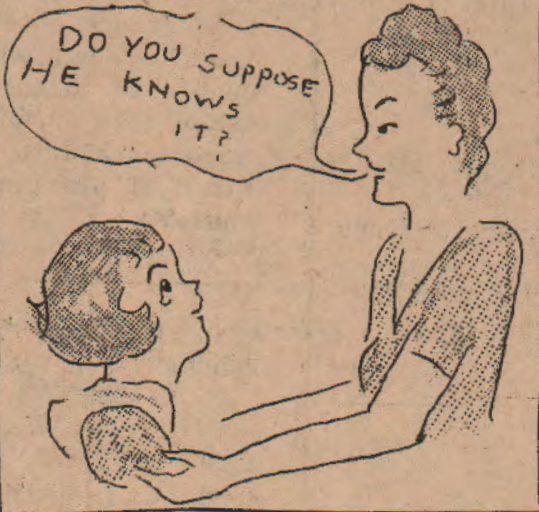
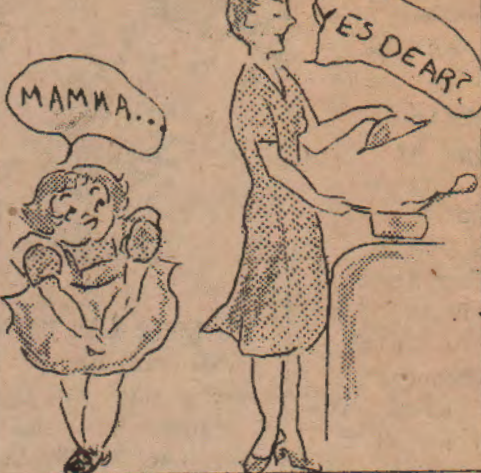
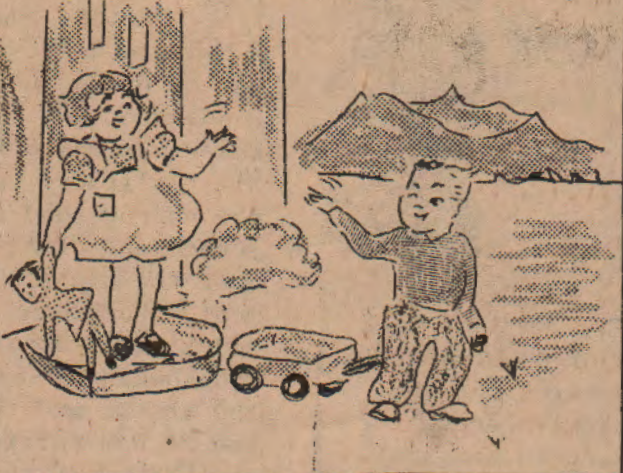
Who will rule the borough... the city folks or the country folk?

The Borough Act says that if the area in the first class city has more population than the area outside, then the city will dominate the borough. This has created the number one stumbling block. Everyone is aware that in the proposed area for borough incorporation, from Knik Bridge to Portage, that the city of Anchorage would have a majority of population. Most of us are aware that if the population problem was only marginal, the city could annex another area and keep ahead in population. This is a distinct advantage in favor of the larger cities in Alaska. Who ever is in control of the borough assembly will control the three powers delegated to the borough by the State.

They are: (1) Education, (2) Planning and zoning, (3) Assessing and collecting Taxes. There will be one school district throughout the borough. There will be one school board for the entire borough. The borough assembly has authority to approve the school budget. There will be one Planning and zoning

SWISS CARROT CAKE

- BEAT together until foamy
 - 3 egg yolks
 - 3/4 cups sugar
 - 1 lemon, juice & grated rind
- MIX well and stir in
 - 1 1/2 cups grated nuts
 - 1 1/2 cups grated carrots
 - 1/2 cup flour
 - 1 tsp baking powder
- BEAT until frothy and mix in
 - 3 egg whites
- GREASE 8 inch loaf pan
- SPRINKLE with some crumbs
- BAKE in medium oven for 1 hour
- ALLOW to cool in open
- * half of the nuts may be replaced dry bread crumbs

With Whaley, he proceeded to the Highway, where they telephoned for the State Police and asked the Army to send a helicopter.

Severance then accompanied by Whaley, a State (next col

Trooper and Whaley's two sons Mark and Steven, returned the three miles back to where Lamoreaux lay injured.

The helicopter arrived with a medic who administered first aid to the injured man and he was then carried by stretcher down to the clearing where the copter had landed and transported to the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

Lamoreaux's foot was nearly severed, and doctors are not yet certain whether they will be able to save it.

The second accident occurred the following day, Sunday at 6:45am, when four men from Anchorage were proceeding up a mountain side fifteen miles up the Eagle River Valley.

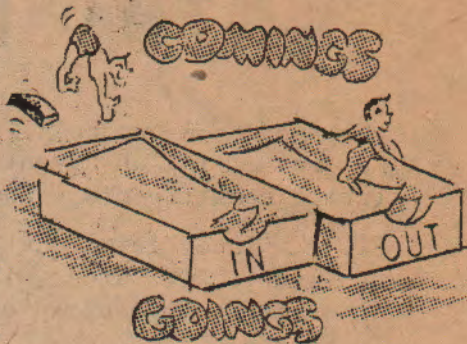
The weasel in which they were riding, was unable to proceed up the steep hillside and stalled and then tipped over backward and to one side

Charles Engdahl of Anchorage, who was riding in the rear of the vehicle was thrown clear and uninjured, the three other men, Eugene Smith, Robert Wilson and John Willhite (all also of Anchorage) were caught beneath the vehicle and crushed.

Engdahl along with Willhite, (who was not injured too severely) rendered what assistance they could to the other two men, and then Engdahl went down the mountain after assistance.

He made his way to a homestead further down the mountain, and was able to ride on out to the highway with the homesteader, where the State Police was contacted and once more a helicopter summoned.

The helicopter transported Engdahl and the State Trooper back to within 1/4 mile of the (next col.)


Scene of the accident, and from there the rescue party climbed the remainder of the distance up the snow covered mountainside.

CHAPTER XI: For the first few years of the community, there was no electricity.

During the first two years there was only one home that had any electricity at all. This was the home of Cloyce and Justine Parks.

Lighting was by the old standby, Coleman Lantern. No home was complete without this hissing appliance. Some women of the community even had Coleman irons for ironing. Laundry was hauled all the way in to Anchorage.

In 1949, there were a few homes with generator plants of their own. Parks had a little four cylinder Hercules plant. When this ran out of gas in the evening, it was time to go to bed. Petrow had a little plant powered by a Briggs & Stratton engine. This was a sometimes plant. Sometimes it ran and sometimes it wouldn't. It has the peculiarity of refusing to start until the spark plug was changed. It always paid to have two plugs on hand, just to give one a rest, for it could be used later with no trouble.

Vern Haik had a plant at the lodge which would stop for no apparent reason and at odd times. Most of the plants were either too hard for the woman to start, or else they didn't understand the intricacies of the things so most homes waited without power until the "master" got home in the evening to start the plant.

Of course, without electricity, there was no water in most of the homes. At this time, the water at Parks (Cont page 7 col 2)

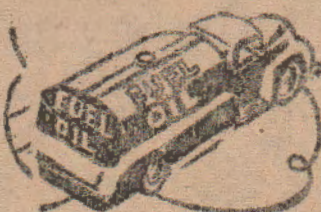

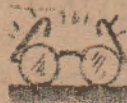
In a letter the Phil O'Neil, President of the MEA Board of Directors, Briggs said:

C.E.A ELECTS OFFICERS

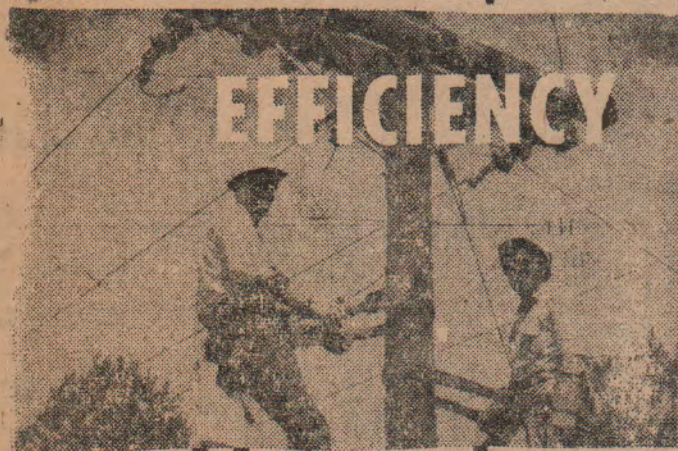
CHUGIAK: New officers for the 1962-63 school term were elected at the last meeting of the Chugiak Education Association.

Commission throughout the organized Borough. There will be one Tax Ass-essing and collecting authority in the borough. All property tax will be collected by the borough. All taxes levied by cities and collected by the borough will be returned to the cities. Property tax means real estate tax and personal property tax.

The three functions mentioned are known as areawide functions. These powers are exercised without regard to city limits. Whichever area, the city or the country, which has the most population will be in control of the three functions above. Any other areawide powers which are assumed by the borough will be controlled by a majority vote of whichever area, the city or the country that has the most population. (next col)

(My Borough)

House Bill 488, which amended the bor-ough act, provides for weighted voting.

This mathematical formula used in weighted voting gives the majority of the votes to the area (the city or country) which has the most pop-ulation. This weighted voting ap-plies to areawide functions.

If we form a borough, it would be easy for those men power to say that all problems are areawide. All this leads back to the basic question. Who will dominate the borough, the city folk or the country folk? Are city problems and country problems the same? Do we want more local control of our own affairs or trust them to a borough assembly? My borough and I will see you again see you again next time.

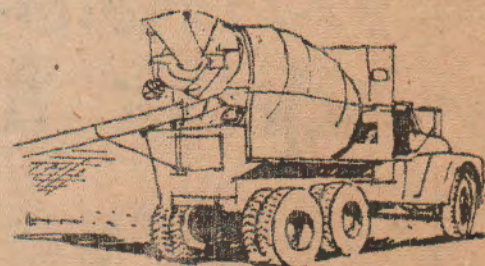

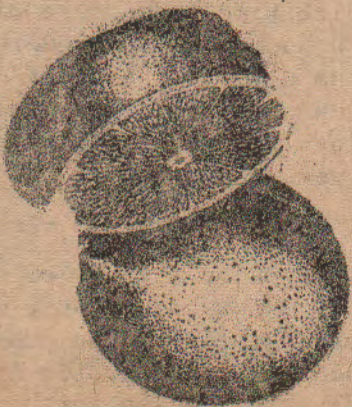

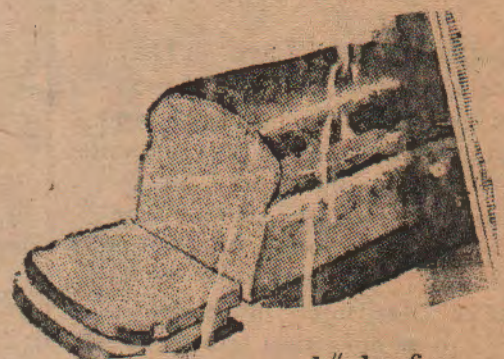
