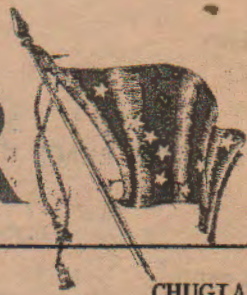

HEALTH CENTER GETS FURNITURE

OLD CHUGIAK: The Alaska Department of Health last week assigned a consignment of furniture to the Chugiak Health Center.

Health and Welfare Council President, Louise Long, along with two other officers brought three pick-up truck loads from Anchorage to be used in the Old Methodist Church which has been leased by the Department of Health for use as a local Health Center.

The building is now equipped with 22 chairs, one swivel chair, two large desks (one of which will be used for an examination table and assorted clinic equipment.

Mrs. Long stated that the center is still in need of additional chairs (in reference to a previous plea for loan of furniture) as the Chugiak Health and Welfare Council will now hold their regular meetings in the Health Center.

OLD CHUGIAK: Dale Pierson, who for the past year has served as co-chairman of Operation Chugiak High School, was last Thursday re-elected to the post of Chairman to serve for the coming year.

The post of vice-chairman, newly created at that meeting was filled by Bob Hamann, while Eloise Thomas was elected Secretary Treasurer.

Ed Willis, who had shared the co-chairmanship with Pierson, declined renomination, saying that since he had been recently elected to serve on the advisory school board, he

felt that there might possibly at sometime arise a conflict of interest should he hold office in both organizations.

The OCHS group met at the meeting hall of the Chugiak Chapel at mile 21, with 15 of the 26 member organizations represented.

In addition to the three officers, it was voted to include in the executive committee the chairmen of the four standing committees, (publicity, ways and means, site selection and legislative monitoring) and to also elect five members at large to serve as liason between the executive committee and the member organizations.

Areawide functions of the borough will be in control of whatever area, the city or country, which has the most population.

One of the areawide functions of the borough is that of Planning and Zoning. To most of us Planning and Zoning is a general term. What we fail to realize is that this is a power the state is delegating to the borough.

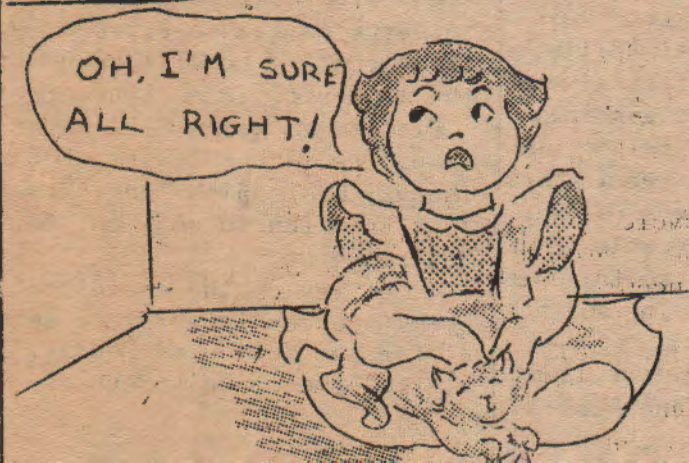
Under the Planning and (next col.)

Zoning power comes a bulk of zoning ordinances, when enacted by the borough assembly.

Let us look at what a zoning ordinance may involve. A comprehensive zoning ordinance is one that, by dividing the borough into zones and allocating different uses to different zones, regulates the use that is made of each parcel of land in the borough.

Zoning ordinances are passed under the states police power. Under this power, each state, and its cities, which act as agencies of the state, have the power to adopt such (cont page 5 col 1)

When planting the small home garden, many tend to broadcast the fertilizer and then work it well into the soil.

Although this method is usually the one which is recommended by many gardening authorities, it is not all (next col.)

(green thumb hint)

ways the best.

Here in Alaska, many of the more experienced gardeners prefer to fertilize only the seed rows.

The fertilizer is carefully sprinkled along the bottom of each seed trench, and then mixed well with the soil before planting the seeds.

This not only is more economical in that it saves a great amount of fertilizer, but also avoids fertilizing the weeds which will come up in between the rows.

regulations as are necessary to protect the public health, morals and safety.

The right of the individual to use his property as he sees fit must give way to the reasonable exercise of the police power.

Planning and zoning poses a problem in underdeveloped areas such as ours. The City planners cannot help but plan beyond his limits.

For example, zoning bodies often times attempt to set aside underdeveloped areas for residential purposes, although the land is not ripe for immediate residential development. Landowners may wish to use parts of the area now for business purposes.

To zone as residential large areas of sparsely settled land where residential use lies somewhere in the dim future deprives the landowners of the possibility of enjoying for the indefinite future any income from non residential use.

In cities that have zoning ordinances, it is usually provided that any property owner wishing to erect a building first apply to the commissioner of buildings or other proper official for a building permit.

The application must be accompanied by plans and specifications of the proposed structure. The official inspects the plans and declines to issue the permit if a violation of zoning ordinance is disclosed.

Local ordinances often provide for the annual inspection of certain types of buildings. If any violation of the building codes is disclosed the owner or occupant is required to make the necessary alterations to make the building comply with the code.

In every community change, probable rapid change, is inevitable. Zoning as a tool in the hands of the land planners is employed in order that responsible leaders of the community can make some intelligent decisions as to where the new subdivisions, schools, factories and shopping centers are going to be located.

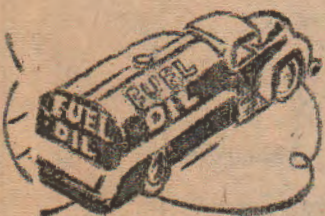
DRIVE TO RAISE FUNDS FOR PHN BLANNED

RADIO'S AND WATCHES FOR THE BLIND

JUNEAU: Braille watches and table radios are being made available free of charge to blind residents of Alaska by the Zale Jewelry company of Texas and the American Foundation for the Blind, respectively. Both are working through the Division of Public Welfare, which will certify the recipients, according to George P. Spartz, division director.

He said the Zale company is extending to Alaska a program which it has operated for many years in other states.

It will make an annual gift of 25 watches whose raised dials are readable by the (next col.)

(watches) blind. After the company has received names from the Welfare division of persons eligible for the gifts to the blind, Zale will deal directly with the recipients and will make free repair to the watches when necessary, Mr. Spartz said.

The American Foundation for the Blind will provide 12 table model radios this year and 5 annually in succeeding years.

They are small 5-tube AM models he said, and are gifts of the Foundation.

Inquiries concerning the watches and radios for Alaskas blind may be made through Division of Public Welfare offices at Anchorage, Fairbanks, Nome, Juneau and Ketchikan.

ALASKAN EXHIBIT POPULAR AT FAIR

SEATTLE: If popularity of the Alaska Exhibit at the Seattle World's Fair continues at the present rate, the exhibit will be among the best attended of any when the Fair ends in October.

Daily crowds have exceeded the most optimistic expectation of the exhibit's officials.

Although an estimated 150,000 people have toured the Alaska Exhibit building since opening day, April 21, it wasn't until an "electric eye counter" was installed on May 10 that some (next col.)

(Alaska Exhibit)

accurate measure of attendance could be obtained.

In the first week, the counter showed 45,981 persons entered the Alaska exhibit. Since the counter clicks only once for two people entering together, exhibit officials estimate more than 50,000 persons visited the exhibit May 10-16 inclusive. Indidentally, 222 of the exhibit visitors were from Alaska.

This week too, the Alaska Exhibit was cited as being one of the "World's Favorites" by the Argus, a leading Seattle newspaper, which called particular attention to the Eskimo and Indian artifacts.

Most popular features of the exhibit are the world's largest polar bear; the world's record Kodiak bear, and the spectacular Aurora Borealis ("Northern Lights") display presented at the conclusion of a narration about the State of Alaska.

The Alaska Exhibit is in a favored location, just 200 feet from the Space Needle, the 600 foot high symbol of the Seattle World's Fair.

YOUTH PROGRAM PLANNED

WASILLA: As part of the rehabilitation program of the Youth Conservation Camp near Wasilla, crews of boys will work in some of the state forests this summer to do maintenance and other projects for which there are no funds for hiring fulltime labor.

The cooperative plan was announced this week by Charles W. Pfeiffer, Director of the Division of Youth and Adult Authority, which operated the youth camp and A. Earl Plourde, State Forester of the Division of Lands, Forestry, Parks and Recreation Branch.

They said the work will be in the Anchorage and Matanuska Valley area and is scheduled for the period May 1 to September 30, 1962.

Projects to which the boys are assigned will include camp-ground maintenance and construction and forestry, park, and recreation field activities. The division of Lands will supply technical supervision and materials while the youths remain under actual supervision of Youth and Adult Authority staff.

Selected boys who demonstrate exceptional ability and dependability will later be given the opportunity to act as field assistants to foresters. Expanding relationships and work training opportunities will thus be offered the selected boys, Pfeiffer said.

This unified program assists in the rehabilitation of wayward youths and gives the taxpayer more for his dollar by helping the Forestry and Parks program. The same amount of funds will be spent with private enterprise by the Forestry program but these same very limited funds can thus be

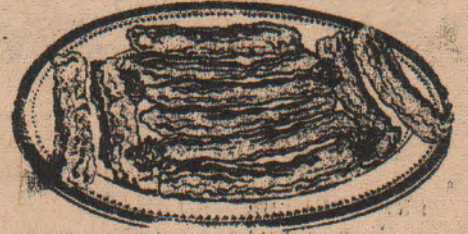

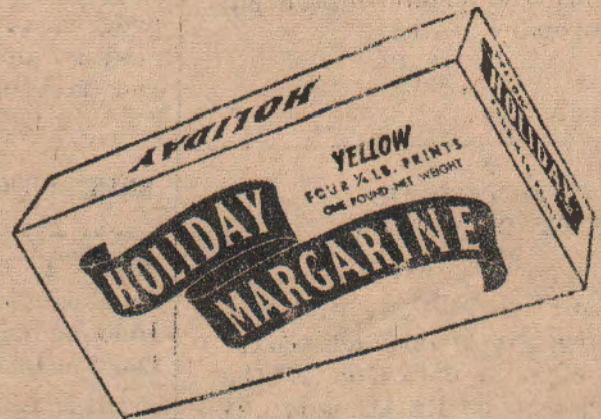
