PARENTS CLASH WITH TRAFFIC ENGINEER

CHUGIAK: Parents of children from both the Chugiak and Eagle River School, expressed their indignation at the decision of the Division of Highways to increase the speed limit at the Chugiak School 45 miles per hour.

Edward Mills, Traffic and Urban Engineer from the Anchorage office, speaking to a joint meeting of the Chugiak and Eagle River PTAs, explained the reasons for proposed changes in the signs at the Chugiak School.

According to Mills, the portable signs, known as senturys, were outlawed on all Federal Aid Highways, and had to be replaced with signs that were standard throughout the country.

As for the speed limit at the school, he admitted that this was determined by his office, and the 45 mph limit had been arrived at

Our Swiss cook this week offers us another recipe from her native land. An unusual pastry that is not a dessert.

ONION ONE CRUST
PIE

- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 tsp salt

MIX well, rubbing shortening with flour into small pieces

- ADD:
- 1 egg
 - 1 tbs milk

PRESS dough firmly into a ball

ROLL out and spread in 9 inch pie pan

ONION FILLING

- 1/2 tbs shortening
- 5 tbs cup up bacon
- FRY till glazy
- 2 pounds minced onions
- 4 tbs flour

- 2 1/2 cups milk or cream
- ADD and fry till golden
- MIX and ADD to onion mixture
- 1 tbs salt
- 1 tsp caraway seeds or cumin

- 3 eggs
- SPREAD in pastry lined pan
- BAKE 40-50 minutes at 400°

CLUB REORGANIZES

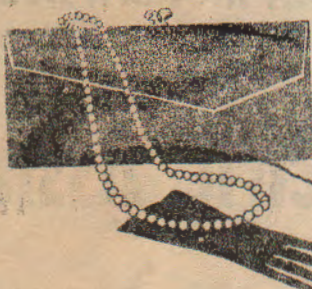
BIRCHWOOD: New officers were elected for the re-organized Birchwood Community Club, at a meeting held last Thursday at the Chugiak School.
