

FLINT APPOINTED TO MEA BOARD

Very soon the petition to incorporate the area from Knik Bridge to Portage into a First Class Borough will be completed. You may or may not be asked to sign this petition. Should the borough planners get enough signatures to qualify the petition, the Local Affairs Agency and the Local Boundary commission be satisfied with their findings, then the Secretary of State will call for an election to be held on incorporation.

The Secretary of State calls for an election on several questions concerning incorporation. (1) You will be determining if a majom ty of the qualified voters in the area sant an organized borough. Every qualified voter in the area proposed for incorporation may vot don this question. A majority of those voting decides the question. (2) To elect a borough ch-

the question. (2) To elect a borough chairman and members of the borough assambly

from outside first class cities and member of the borough school board. Every qualified voter within the area proposed for incorporatio, may note for one (next col)

(boroubh)

candidate for borough chairman. Every qualified voter living outside the first class city but within the area proposed for incorporation may vote for members of the school board. In all three cases the candidate or candidates receiving the most votes are elected.

(\$\\$) Another question to be decided on the incorporation election is which, if any areawide p, were will be exercised by the organized borough in addition to the three required. The three required are Education, Panning and Zoning, and Rax Assessing and Collecting.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

I have been tempted many times to write to the papers; however until a recent episode, I have not, apparently been sufficiently stirred to do so. Now I am.

On the night of 5 June 1962, I was proceeding homeward with a friend near the hour of twelve. Upon approaching the north brow of Peters Creek Hill, by the Oberg Road, I narrowly escaped having my car seriously damaged by a large scattering of rocks which had been placed in the road deliberately in such a manner as to prevent anyone's passing through without hitting at least some of them. Some of the rocks were larger than a human head. At first thought, it appeared to be a land slide, but upon going back to remove the rocks from the road, it became quite apparent from the footprints on the nearby bank, the clean ditches, and the pattern of the rocks on the road, that these had been placed there deliberately to present a hazard to traffic. This could have caused — at the very worst — a headon collision, with human life involved; (cont page 4 col 3)

1 cup diced potatoes

W grains pepper, peprika
W Boston or pilot crackers or
salteens or oysterettes

POUR over crisp crackers, or crumbled crackers over chowder just before serving.

1. In 1961, a plate glass window was broken at a public benefit dance. The individuals involved have never felt responsible enough to pay for the damages.

2 In 1961, a church signpost was broken down, with no effort on the part of those involved to replace or relair the damage.

3. Vacant homes and cabins have been vandalized, with the contents being destroyed, removed or stolen and, in some cases, material so removed has been used for the purpose of building other person's homes in the locality.
4. Dogs have been shot, apparently for "kicks" in 1961 and 1962
5. Cars have been sabotaged at a church

5 Cars have been sabotaged at a church youth camp, in 1961.

6. In 1962, gasoline was stolen by siphoning from cars whose owners can ill afford to lose it

7. In 1962, a homesteader's house was burned to the ground; the effort of two year's labor, toil and thrift went up in smoke, with no restitution because of an irresponsible attitude on the part of both the parents and children.

This is a partial list of some of the incidents that have come to my attention either through the press or from first hand knowledge.

Is this youthful prankishness? Can these acts be classed as practical jokess? Should these things be overlooked? Or should we, as a community, shrug our shoulders and say "This is getting terrible. "THEY" ought to do something about it."? Who is this personal pronoun "THEY"? "THEY" is every citizen in this community... your neighbor... your self...and me.

Unless your ne ghbor...mour self...and I do something, whether it is to support the high school effort, support the church of our faith, take an interest in the newlyforming local government, help our fire companies with work and money, control our children and our selves, self-control and self dicipline, "THEY" will do nothing.

children and our selves, selfw-control-and self dicipline, "THEY" will do nothing.

An attitude of irresponsibility and indifference on the part of parents is reflected very quickly in the attitude and behavior of children. This road leads in one direction only — done. This leads — away from a realization of the Kingdom of God here on earth; and for those who profess to have no concern in this matter, but want a practical application, it is leading this community AND the rest of the nation to lose the struggle for freedom — true freedom, not license — by default. We will forfeit the game without pitching a ball — morally, spiritually and economically. economically.

If the borough should be formed of this size, you will see other departments in the city making similar declarations. It would be a simple mate or for the Police Department of the city to assume that what is done not the country affects the safety and morals of the city dwellers. One by one, the departments of the City of Anchorage will find justification for extending their control to the borough poundaries. This is a natural process of government.

(1) Another question to be decided is whether or not we will have the Borough Manager Plan. Every qualified voter in the area proposed for incorp, ration may vote on whether or whether not the organized borough should have an appointed manager.

Regardless of how many elections are had, the basic problem of the city controlling the areawide powers over the country will not be solved. The sad lart of this is that the borough planners have not pointed out all the underlying principles behind borough government of this type. Forbs is but one of the airplane owners who have experienced similar gas thefts at Birchwood.


