GINGER MACKKEY

SEATTLE: Word has been received from the Swedish Hospital in Seattle that little Ginger Lee Mackey has suffered a serious set-back, and that a second operation might be necessary.

Wayne Mackey, father of the injured child left for Seattle on Monday night at the request of the child's mother who has been at her side ever since she was evacuated to Seattle last month.

Ginger was seriously injured last May, when she was struck down by a car as she was running to catch the school bus.

The Mackeys live at mile 22 in Peters Creek.

Ginger is suffering from a brain injury incurred in the accident.

FIRE LAKE: Two fishermen who were enjoying an early morning boating expedition in Fire Lake last Wednesday, had their fun rudely interrupted when their small boat swamped, dumping the pair into the waters of Lower Fire Lake.

Harvey Kirkpatrick of Birchwood, and Billy Mills of Anchorage, managed to swim to one of the small islands which dot the surface of the lake, but the island, which was composed mostly of swamp grass and muskog was not large enough to support

their weight, and it also began to sink.

The two were left standing waist deep in water on the partially submerged island and waving frantically to cars on the highway, trying to attract their attention.

They finally caught the eye of Dick Holcomb, of Birchwood, who was on his way to work.

Holcomb himself had no way of getting the men out of the water, but he ran out to the road and flagged the first car he saw that was towing a boat on a trailer.

Holcomb and the boat owner then put the boat into the water and rescued Kirkpatrick and Mills, who were cold, and wet, but otherwise uninjured.

The owner of the rescue boat, prefers to remain unidentified.

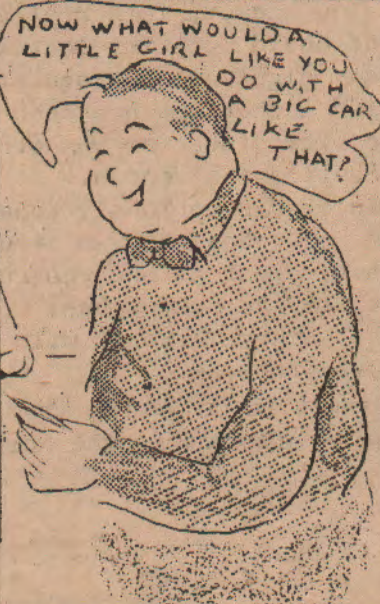
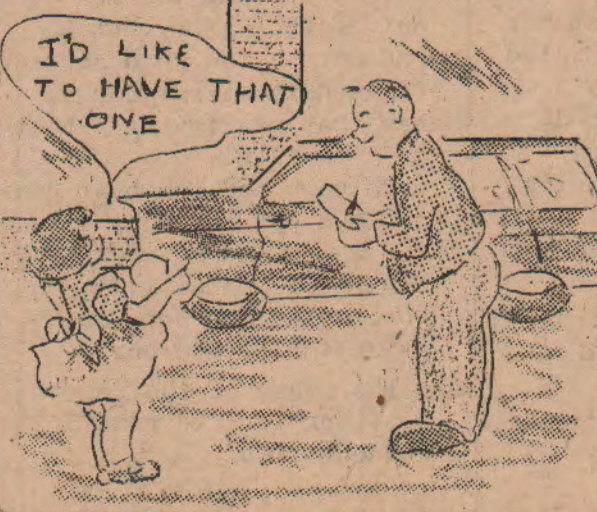
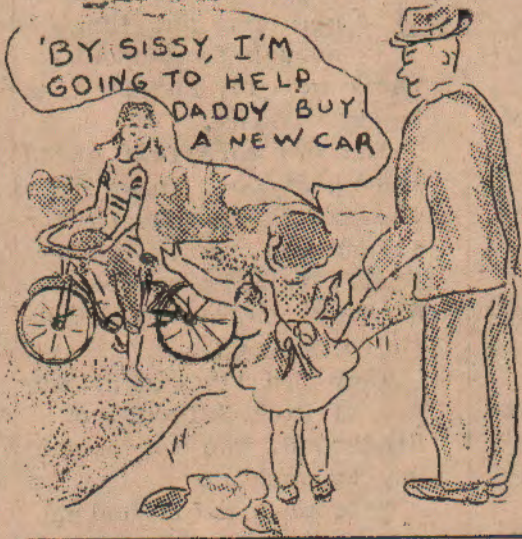

COOK FOR JUNE
DOROTHY LACAU

No New England Cook worth her salt is without a recipe for real New England Clam Chowder, and Dorothy has not let us down.

She gives us her favorite for her last recipe as cook of the month.

NEW ENGLAND CLAM CHOWDER (4 servings)

- 1/4 cup salt pork (diced)
- 1 onion sliced
- 2 cups diced potatoes
- 1 pint fresh clams or 1 no. 1 can minced clams
- 2 cups boiling water
- SALT
- 2 cups milk
- 4 pilot crackers or oysterettes
- CAYENNE

COOK salt pork in large aluminum saucepan over low heat until the fat is extracted.

REMOVE crisp pork and reserve for garnish

COOK the onion in fat until slightly yellow

ADD potatoes, water and salt

BOIL until potatoes are tender

CHOP fresh clams

HEAT to boiling point in their own liquor

ADD clams, liquor and milk to cooked potatoes

REHEAT and season

POUR the chowder over the crackers or crumble over chowder in the serving dishes.

**CONSTRUCTION LOAN
FOR MEA**

PALMER: The new construction ban for MEA should be processed by July 1, 1962, according to Rural Electrification Administration officials. This loan will provide for 160 miles of distribution line to serve 300 new consumers, and 10 miles of new transmission line. Additional space will be provided in the headquarters building at Palmer, including a new general meeting room for use of the Board of Directors and members or general public gatherings. The Manager was advised during conferences with REA officials in Washington, D.C. that the application was one of the best prepared that they had seen. "This statement is high praise for our Chief Engineer, Willard Johnson", he stated.

**ABSENTEE BALLOTS
AVAILABLE**

JUNEAU: Secretary of State Hugh J. Wade today announced that mailings will begin July 5th to persons requesting absentee ballots for the August 14 Alaska primary elections.

Applications for absentee ballots to date have not been as numerous as those received by comparable time in advance of the 1960 election, when a record state-wide vote was cast.

An increasing number of requests is expected, however, (next col.)

Absentee ballots may be requested from the Secretary of State or from magistrates or deputy magistrates in the election district of the voters permanent address.

Wade noted that there are three ways in which to vote an absentee ballot:

1. In person (for a voter who is temporarily away from his regular voting precinct, but near a magistrate or deputy magistrate in his election district).
2. By mail (for the voter who is unavoidably absent from his voting precinct, whether in the State or not.)
3. Through a personal representative (for a voter who is unable to be at the polls because of physical disability)

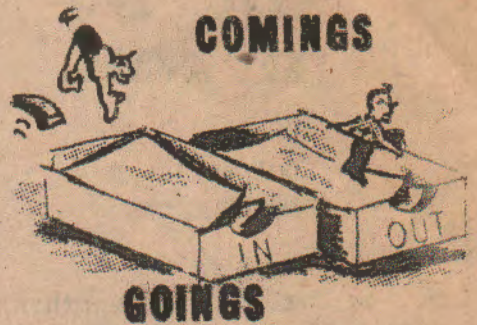
EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Bowl has published a new schedule of hours to be observed from June 21st to August 15th.

MEA LOAN TO EXPAND SERVICE

PALMER: A loan application is being processed to acquire the Talkeetna utility and extend service south to Montana.

There is a good deal of activity in the MEA service area, which covers the Matanuska, Lower Susitna, Yentna and Beluga valleys.

Several exploratory oil wells are being drilled in the Tyonek area, and some mineral exploration is proceeding near Beluga. Considerable homesteading activity is under way in various sections of the upper and lower Susitna Valley. Road construction is proceeding on the Willow-Talkeetna highway, and the new highway between Talkeetna and Summit has been brushed out as far as Hurricans.

MEA has requested a meeting with the Copper Valley Electric Association to arrive at a boundary agreement. Such an agreement will also be sought with Golend Valley Electric Association in Fairbanks. The purpose of these boundary agreements is not necessarily to expand the area limits, but to arrive at a reasonable common boundary based on ability to serve, which will guarantee that new industry and other developments can be provided with energy by one of the utilities so that economic growth in the area will not be hindered.

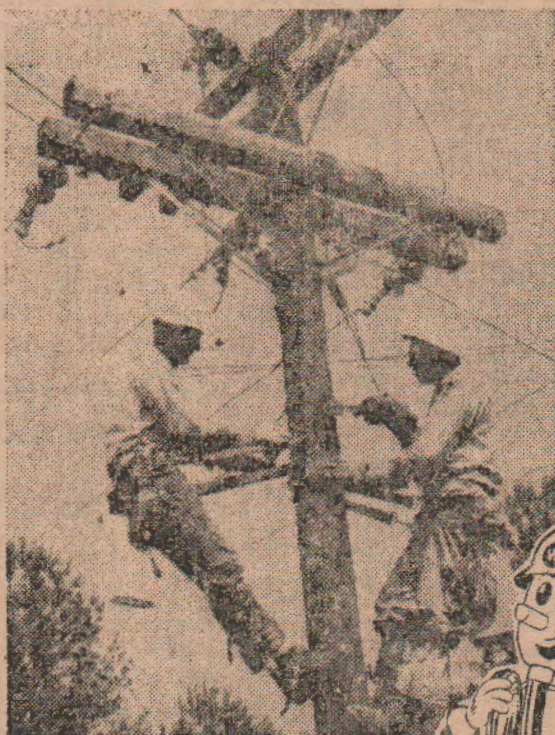

(A) If the borough chairman plan is adopted, the executive power of the borough will be vested in the borough chairman. He becomes the Chief administrative officer of the borough.

He is responsible for the proper administration of all borough affairs placed in his charge. He would appoint, suspend or remove all borough employees and administrative officers of the borough.

He is responsible to see that all ordinances, resolutions and orders of the assembly and all laws of the state, subject to his enforcement, are executed.

He must prepare and submit the annual budget and capital program to the borough assembly. He must keep the assembly fully advised on the financial condition of the borough and make recommendations as he sees fit.

He must administer the borough personnel system and hire such administrative assistants as he sees fit to help him.

In other words, the borough chairman is comparable to the chief executive of the state, the Governor, except his area of administration is smaller.

(B) Under the borough plan, the borough manager serves at the pleasure of the borough assembly.

The borough manager has the same powers and duties as the borough chairman, except that he cannot introduce ordinances and he has no VETO power.

Simply, the borough chairman can introduce an ordinance, veto an ordinance over the assembly, and execute an ordinance passed by the assembly. The borough manager can only execute an ordinance passed by the borough assembly.

Next week, advantages and disadvantages of the borough chairman and manager plans will be presented.

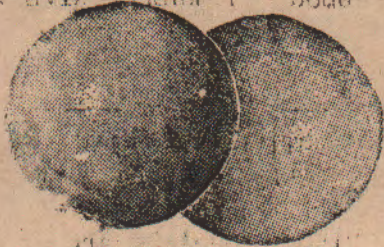

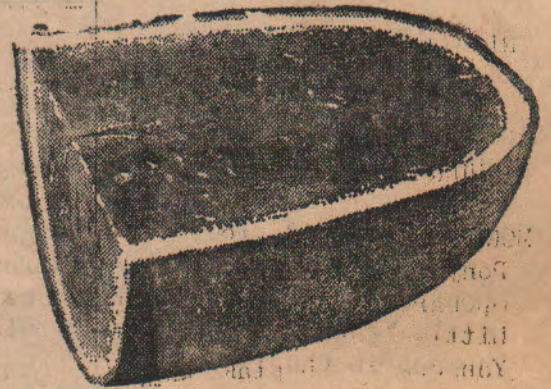

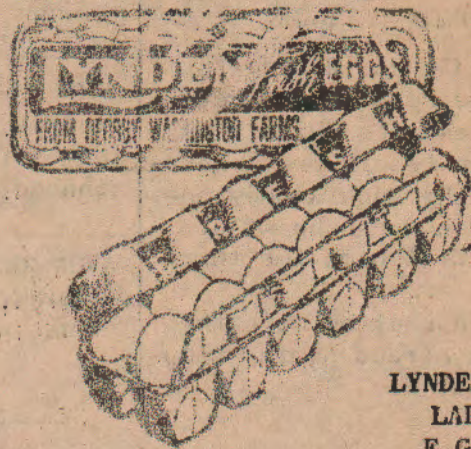
