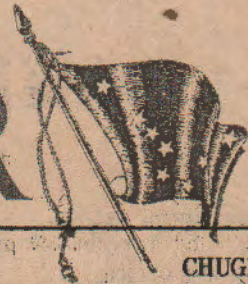

MTA MEETING SET FOR AUGUST

HIGH WIND UPSETS TRUCK & TRAILER

KNIK BRIDGE: Gale force winds blowing down the Knik River overturned a pickup truck and the 12 foot house trailer that it was towing as the vehicle was crossing the Knik River Bridge. The driver, Genevieve Gull of Fairbanks complained of possible rib injuries, and was taken to the Valley Presbyterian Hospital in Palmer for observation.

Traffic was temporarily held up until a wrecker could be summoned to remove the truck and trailer, both of which had been blown over onto their sides.

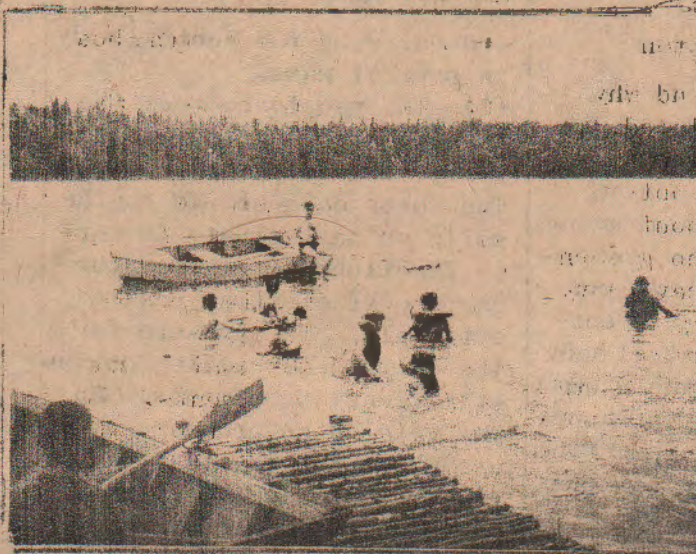
Damage to the truck was minor, but to the trailer was quite extensive.

Winds at the time of the accident were estimated to be in gusts in excess of 50 mph.

VOTERS ADVISED PRECINCT LOCATION

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Chugiak area are reminded that as of the coming August Primary election, they will no longer vote in the same precinct as in the past.

In compliance with the State Law governing the number of voters that any one voting precinct may have, the Chugiak precinct has been divided in two.

Those residing in Township number 15 will continue to vote in the Chugiak voting precinct, with the polls located at the Chugiak VFW Hall at mile 21 (cont page 5 col 1)

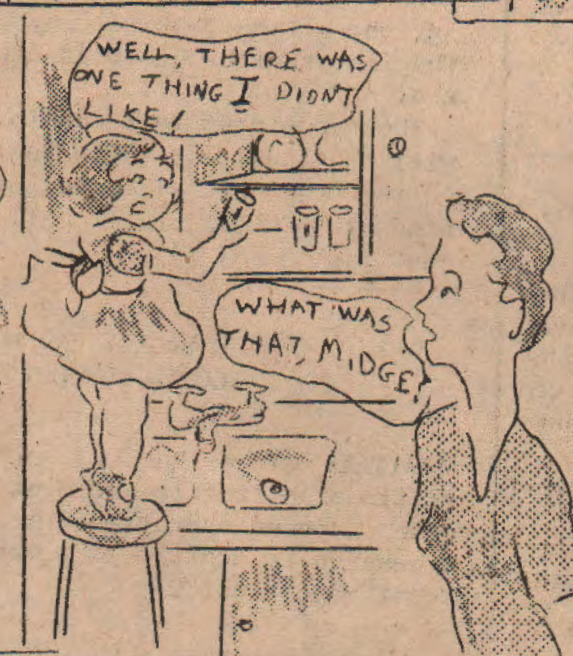
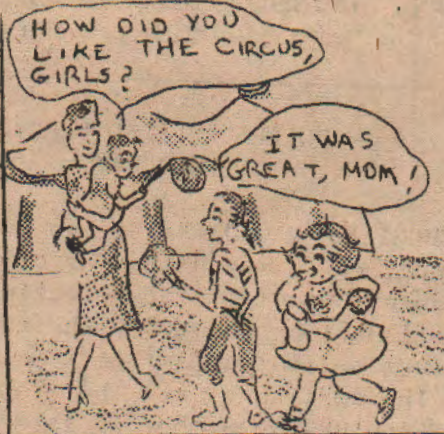
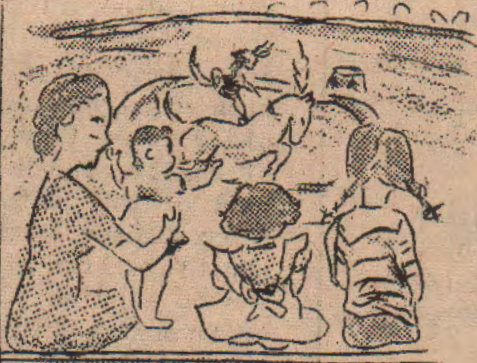
In order to understand why petitions are circulated, it is necessary to review the process of popular control of government. Without people there would be no government. In order to have government people delegate certain powers to a central body to act for them in their own interest. In order to insure that a central body is acting in the peoples interest, the people themselves maintain (next c. 1.)

control over the central body in several ways.

(1) The people control the government by voting and participating in party functions. The voter does not go to the polls or participate in party functions merely for the purpose of electing public officials. He may vote for the purpose of passing on constitutional amendments. OLD FASHION BEAN SALAD DRESSING

- 2 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup vinegar
- 1 cup water
- Butter (lump size of walnut)
- Salt
- 2 tbs mustard

BEAT eggs
ADD sugar, flour and salt
POUR vinegar and water
BOIL until thick
ADD butter and mustard

'Supermarket' In Kitchen Cuts Costs

How much does a trip to the supermarket cost? Much more than the total shown on the sales tape, says Dr. Helen G. Canoyer, dean of the New York State College of Home Economics.

Dr. Canoyer warns that there are hidden costs, not only in cash, but in time and energy, involved in supermarket shopping. Costs counted by Dr. Canoyer include travel to and from the store—the wear of extra mileage on the car and tires as well as the gasoline used.

She also adds up the energy sapped by rounding up the youngsters and readying them, finding a parking space, searching for the right items, and waiting in the check-out line.

No one wants to eliminate the efficiencies and pleasures of supermarket shopping, which Dr. Canoyer compares to shopping in the general store of an earlier era. But the wear and tear can be minimized by careful planning of meals and shopping lists, Dr. Canoyer explains.

Many homemakers find that with a large electric refrigerator-freezer in the kitchen, they can plan their supermarket purchases so that one weekly shopping trip is all that's needed.

Since today's electric refrigerator-freezers, in addition to holding generous amounts of food, have special compartments to keep various foods at the right temperature and humidity for best retention of flavor and quality, they serve much like supermarkets at home.

It is possible for today's homemaker to save many of the costly hours she previously spent on shopping trips if she plans carefully and keeps her own "supermarket"—a modern electric refrigerator-freezer—well stocked.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR STAR ROUTE DELIVERY

CHUGIAK: Some question has been raised recently as to who is eligible to receive their mail delivered to a Star Route box.

Paul Swanson at the Chugiak Post Office quotes the Postal Regulation which states "Patrons living on or near a Star Route, where the contract calls for box delivery and collection service, and not within one-fourth mile of any post office, may have their mail deposited on the line of the star-carrier route in a box so erected that the carrier may deliver and collect mail without dismounting (next col.)"

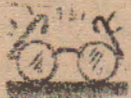

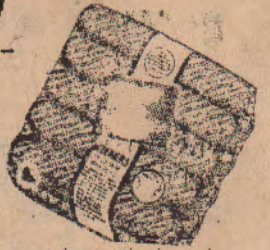

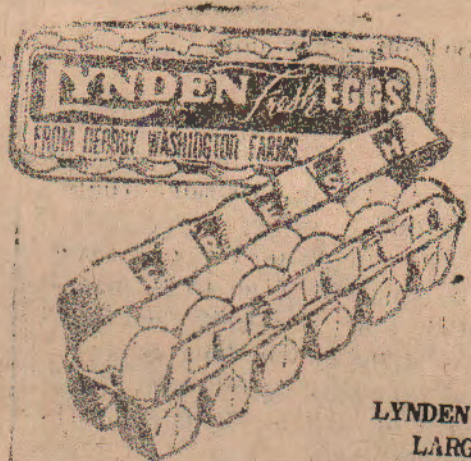
