EKSTEDT FOUND NOT ELIGIBLE FOR MTA CANDIDACY

EAGLE RIVER: Glenn Briggs, Chugiak member to the nominating committee for the MTA Board of Directors announced regretfully that Jum Ekstedt will not be eligible as a candidate for nomination from the floor at the annual meeting.

Briggs asked that all responsibility for the situation be placed upon his shoulders, as he had failed to read the by-laws thoroughly enough.

According to the by-laws, to be eligible to serve on the Board of Directors, the Candidate must have been a member and subscriber for a period of not less than thirty days prior to the election.

Ekstedt will not have been a memer for that length of time.

Briggs went on to say that Ekstedt is still anxious to serve the community in this capacity, and will be available to accept a nomination for the board next year.

The funds taken in at this booth plus those matched by the NEA will be used to the \$400 assessment which each Alaskan community must meet each year, and any over that will be used to help provide supplies for the Public Health Nurse.

The cake for which Louise gives us a recipe this week calls for a little more time and trouble than most of us have the habit of giving to a cake...but the results are worth it!

POUND CAKE

· Atten

5 eggs

2 cups cake flour

1 2/3 cups sugat

½ pound butter

1 tsp. vanilla

CREAM butter, adding sugar gradually *

ADD eggs, one at a time alternating with flour BAKE 1 hour at 350°

* Louise says the secret is in the creaming. She sometimes will let her mixer run as long as forty five minutes, until the butter and eggs are as light as foam. The cake will then be high and wonderfully tender.







A number of prospective absentee voters are applying for ballots by mail, although the voters are still at their place of residence. While absentee balloting material will be sent to such persons, it is sometimes more simple to vote in person before a magistrate, Secretary Made stated.

There must be attesting witnesses or a notary present in order that an absentee voter may have his balloting certified. Magistrates perform this function without charge to the voter.

substation facilities will be at least \$58.3 million, not \$47 million.

The installed cost will therefore be about \$945 per i kilowatt for 61.8 MM of dependable capacity.

The transmission line to Anchorage will be over 180 miles in length, and will traverse areas where hazards are high and maintenance difficult.

There is a definite question as to whether Bradley can thus be considered firm power for the Anchorage area. It must be pointed out that the Cooper Lake line has been under construction for two years and is not yet finished.

Problems of right of way over Forest Reserve, and loss of structures, have been problems already encountered.

The same route would no doubt be followed by the Bradley Lake line.

Mine-mouth generation can be installed in the Anchorage area for about \$260 per K.J.

A plant of comparable size will return over \$300,000 a year to the local economy in wages and supply purchases.

Bradley Lake will make no significant return to the area.

Bradley Lake Power will cost very close to 11 mills per in/ delivered in Anchorage, while a mine-mouth plant can deliver it for 9 mills or less. /

The construction time for the Bradley Lake plant is 5 years, as opposed to a little over 2 years for a mine-mouth plant.

Regardless of length of time required to amortize Bradley, whether 50 or 100 years, the same amount of dollars must be exported to Washington.

If Bradly is built it will affect the feasibility of any other plant now under consideration, particularly those contemplating use of REA funds.

The construction of Bradley Lake will not provide power for the Fairbanks area. An additional \$15 million must still be spent there, An integrated, G&T approach, as recommended in the Parsons Report, can provide over a total of 90 MW of capacity for the entire Central Alaska area, for an expenditure of \$40 million, and the added advantage of a tie line between Anchorage and Fairbanks area, to promote develppment.

The Parsons Plan is still, to date, the only comprehensive, long range plan which has been advanced, as opposed precement approaches, such as Bradley.
