## MAN DROWNS IN FIRE LAKE

### PETERS CREEK MAN DIES

**PETERS CREEK:** A tragic sequel to a dramatic rescue story was written Friday with the death in Providence Hospital of Lloyd Ray Severance 35 of Peters Creek.

Severance's death was due a heart infection which was aggravated by the strenuous physical effort which he put forth in an attempt to get help for his brother-in-law Al Lameroux who was injured when a tractor he was bringing down from the mountain where he was homesteading, overturned.

Severance ran many miles through the snow down the mountain to the Glenn Highway to get help, and the effort coupled with the latent heart infection resulted in his subsequent death.

Severance, had been living on the Earl Ray Homestead as caretaker, and in the winter drove one of the Chugiak School buses.

He is survived by his widow, (cont page 7 col 1)

**FIRE LAKE:** A 78 year old Juneau man was drowned in the waters of Uper Fire Lake on Sunday.

Police interviewed Kenneth Laughlin of Anchorage who stated that he and his house guest, Ernest W. Berggren of Juneau had taken a boat into the lake to retrieve a float which had gone a-drift.

He said that Berggren had stood up in the boat and was reaching for the float when the boat capsized, dumping both men into the water.

Laughlin, who said that he was not a good swimmer managed to make his way to shallow water, where upon he turned to look for Berggren, who he thought was following him, and the man was not in sight.

Laughlin, then stated that he called to two men who were water skiing on the lake for help.

Lawrence Earles and Evrette Brown, both residents of Fire Lake were able to locate Breggren's body in about 20 feet of water approximately 50 feet from the shore.

They were able to bring the victim ashore, but Breggren, who had been under water for approximately fifteen minutes by that time showed no indication of being alive.

Breggres is survived by his daughter Mrs. Bernice Day of Marysville Washington who has been notified.

Funeral arrangements are pending.

In order to understand the difference between a borough Manager and a Borough Chairman, we must have a look at the three branches of our government as provided by the Federal Constitution.

(1) Our constitution, which follows the principle of separation of powers, assigns the legislative, executive, and judicial functions to three independent and coordinate organs of government (next col

(2) Each of the three branches is given certain powers which enable it to impose checks upon, but not to override and control, any of the others.

(3) The chief members of each branch are responsible to themselves and to the people.

(4) The chief executive and legislature are chosen by direct vote of the people.

# THE COOK OF THE MONTH

It was with the greatest of difficulty that we were able to persuade our cook for July to take time from her busy schedule to share some of her recipes with us.

Louise Long, who has always given much of her time in community service is now plunged in a new and exciting career, which is also aimed at serving her state and community.

Always interested in government, Louise was prevented from taking an active part because of the eighteen years she spent in Federal Service.

Now, now longer in Government employ, Louise consented when a group of her neighbors, aware of her efforts toward community approval, asked her to be a candidate to the State House of Representatives.

Louise, and her husband Ralph came to Alaska in the summer of 1951, prompted by the same gypsy urge that has brought so many "Chugiakans" to the forty ninth state.

Ralph went immediately to work for the Alaska Rail-Road in whose employ he has remained. Louise, who is a registered nurse, worked at the old 5005<sup>th</sup> Air Force Hospital until December of 1952, when she resigned due to the impending arrival of little Nancy.

After Nancy's birth, Louise went to work at the Alaska Native Service Hospital, first in nursing and then in Hospital Administration.

The Longs lived on Government Hill and then in Anchor Park before moving to Chugiak in August of 1957.

They purchased land off the Eagle River Road and

so many of us, spent their first winter living in the basement. Since then, room by room, their lovely log home has taken shape.

Louise is well known in Chugiak, for she says that her hobby is people, and she has indeed spent all of her spare time in activities which have brought her close to the people of this community.

She first joined the Chugiak Health Council and has been President of that Body for the past three years. Last year she served as vice President of the Chugiak PTA, and during that time was also Secretary Treasurer of Operation Chugiak High School. She was also treasurer of the first community Welfare group (now assimilated into the Health and

welfare council) and is an active member of the Eagle River Baptist Church.

Despite her outside activities, Louise still finds time to enjoy her home and admits that gardening is one of her hobbies, but because of the continuous construction on their property has had little opportunity to indulge it recently.

In addition to their daughter Nancy, the Longs have a foster daughter Mary Griffin age seven who is staying with them while her parents are in service with the Bureau of Public Roads in Iran.

Louise is an old friend to most of us; and those who do not know her will find her name and face becoming quite familiar within the next few weeks.

We feel sure that you will enjoy becoming better acquainted with her and sharing some of the secrets of her kitchen.

For her first recipe, Louise gives a favorite dessert, one she has used to treat hard working fellow OCHS members after midnight sessions.

## REFRIGERATOR DESSERT

- ½ lb. vanilla wafers (crushed)
- ½ cup soft butter
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 2 unbeaten eggs
- CREAM sugar with butter
- ADD eggs one at a time beating constantly
- BEAT 1 cup whipping cream (or 1 pkg. Dream Whip)
- ADD 1 cup chopped nuts and 1 cup chopped marschino cherries
- COMBINE with butter-sugar mixture
- LINE 8" x8" pan with ½ of vanilla wafers
- POUR filling on top
- TOP with balance of wafers
- ALLOW to stand in refrigerator overnight
- \* Will keep for two or three days

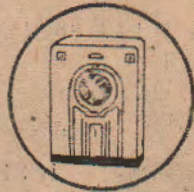

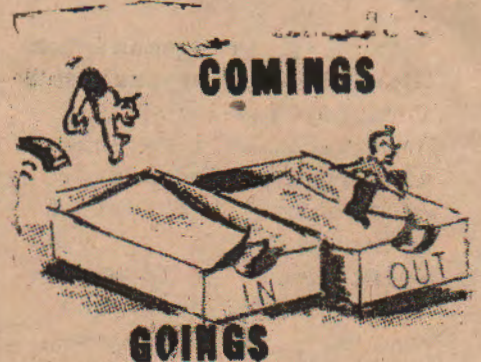
**BIDS OPENED FOR EAGLE RIVER SCHOOL**

**JUNEAU:** J.B.Warrack of Seattle, has entered the apparent low bid for the construction of an addition to the Eagle River school, northeast of Anchorage, Richard Downing Commissioner of the Alaska Dept. of Public Works stated.

Downing said the Seattle firm bid \$296,000 for the basic, eight classroom addition, and quoted a price of \$230,000 for the project if the dressing room section and some of the landscaping is omitted.

Warrack's bids were lower than those entered by four other firms, Downing said.

Leonard Lowell, director of the Division of Buildings of the Department of Public Works, said specifications call for the construction of one-story concrete, concrete block and frame additions to the existing school. The additions will consist of eight classrooms, a library, lavatories, janitor rooms, store rooms, corridors, dressing rooms, shower rooms, apartment facilities and site improvement.

If we have a borough chairman, he is elected by direct vote of the people. He would be the Chief Executive of the Borough. The borough assembly, elected by the voters would be the legislative branch of the borough. Each branch could impose checks and balances upon each other.

The executive could check the legislative by veto of undesirable ordinances. The borough assembly could check the borough chairman by placing numerous restrictions on enforcing legislation, or failing to provide the money necessary to his operation.

If we have a Borough Manager, we would have a person to run the affairs of the borough who is appointed by the borough assembly. He serves at the pleasure of the borough assembly. He has no veto power. He cannot introduce legislation even though there is a great need. This places both the legislative branch and the executive branch under the borough assembly. To have a borough manager would be the equivalent to having our governor appointed by the state legislature, rather than elected by the people.

Could you imagine the kind of executive branch of government we would have in this state if our executive branch were serving at the (next col.)

pleasure of our state representatives? There would not be enough "pork barrels" to go around.

If an incorporation election is held then vote for a borough manager: if you want a city manager appointed to borough manager; if you want the entire executive branch of the borough under the city council, who will be in control of the assembly.

Vote for a borough chairman: if you want an executive elected by the people; if you want an executive who can impose a check and balance on the borough assembly; and if you want to continue the tradition of successful check and balance type of government.

To be included in a borough from Knik River to Portage means we will be subject to the whims of the first class city. To be included in this size borough and also have a borough manager would be equivalent to moving the city limits to Knik River and Portage.

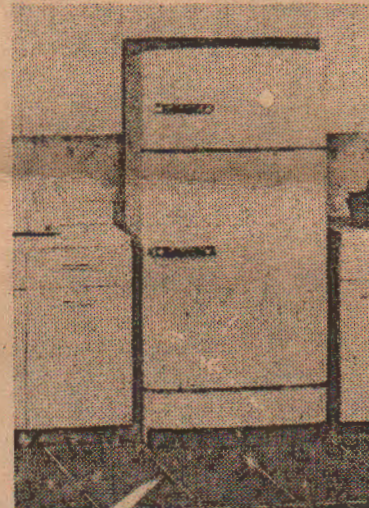
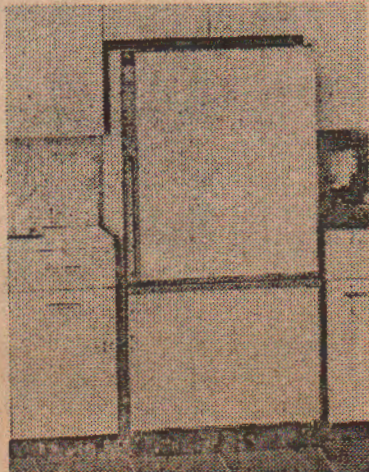
