Governor William W. Egan will officiate in a ribbon cutting ceremony which will open to traffic the new bridge and four miles of road.

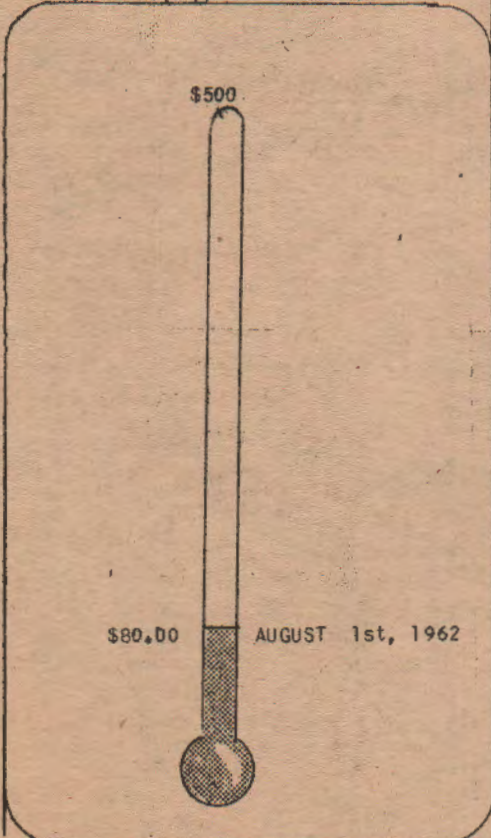
According to Roy Jenkins, Anchorage District Engineer for the Division of Highways, the new bridge and highway leading to it have cost approximately 1,000,000 dollars of which the state of Alaska pays 5%; the remainder being paid by the Federal Government.

Jenkins also stated that

460,000 cubic yards of earth was moved to make the fill. He said that the new bridge is 28 feet wide and 240 feet long as opposed to the old bridge which was 20 feet wide and 180 feet long. He also (cont page 10 col 2)

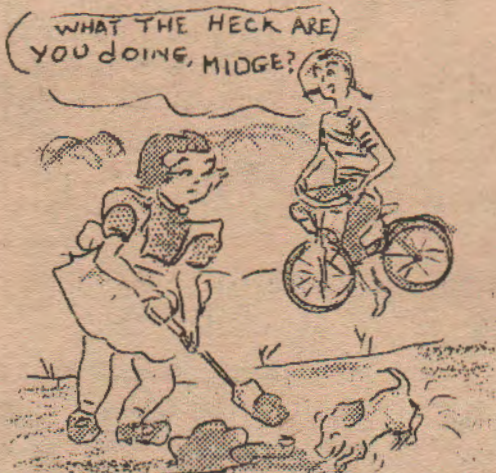
ool districts, will be disbanded by July 1, 1963.

We found Sunny one of the most charming ladies we have ever interviewed, and know that our readers will enjoy sharing some of her unusual cooking methods.

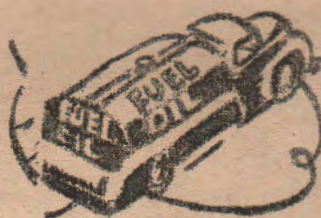
The pride of Sunny's cast-iron collection is an antique waffle iron, which is heated on top of the stove. Here is her favorite recipe for waffles

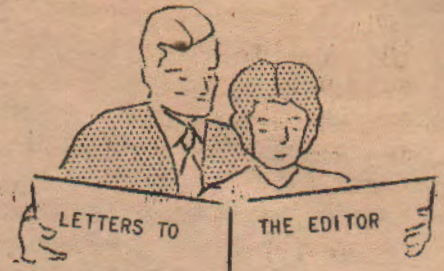

Dear Sir:

The recent article published 14 June, 1962 and subsequent article published 12 July 1962 quoting Mason Lazelle, manager of the Matanuska Valley Cooperative does appear grossly unreasonable to the writer.

The claims made by Mr. Lazelle that steam power is more economical than the proposed hydroelectric power from Bradley Lake have not been substantiated and are very contradictory to the published report of the Corps of Engineers for Bradley Lake which uses steam power as a basis for calculating the benefit-cost ratio of 1.7 to 1.

While Mr. Lazelle's conclusions are merely assumptions, the Bradley Lake report has been approved by all the State and Federal agencies reviewing it, including the Federal Power Commission and the Bureau of the Budget who assuredly have well qualified personnel to determine feasibility of electrical generation proposals.

The problems for traversing the lands needed for erection of transmission line within the National Forest on the Kenai Peninsula have been resolved, so it is most doubtful that this hazard exists.

It is correct that the construction time is greater for a hydroelectric project than for a steam plant, however once the hydro plant is completed and the loan is amortized, the costs for generation are extremely low.

Steam generation requires the continuous expenditure of funds to mine the coal for operation. Labor prices continue to mount and steam engines do wear out and require replacement.

As one local resident recently stated, "The good Lord hasn't changed the rates for rain in a 1000 years and isn't expected to in the future."

The figure of nine mills advanced by Mr. Lazelle is not consistent with information verified by the Federal Power Commission. On a 100 year amortization schedule, the figure furnished by the Corps of Engineers is 5.7 mills at the generation site.

Whether the dollars that come from Washington, D.C. are used for Bradley Lake, or for an R.E.A. loan for the mine-mouth steam plant at Sutton, repayment is still made to Washington D.C. It might be well to remember that some of those dollars are Alaskan dollars and we need them in Alaska just as much as in Iran, Yugoslavia, Ghana or any of the foreign countries that are receiving billions in financial assistance from the American government.

Perhaps one of the major reasons that the residents of the Homer area are so solidly in favor of the Bradley (next col.)

Lake project is because we are tired of paying 150 mills for the first 50 kilowatts of energy used.

Even though the Homer Electric Association is now buying Cooper Lake power at 13 mills, our consumer rates have not gone down one mill because of the long debt accumulation from prior years operation.

Construction of the transmission line from Bradley Lake will open up a whole new area to settlement and will give greater impetus to the proposed Turnagain Causeway and will provide the opportunity to interest light industry in the area until 2 mills power becomes available from Rampart Dam.

In all likelihood as further power studies are made it will be shown that there is a need for the coal-mine mouth generation plants in addition to hydroelectric power sources. Certainly, the construction of Rampart Dam is not based on a quarter million Alaskan power consumers! Accordingly, it does appear that (next col.)

The community of Whittier has requested to remain out of the proposed Captain Cook Borough. The Knik Arm Community residents have expressed a desire not to be included in the Captain Cook Borough. The spokesman from the Rabbit Creek area stated that this area would withdraw support from the Captain Cook Borough. The mayor of the city of Anchorage has expressed a personal opinion that not enough time has been given to the study of area government to insure it being satisfactory.

The lack of definite information as to how the big borough will affect each and every one of us has caused some alarm. The very silence of steering committee has caused many people to become suspicious.

If all the communities of the proposed Captain Cook Borough were socially, economically and geographically tied together there would be no problem in forming a government of the area.

If the State wishes to adopt the borough as a reality then it must accept boroughs at the smallest size acceptable to the people.

The law allows for consolidation of boroughs, which (next col)

can be accomplished at a later date if necessary.

The law allows for the incorporation of school or second class boroughs.

There is nothing in the Borough Act that says there must be a First Class City in each and every borough. No doubt the League of Alaska Cities would like to have the boroughs so constructed. This guarantees them the freedom and right to expand to the limits of the borough.

These and many other reasons contribute to the dislike and non-cooperativeness of the people of the area.

We have not been shown as yet where we will be better off in the Captain Cook Borough than in a school borough. Why should we assume the debts of another school district? Why should we be taxed by another community?

You can work toward a community goal by signing the petition TO BE EXCLUDED FROM THE PROPOSED CAPTAIN COOK BOROUGH.

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**EMPLOYEES ADVISED
OF POLITICAL ACTIVITY**

WASHINGTON DC: All Federal employees are subject to the Hatch Act, a law which specifically prohibits certain political activities. A Federal employee may vote as he wishes and express his opinions as long as he does not do it in such a manner as to take an active part in political management or political campaigns of a partisan nature. He may attend rallies and join clubs, but cannot take an active part in the conduct of the rally or the operations of the club, or act as chairman, officer, committee member or delegate.

He may vote on issues, but may not speak for or against them. He may attend rallies and join clubs provided this does not in any way constitute taking an active part in political management or political campaigns.

He may wear badges or buttons or display political posters or pictures in the windows of his home or on his automobile.

He may not participate in active operation of a political club, march in a political parade, be a candidate for office filled on a partisan basis, campaign for a

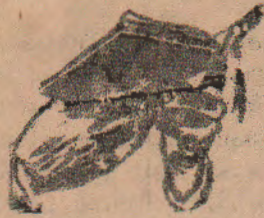

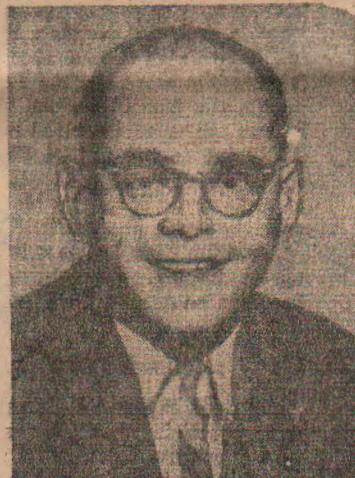

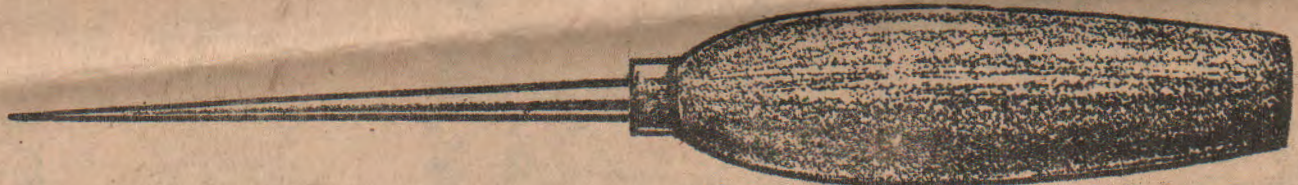
