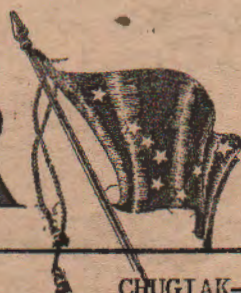

GINGER MACKEY DIES LOCAL ELECTION RESULTS

ANCHORAGE: Funeral Services were held Monday, for six year old Ginger Lee Mackey, died last Thursday, August 9th in the Children's Orthopedic Hospital in Seattle.

Ginger had been struck down last May by a car, as she ran to catch the school bus.

After clinging to life for three months, the little girl finally succumbed to her injuries, and was returned to Alaska for burial.

Services were held at the First Church of the Nazarene in Anchorage, officiated by Rev. M.R. Karody. A public visitation was held on Sunday at (cont page 10 col 1)

FIRE COMPANY THREATENED WITH LOSS OF EQUIPMENT

CHUGIAK: Art Wallace, Chief of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company stated that he had received word from the office of Civil Defense that the Fire Company might lose the equipment which is on loan to them from the Civil Defense Office.

In a letter from the Director of Civil Defense, (see page 2 for letter to the editor) Wallace was informed that the equipment was not being maintained in accordance with the standard established by that office, and that if the situation was not corrected within a thirty day period the equipment might be removed and sent to another area.

CHUGIAK: When the polls closed in both of the local precincts, a total of 579 votes had been cast, 261 in the Eagle River precinct, and 318 in the Chugiak precinct.

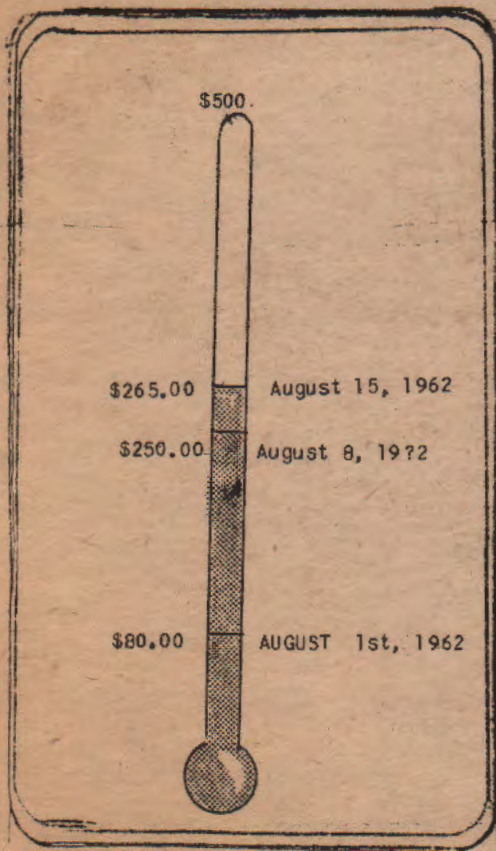

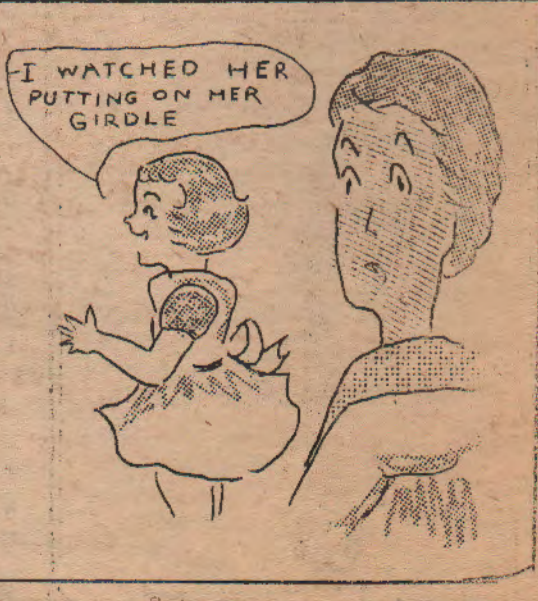

If I am wrong I can blame the city, If the city is wrong it says with pity, "The state must have erred along the line, 'Cause my crossbred pet is doing fine."

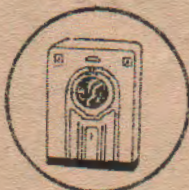
The great Captain Cook borough to be, Will extend from the Chigach to the sea, It will extend from the great Knik, To the Port of Whittier and Portage Creek.

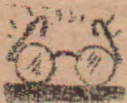
Mr. Harold Deam has returned to his home in Buffalo New York after visiting with his son Raymond Deam of mile 21 1/2.

The Alaskan exhibit is free, and the only item offered for sale is a kit containing small paper three dimensional Alaskan animals to be assembled, which sells for one dollar.

The Alaskan exhibit is located in a large dome shaped building, which was built for the State of Alaska by the National Bank of Commerce of Seattle.

It is located in the shadow of the Space Needle, and is one of the more popular exhibits at the Fair.

funds used to keep the equipment in working order and to furnish fuel oil to heat the fire hall are raised from subscriptions from residents of the community.

Wallace said that in the past year voluntary subscriptions had dropped off to the point where it was not possible to maintain the equipment according to Civil Defense Standards.

Chief Wallace asked that the residents of the area be made aware that if the Civil Defense equipment is removed from this area that Chugiak will be without any fire protection what so ever.

He explained that as long as this community had a working fire company with operating equipment, that in the event of fire, assistance could be called from any of the other Fire Departments in the vicinity with which Chugiak has a mutual aid agreement (i.e. Eagle River, Tudor Road, Huldoon Road, Ft. Richardson or Elmendorf).

If Chugiak does not have the equipment with which to offer mutual aid to these (next col.)

other organizations, then they are prevented by state law from coming to this area to answer a fire call.

Wallace said that the Fire Company is working on a plan to hold a subscription drive. He said that the annual subscription per family is \$25, but that any amount that can be given at this time would be welcome.

LOCAL GROUP TO CHOOSE HIGH SCHOOL SITE

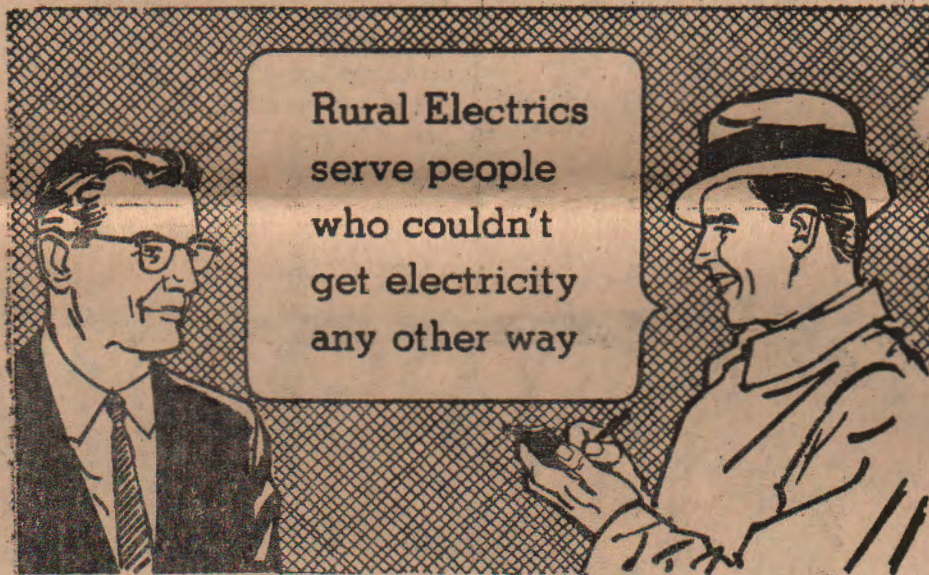

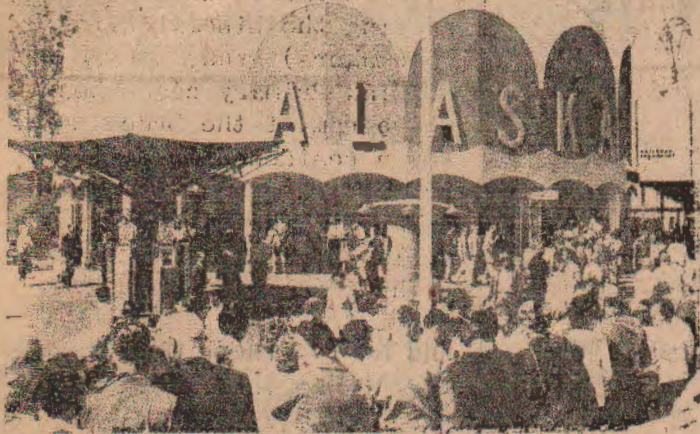

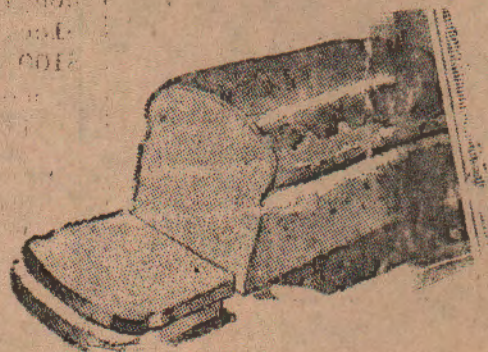
