ACCA PICKS NEW OFFICERS

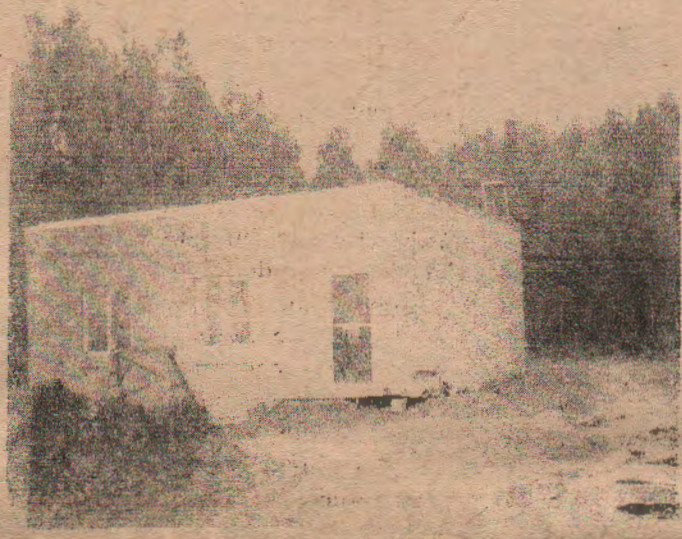
PRE-REGISTRATION DATE SET

CHUGIAK: Pre-registration dates for students who plan to attend the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools has been set for next Monday and Tuesday, August 27th and 28th.

Chuck Smith, school superintendent stated that the hours for registration would be, at the Chugiak School on Monday, between 9am and 4pm, and again between 7pm and 9pm in the evening.

Registration at the Eagle River School would be on Tuesday, during the same hours. Smith said that students may register at either school on either day, regardless of which part of the community they reside. He also said that all prospective

students must register, regardless of whether or not they attended school in this area last year.

He reminded that parents must bring birth certificates or other proof of age for children who will be entering the first grade. He also reminded that the state law requires that a student must be six years of age on or before November 1st to be eligible for school attendance.

Smith insisted that is essential that all students register, as many decisions must be made which will be based on the results of this registrations; these include whether there will be shifting, and if so, what type of shifts; where the division line will be established, making up the bus routes, placing of faculty members and ordering of supplies.

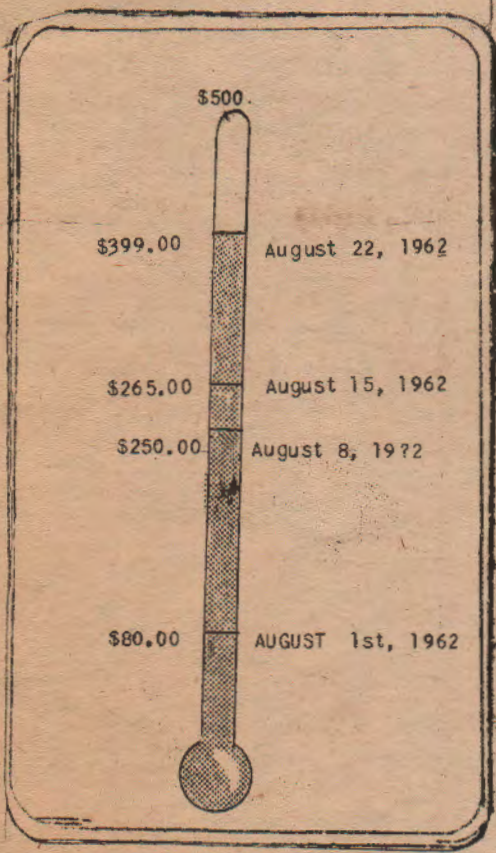
LOCAL AFFAIRS DIRECTOR TO SPEAK HERE

The prize of souvenirs range from under a dollar for the usual tourist gim-cracks to several hundred dollars for true art objects, leaving the Fair visitor

with a great range, hampered only by his own pocket-book.

Worthy of special mention, was the Yugoslavian building, housed in a crude shack built of rough timbers with a slab roof which to most Alaskan would have the familiar look of a homesteaders cabin. Inside however, was one of the most unusual array of gifts and furniture at

For example, a lovely walnut coffee table for only six dollars, or an equally lovely walnut record cabinet complete with sliding doors for only nine dollars.

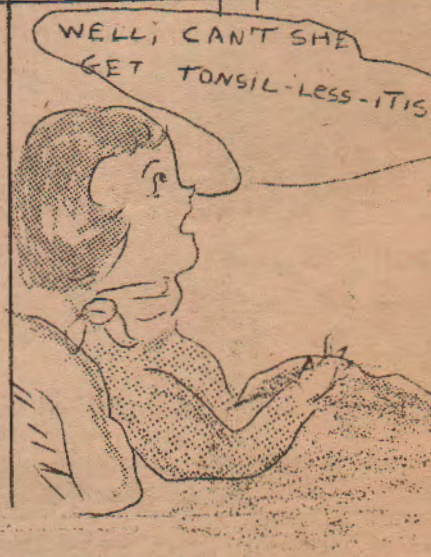
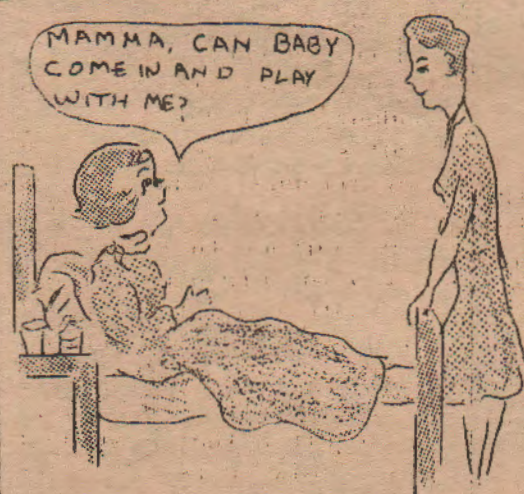
Another place worthy of mention was the Gems of the World building, where booths selling inexpensive but authentic costume jewelry from many foreign countries could be found.

She says "Another fruit stretcher prepared in advance, thanks to refrigeration today is to place your favorite fruit in the bottom of baked pie crust and cover with ready made cream filling top with graham cracker crumbs or oven baked bread crumbs

CREAM PIE FILLING

- 7 cups milk (3 1/2 cups water 3 1/2 cups canned milk)
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1/2 tsp salt
 - 2 tbs. flour
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 6 tbs cornstarch
 - 1 cup cold milk
 - 6 egg yolks (beaten)
 - 4 tsp vanilla
- SCALD together milk, 1 cup sugar, salt & 2 tbs butter
- MIX flour and 1/2 cup sugar
- STIR into hot milk
- REMOVE from heat
- ADD cornstarch mixed with cold milk, egg yolks and vanilla.
- STIR well
- RETURN to heat and cook, until thick.
- **Important to cover tightly and chill before lifting lid...seems to absorb the steam.**
- KEEP refrigerated
- USE as tempted for at least 6 pies.
- **If used at once, use egg whites for merangue.**

The highlight of the evening is to be the drawing for the rifle and the ladies fur parka which the club is giving away.

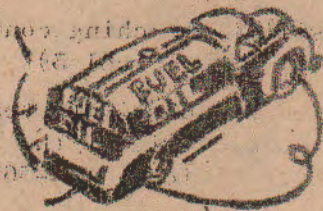
The funds are to be donated to the family of Ginger Mackey, to help them defray the extensive medical expenses which were incurred following Gingers accident.

CHUGIAK SCHOOL STILL WITHOUT PRINCIPAL

STAR ROUTE MAIL SERVICE EXTENDED

EAGLE RIVER: Rural mail deliver service has been extended to persons residing on the Eagle River (next col.)

(Star route)

road and the Eagle River Loop Road.

This will be an extension of the existing Star Route which has been serving the Birchwood Road and the Glenn Highway residents and which originates from the Anchorage Post Office.

The present mail carrier, Roman Spletztozer, will deliver and pick up mail from boxes placed along this route daily.

He will serve this section of the route immediately after making his stop at the Eagle River Post Office in the morning. He will then retrace his route to the Eagle River Road and proceed as far as the school bus turn around, approximately six miles up the road. He will then again retrace his route to the turn off of the Eagle River Loop, and proceed down that road to the Glenn Highway, where he will turn South to the Eagle River Post Office, and then proceed northward along his customary route.

Residents along the new route who wish to become Star Route Patrons are requested to erect mail boxes in accordance with the specifications as stated by the Post Office Department.

The address for these patrons, will also be Star Route Anchorage.

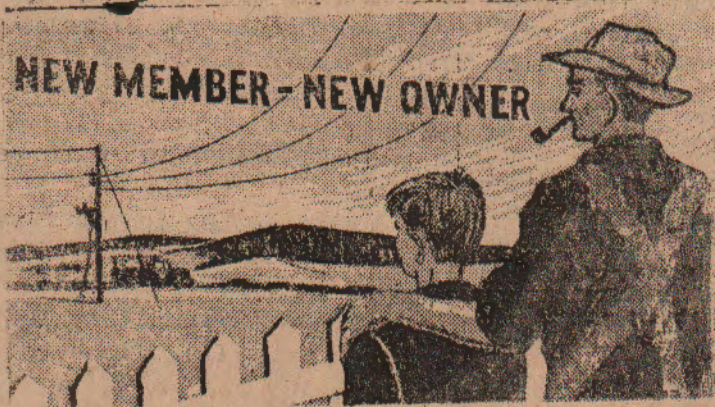

MTA CONSTRUCTION PROCEEDING ACCORDING TO PLAN

BUSINESS SIGNS NOT PERMITTED ON FEDERAL AID HIGHWAYS

EAGLE RIVER: Charles Carter, who recently relocated his business, the T&C Liquor store on the new section of highway leading from the new Eagle River Bridge, was informed that he would have to remove the sign which he had placed at the roadside indicating his business. (next col.)

Carter was informed that according to a law which was passed by the Territorial Legislature in 1949, only standard signs, which the Territory would design for rural businesses would be permitted to be used along the highways. The Territory was to design the signs, which the owners of the business establishment would then procure at their own expense.

The territory never did get around to designing these signs, nor did the State government, which continues to recognize this as the law ever come up with a standard sign.

However, the Federal Highway officials insisted that no non-standard signs will be permitted on any Federal Aid Highways, and the Carters were forced to take their sign down.

The only other business in the community to be affected by this law so far is Ethel's Draperies, located across the highway from T&C Liquors.

STOLEN CAR INVOLVED IN WRECK

OLD CHUGIAK: One driver was taken to Providence Hospital and the other arrested following a head-on collision at mile 19 early last Sunday morning.

Edwin Curtis, of Anchorage was proceeding toward Palmer when the car he was driving was struck head-on by a 1955 Buick sedan headed in the opposite direction.

When the state police arrived at the scene they found Baker suffering from chest injuries, but the driver of the other car had apparently fled on foot from the scene.

The ambulance which is on loan to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company was summoned, and Chief Wallace and Captain of Rescue Division Ted Brinck responded and transported Baker to Providence Hospital, where he was treated for broken ribs.

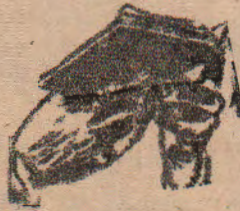

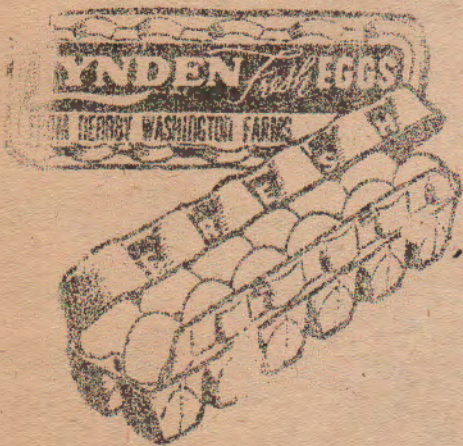

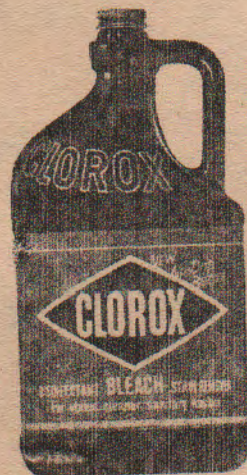
