ROAD HEARING URGED

ANCHORAGE: Bruce Kendall (R) member of the State House of Representatives urged that local businessmen demand an immediate public hearing regarding the proposed highway by-pass of the Eagle River Shopping area.

Kendall said that immediately upon reading about the proposed by-pass he wired the office of Governor Egan concerning the matter.

He received the following wire, signed by Gary Thurlough, administrative assistant to the Governor.

"The Highway Department has worked out a line which does not by-pass existing establishments. This plan has state approval and is now awaiting BPR approval. As soon as BPR has passed on plan, there will be a public hearing."

Kendall stated, "I am amazed that the state would

CHUGIAK: Tuesday, September 4th, will mark the "back-to-school" trek for the children of the Chugiak area, with certain marked changes from last year.

The division line for the two schools has been moved north to the point where the south end of the Birchwood loop road meets the Glenn Highway.

All students living south of this line will attend the the Eagle River School, those north, the Chugiak School.

Chuck Smith, superintendent of the Chugiak School system stated that the children attending the Chugiak School would observe a normal school day; but that the Eagle River School would be on double shifts until the addition, now under construction is completed.

He stated that shift number two would consist of all children who ride the bus to school, plus all those living on the Eagle River Homestead Road beginning with and including those living in the Eagle River Trailer Court.

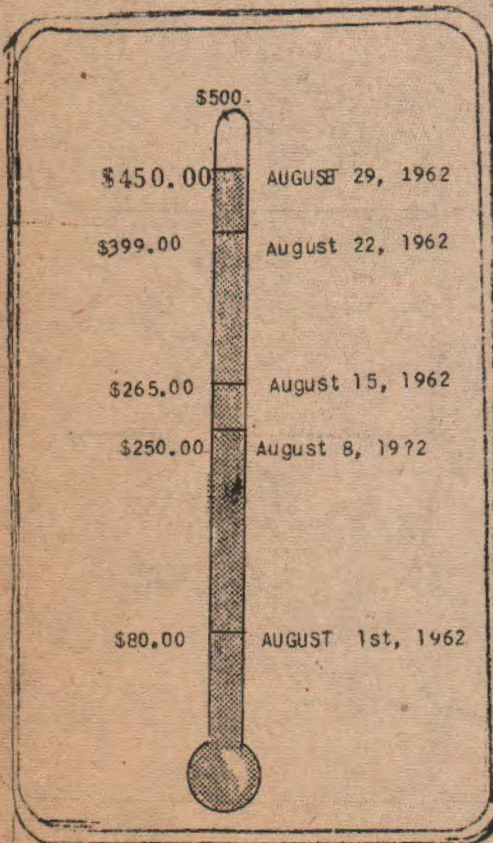
This shift will be the afternoon shift, and the normal hours will be from 12:35 pm until 5:05pm.

Smith also stated that in addition to Mr. Daley, who

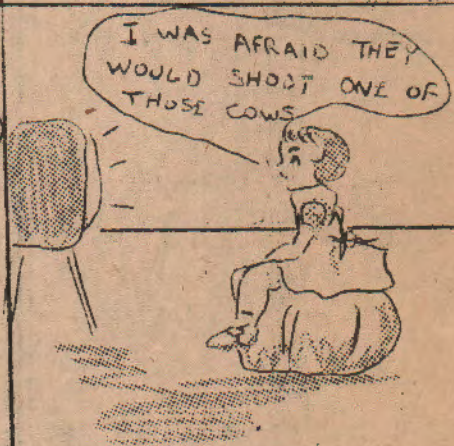
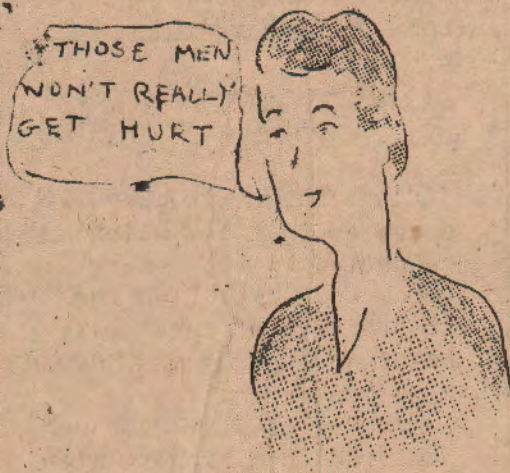
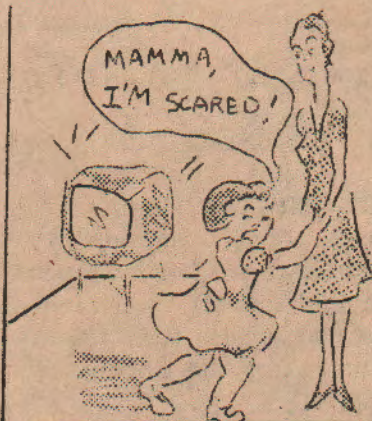
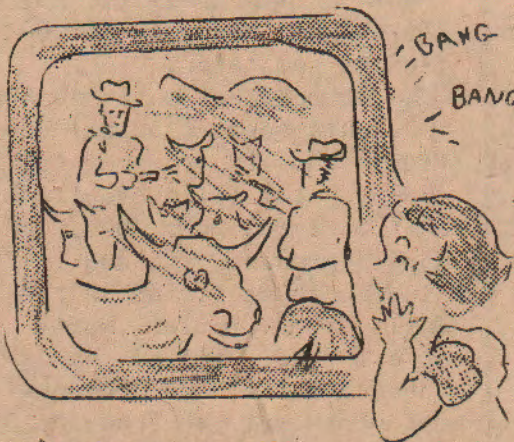

**COOK FOR AUGUST
SUNNY PLATZEK**

For her final visit to our Cook of the Month column, Sunny offers this observation: "Traditionally salads or a relish is a must for a dinner meal. Therefore, it is real fun to make up carrot relish now, for the winter months. Naturally, use from the abundance of Matanuska Valley Carrots:

CARROT RELISH

PUT THROUGH FOOD CHOPPER

- 5 LBS CABBAGE
- 4 bls. carrots
- 4 lbs onions
- 2 lbs green peppers

ADD 1/2 cup salt

ALLOW to stand 2 hours or overnight.

DRAIN well

BOIL

- 3 pints vinegar
- 4 cups brown sugar
- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 tbs. celery seed
- 3 tbs mustard seed.

ALLOW to cool

MIX with drained vegetables

PLACE in jars and seal (requires no cooking)

* The pickling liquid is also a grand recipe for pickled watermelon rind.

PEEL off green plus cut out the red.

CUT in 1" pieces

SIMMER in liquid until transparent.

SEAL while hot.

TAGGED ANIMALS TO BE REPORTED

JUNEAU: Moose hunters have been requested to cooperate with the State Department of Fish and Game by reporting the taking of any animals bearing an ear tag to the Anchorage office of the Department, according to Loren W. Croxton, regional game supervisor.

In the past three years, nearly 600 moose calves have been captured, tagged and released with the hopes that future returns will reward biologists with knowledge specimens and information on reproduction, survival, movements, and growth. Croxton said.

The jaw and ear should be salvaged by hunters and the precise location of the kill noted.

Biologists will pick up any specimens so collected. The Anchorage telephone number to call is FA-2-1959.

Tagged moose taken by people living outside Anchorage may be brought to the game department's attention by calling the above number collect.

Mr. Harman has been previously associated with Alaska Schools, having taught at the Tustumena School on the Kanai Peninsular.

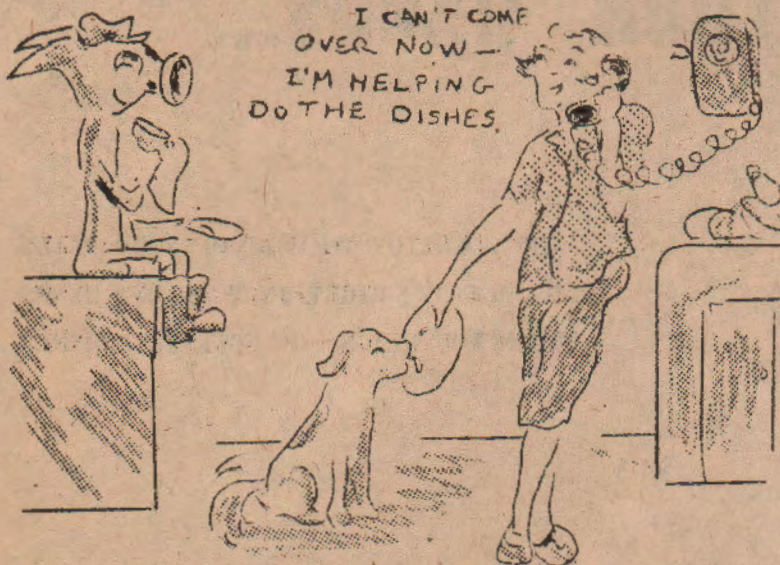
Smith also stated that Mrs. Elizabeth Thompson will serve in the capacity of Vice Principal of the Eagle River School.

ANCHORAGE: All commercial and private aircraft throughout Alaska will be grounded for three and one half hours on Sunday, September 2nd, from 9am until 12:30pm, Alaska Standard time., Federal Aviation Agency officials reminded the flying public this week.

Suspension of all civil flying activity for fine and one-half hours in continental United States and three and one-half hours in Alaska is to clear the skies for "Sky Shield III", the latest of a series of large-scale military air exercises conducted during the past few years over the entire North American land and sea area north of the Mexican border.

It is designed to provide the necessary framework for exercising the overall North American defense system.

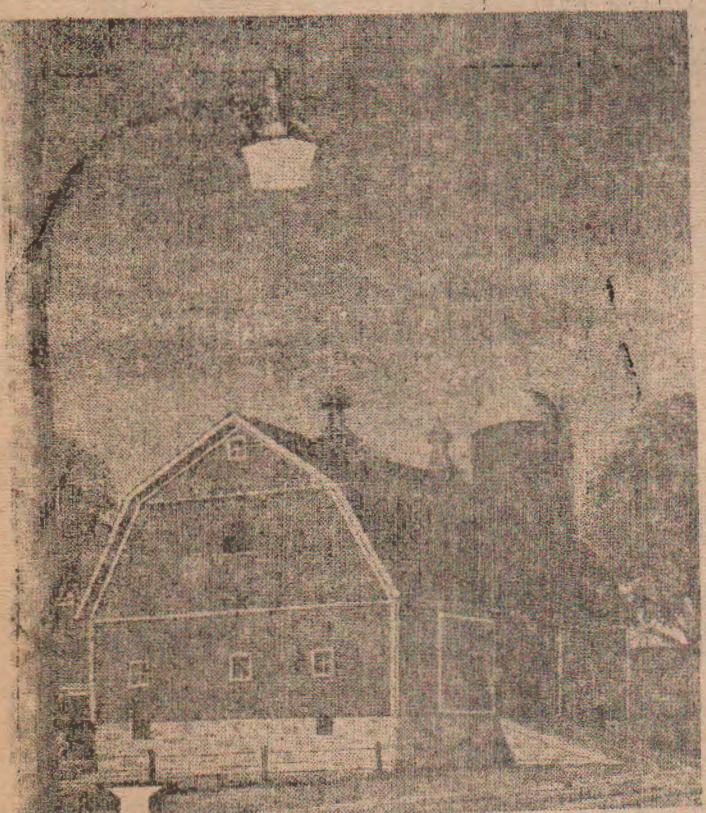

HOT LUNCH PRICE SCHEDULE

CHUGIAK: For the benefit of those parents who have children attending the Chugiak Schools for the first time, a schedule of prices of the lunches is published.

Lunches for single meals are, for students, 55¢ and for teachers 65¢.

Weekly lunch tickets may be purchased at the following rates.

One child in family, \$2.25 per week; two children in family, \$4.50 per (next col.)

(hot lunches) week. Three children in family, \$5.60 per week. Four children in family, \$6.80 per week. Five children in family, \$7.50 per week. Six children in family, \$7.50 per week.

Children carrying their lunches may purchase milk at 8¢ per day, or monthly at \$1.40. Milk for teachers is at cost, 11¢ per day.

The hot lunch program will begin at the Chugiak School on Wednesday, September 5th.

There will be no hot lunch program at the Eagle River School as long as double shifts are in effect.

the point at which students ride the bus will remain the same as last year.

Smith stated that the Chugiak School would not have double shifts, but would begin the day as in the past at 9am and school will let out at 3:30pm.

On Tuesday, the first day of school, students at the Chugiak School will arrive at school at 9am and return home at 11am.

At Eagle River on Tuesday, shift number one will arrive at school at 10 am.

Shift number two on Tuesday will begin at 1pm.

The buses to pick up the Eagle River students on Tuesday will leave their terminal points at 12:30pm.

The normal bus schedule for the Eagle River school will be for the shift number two; the buses will leave their terminal points at 12:05pm.

Daily schedule during the period that double shifts are in progress will be: for shift number one: 7:55am until 12:25pm. For shift number two, 12:35pm until 5:05pm.

Terminal point for the Glenn Highway bus will be the south end of the Birchwood Road. For the Eagle River Homestead Road it will be the same as last year.

Smith suggested that (next col.)

students on shifts bring a light snack to help tide them over.

There has not yet been a permanent bus schedule worked out for students attending the Chugiak school, however, Smith said that to begin with, the buses would closely follow the schedule observed last year, but he suggested that students allow a little extra time in the mornings.

He also expressed his regret that it was necessary to employ the double shifts, but pointed out that the only alternative would be overcrowded classrooms, which wrecks a much greater hardship on the students and the teacher.

He added that first and second graders normally would receive only four and one half hours of schooling in a day, and would not be affected by the shifts. Third graders, who usually receive 5 hours are affected only slightly.

The fourth through eighth graders, who normally receive six hours of schooling are the ones most affected, and in their case, teachers make adjustments in teaching schedules to compensate for the shorter school day.
