CHUGIAK: Both of the Parent Teacher Associations at the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools conducted their first meetings of the school year last night, and took advantage of the opportunity to hold a social hour to welcome the new teachers and introduce them to the parents.

The newly formed PTA at the Eagle River School, got off to a good start by forming a committee to organize a Halloween carnival. Mrs. Bob Thomas was chosen as chairman in charge of that project.

They also set up committees to form a Legislative committee (headed by Mr. Kaynor), a committee to investigate the land adjoining the Eagle River School, and to see what steps the state might be able to take toward acquiring it.

MINNESOTA FIRM DELAYS MTA CONSTRUCTION

PALMER: The Zontelli electrical contractors of Ironton Minnesota, have taken action which has caused an indefinite in the installation of the "outside plant", a part of the current expansion construction of the Matanuska Telephone Association in this area.

Zantelli, the apparent low bidders for the contract, were disqualified because of the fact that they did not have an Alaska State license. MTA, instead were prepared to award the contract to the next lowest bidder, Dodge electric and Forisbeck of Palmer.

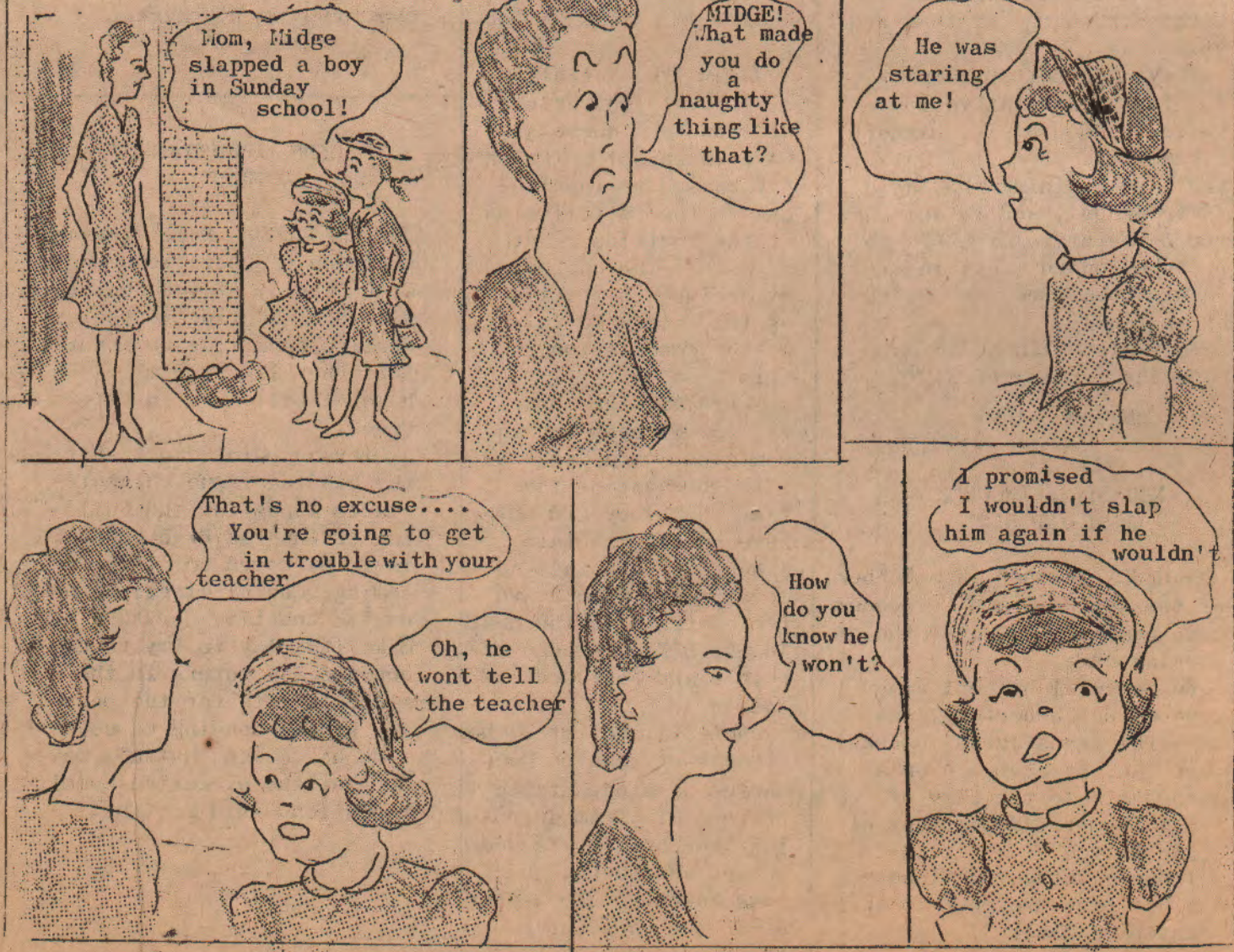

BLUEBERRY DUFF

COMBINE in bowl

2 1/2 cups sifted flour

3/4 cups butter (oleo)

1 cup sugar

(Reserve one cup of this mixture to be used as a topping)

MIX: 2 egg yolks

1 cup milk

ADD this to flour mixture

ADD 1/2 tsp salt

2 1/2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp vanilla

BEAT till smooth

FOLD in 2 stiffly beaten egg yolks

POUR over this:

1 can blueberries which have been thickened (this is in case you have not been able to go blueberry picking.)

TOP with reserved crumb mixture

BAKE at 375° for 35 minutes.

SCHOOL ZONE SENTRIES REPLACED

CHUGIAK: The school zone sentries have been replaced at the school crossings at the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools.

The signs, which post a 15 mph speed limit had been removed last spring on the orders of the Division of Highways, who claimed that signs of that type were in violation of the Federal Law on Federal Aid Highways.

The return of the signs was as the result of inquiries on the part of the Chugiak Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, who had furnished the signs for the schools.

According to a representative of the VFW, who spoke with Roy Jenkins, District Engineer for the Division of Highways in this area, Jenkins said that he could see no reason for not allowing the signs to be placed on the road during the hours of school.

This marks the second reversal of the stand which the Division of Highways had taken last spring.

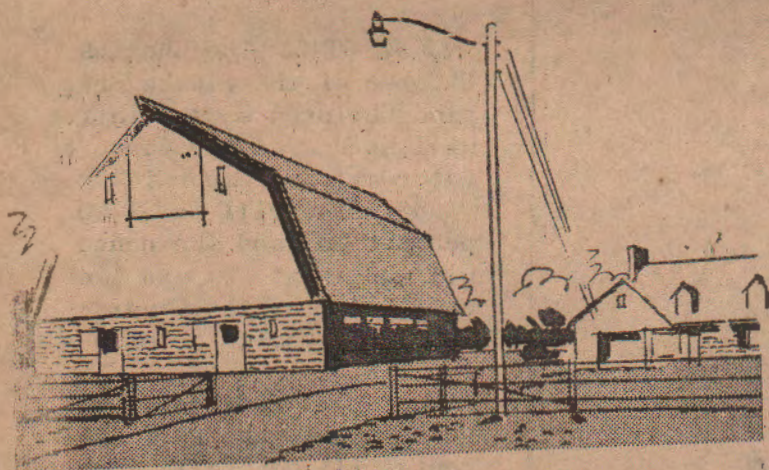

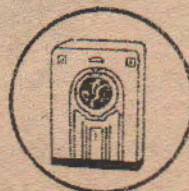

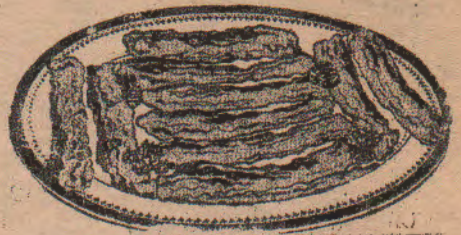
