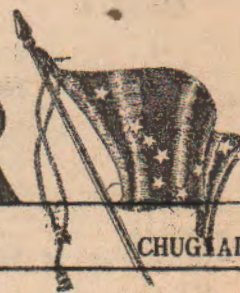

HIGH SCHOOL SITE SELECTED

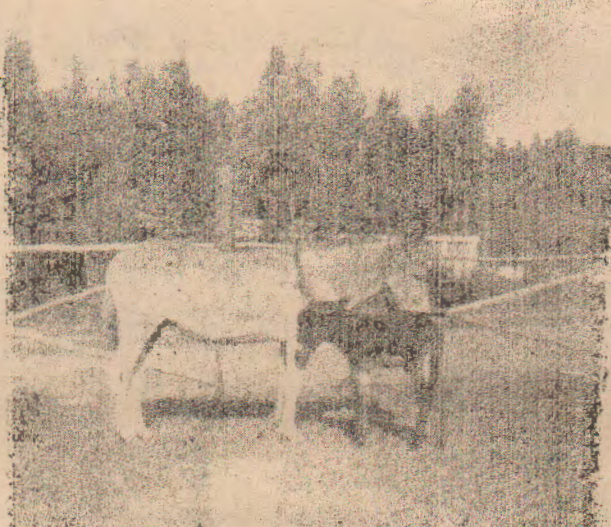
CATHOLIC CHURCH BEING BUILT

EAGLE RIVER: Construction on a Catholic Church in this area has begun, and is expected to be completed this fall.

The plans call for a basement to be constructed of concrete block,

This will provide a facility where Catholic Activities can be held, and masses can be said on Sundays.

Construction will be on a four acre plot owned by the St. Anthony Parish, which is located at the Artillery Road and Glenn Highway across from the Far North Service Station.

CHUGIAK: The local committee which has been reviewing sites on which to construct Chugiak High School has made their selection, and the information has been submitted to the state Department of Education for further approval.

The committee, which consists of members of the advisory school board, the OCHS executive committee and Chuck Smith, superintendent of the Chugiak School system, selected a tract which consists of approximately forty acres and is located in Section 17 and consists of lots 11, 12, 13 and 14 and the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 17 and the west one half of the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 17.

This land is located at mile 19 across the Glenn highway from the C.C. Call residence.

The land is state owned and is available for school construction; it now remains up to the engineers from the Department.

NOTICE

During a recent inspection and inventory of civil Defense Equipment at the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. by Don Lowell, State C.D. Director, it was found in dire need of essential fire fighting equipment and repairs were in order, as well as money for fuel oil and power needed, for the winter fire season is very near.

It is felt that the people living in the area above mentioned (Old Chugiak, Fire Lake, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Eklutna) who desire this fire and rescue protection should be responsible for helping the Chugiak volunteer Fire Co. maintain these vehicles, or at least for providing the funds for the maintenance of the Fire apparatus, heat and power for the Fire Hall.

If in 30 days, or by October 1st, sufficient money isn't raised to meet

the requirements of civil Defense, then the state will re-transfer all fire apparatus, from Chugiak, leaving the areas of Old Chugiak, Fire Lake, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Eklutna without any Fire equipment of any type.

Also, with no fire apparatus in operation in Chugiak, no mutual aid from outside areas will be available.

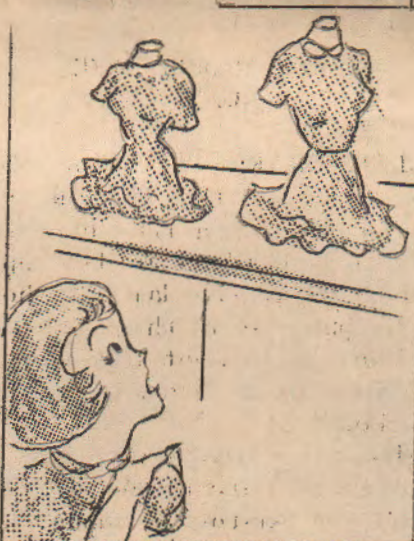

This week Madeline offers a tender tasty loaf rich with eggs and milk.

RICH EGG BREAD

- 2 cups milk (scalded)
- 2 cups water (hot)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tbs salt
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 pkg yeast
- 12-13 cups flour

COMBINE milk, water sugar shortening & salt

ADD 3/4 cups flour

BEAT until smooth

ADD eggs

BEAT in

ADD remaining flour

ALLOW to raise for five minutes

KNEAD until smooth and elastic (about 7 min.)

ALLOW to raise approximately 2 hours (til double)

PUNCH down

RAISE again about 45 minutes

PUNCH down and mold in pans

ALLOW to raise 1 hour or 45 minutes

BAKE at 350° for 15 minutes

REDUCE heat to 325°

BAKE for an additional 30 minutes.

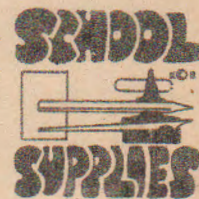

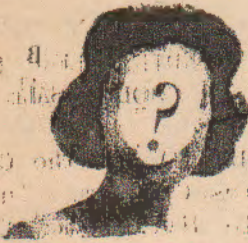

I sincerely hope a death isn't necessary to awake people to the realization that, though they may not be able to see the dwelling for the trees, Birchwood is quite heavily populated and that vacant area today can easily contain a new neighbor tomorrow.

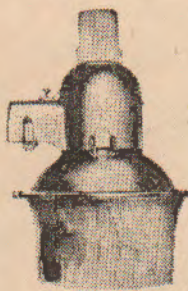
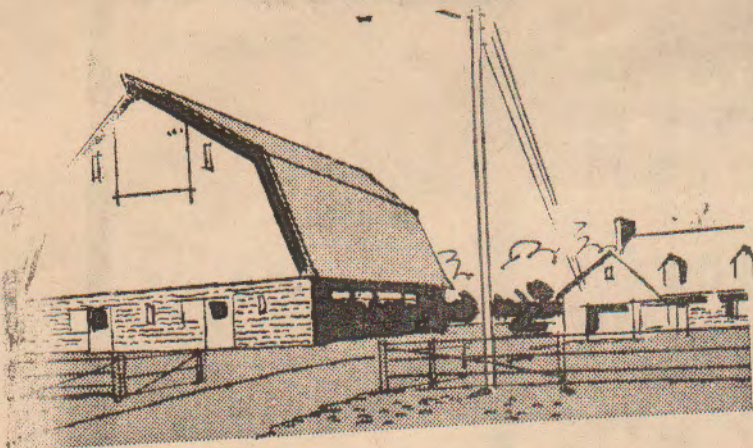

POPS CONCERT PLANNED

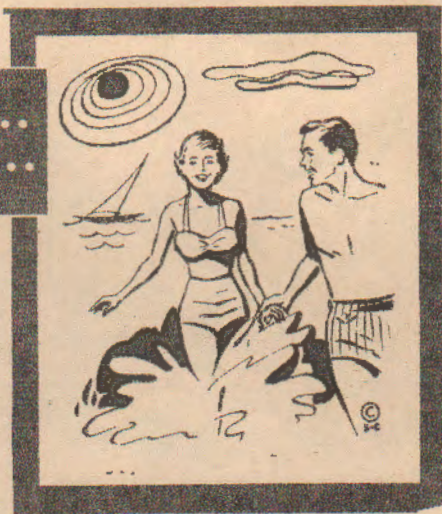

ment of Education to determine as to the suitability of the land as to drainage, location of water and other geographic elements.

The committee expressed optimism, as the land appears to be very desirable.

It is fairly level, being located on two large plateaus, which would be readily adaptable for building and landscaping. It is timbered with fairly large trees, and commands a breathtaking view of the inlet and Mt. McKinley.

Wayne Hull, chairman of the advisory school board stated that in the event that the Department of Education should come up with some item which would make this site unacceptable, he is still seeking suggestions for alternate locations.

He added that any land to be considered must be state owned, or if private, the (next col.)

owner would have to be willing to donate it to the state.

As the law reads, none of the funds whether appropriated or otherwise may be spent for the procurement of land.

some water."

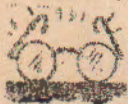
**LITTER ON HIGHWAY

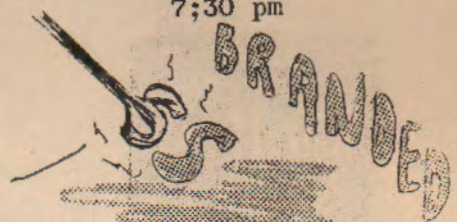

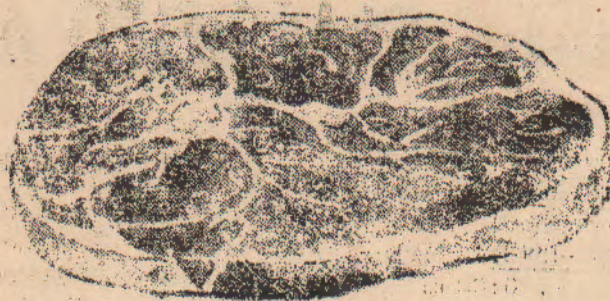

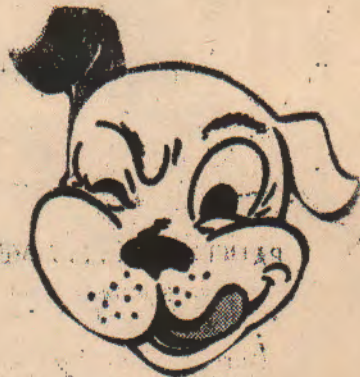
