Committee To Move Capital Formed Here

FIRE LAKE: A group of local residents and business men met last Thursday at Fire Lake Lodge for the purpose of forming a committee to raise funds toward assisting in the campaign to move the State Capital from Juneau to somewhere in western Alaska.

This was a bi-partisan movement and was attended by leaders of both the Democratic and Republican Parties in this community.

Approximately \$300 in donations and pledges was taken in.

George Allen of Peters Creek, and Clyde Cleary of Eagle River are still accepting further donations.

Allen said that within the next week, a door to door canvass is planned.

All funds taken in are to be turned over to the Capital Information Committee for the purpose of purchasing TV, radio and newspaper coverage.

HOMER: Bruce A. McDowell, 17, of Homer was found dead of drowning last Sunday, following his disappearance from the vessel "Grayling" last Thursday.

The boys body was recovered from the waters of the small boat harbor following a three day search.

His parents, who publish the Inlet Courier in Homer, formerly operated the Moosehorn Trading Post at mile

ANCHORAGE CURFEW HOURS EFFECTIVE HERE

CHUGIAK: State Police have been informed that the curfew which affects the young people of Anchorage is also effective and enforceable in this area as far as mile 23.

According to the law passed by the last State Legislature (Chapter 86, Section 1, Sessions laws of Alaska 1962 page 82) any curfew laws enacted by a city are enforceable by state police to a distance of 20 miles beyond the limits of that city.

This curfew affects people under seventeen years of age, and is 9:30pm on weeknights and 10:00pm on Friday and Saturday nights. Exceptions are when on legitimate errands for

CHUGIAK: Two Chugiak housewives have temporarily saved the fire equipment belonging to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company from repossession by the Department of Civil Defense.

Mrs. Kathy Walker and her neighbor, Mrs. Vi Hall were concerned by the lack of response to an appeal for funds by Fire Chief Art Wallace, and volunteered their services to conduct a house to house canvass to collect money for the Fire Company.

Carrying the firemans traditional red-round-bottomed bucket for identification, Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Walker have already contacted approximately one third of the residents of the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and have collected around \$250.

Chief Wallace told the ladies that this in itself is enough to winterize the equipment and heat the fire hall until the first of the year.

Mrs. Walker pointed out, however, that this initial drive is only a temporary measure, and that in order to be able to retain the equipment on a permanent basis, some regular system of fund raising must be established.

The ladies are thinking of organizing a group of teenagers into an auxiliary to the Volunteer Fire Company.

Mindfull of the success and enthusiasm which these young people showed the community in raising the funds to purchase the ambulance, Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Hall feel that they would be the logical ones to man a permanent committee to keep the Fire Company in Operating

NOTICE

During a recent inspection and inventory of civil Defense Equipment at the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. by Don Lowell, State, C.D. director, it was found in dire need of essential fire fighting equipment and repairs were in order, as well as money for fuel oil and power needed, for the winter fire season is very near.

It is felt that the people living in the area above mentioned (Old Chugiak, Fire Lake, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Eklutna) who desire this fire and rescue protection should be responsible for helping the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. maintain these vehicles, or at least for providing the funds for the maintenance of the fire apparatus, heat and power for the Fire Hall.

If in 30 days, or by October 1st, sufficient money isn't raised to meet

(notice)

the requirements of civil Defense, then the state will re-transfer all fire apparatus, from Chugiak, leaving the areas of Old Chugiak, Fire Lake, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Eklutna without any fire equipment of any type.

Also, with no fire apparatus in operation in Chugiak, no mutual aid from outside areas will be available.

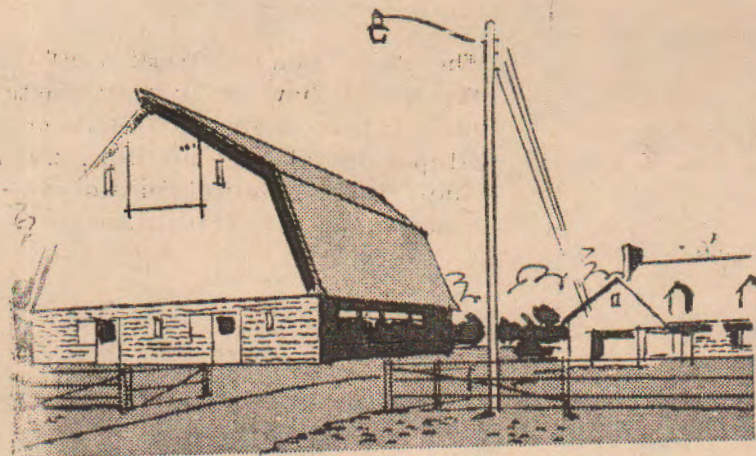

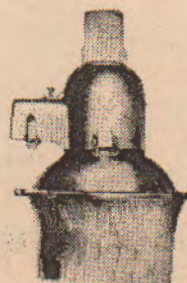

Prizes will be in the form of tickets to carnival games. First prize to be 10 tickets and second prizes to be 5 tickets.

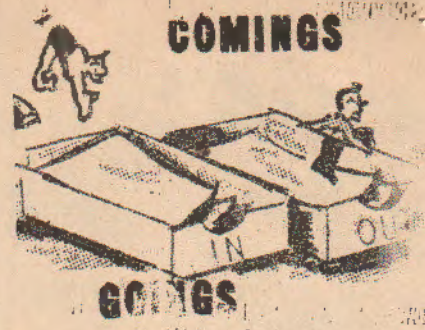
