AMBULANCE FUND DRIVE OVER TOP

MAN KILLED AT EAGLE RIVER

CHUGIAK: The drive to raise \$500 to purchase an ambulance for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company went over the top last week, after the dance held for that benefit by the Chugiak Teen Club.

The Club turned in approximately \$40, which plus an anonymous donation brought the total to \$515, slightly over the top.

Fire Chief Art Wallace, stated that contributions were still being accepted, as the vehicle needed certain maintenance to bring it into top operating order, and gas and oil to operate the ambulance will have to be purchased.

Donations may be sent to Wallace or to Captain Ted Brinck, of the Rescue Division at Loosehorn Garage.

EAGLE RIVER: Jack (the Barber) Salisbury, well known Anchorage barber died in the 5040th Hospital last Sunday following an accident on the Eagle River Road.

Salisbury had been visiting with Ed Doyle, an Eagle River Homesteader, and both men had been riding a rubber tired tractor about eight miles up the Eagle River road.

According to Doyle, Salisbury had grabbed for the wheel, causing the tractor to go out of control and roll over.

Doyle, although pinned under the tractor escaped with bruises and possible injured ribs.

Salisbury was thrown some distance from the tractor and was more severely injured.

FIRE CHIEF WARNS

LOCAL PROTEST CAUSES LOWERING OF SPEED LIMITS

CHUGIAK: Protests on the part of parents of school children in this community influenced the Division of Highways into reversing their stand and lowering the posted speed limits at the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools from 45mph to 25mph.

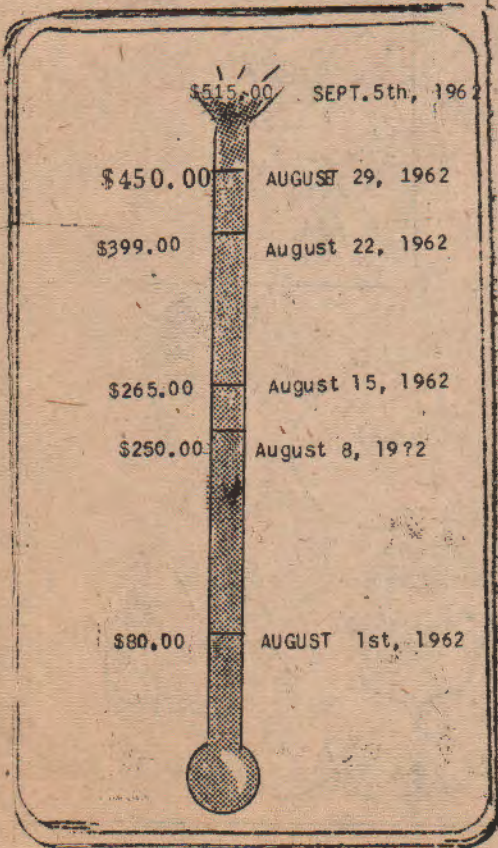
According to Roy Jenkins District Engineer for the Division of highways, the change was made due to the views expressed by members of the local PTA at a meeting which was attended by Mr. John Mills of the division of highways.

At this meeting last spring, little encouragement was given local parents that the Division of (cont page 9 col 1)

CHUGIAK: Art Wallace, Chief of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. warned of possible loss of equipment unless funds to maintain it were forthcoming from the residents of the community.

In a notice to the residents of Old Chugiak Fire Lake, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Eklutna, Wallace stated, "During a recent inspection and inventory of Civil Defense Fire Equipment at the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. by Don Lowell, state C.D. Director, it was found in dire need of essential fire fighting equipment and repairs were in order as well as money for fuel oil and power needed, for the winter fire season is very near.

It is felt that the people living in the area above mentioned who desire this fire and rescue protection should be responsible for helping the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, maintain these vehicles or, at least for providing the funds for the maintenance of the Fire apparatus, (cont page 3 col 1)

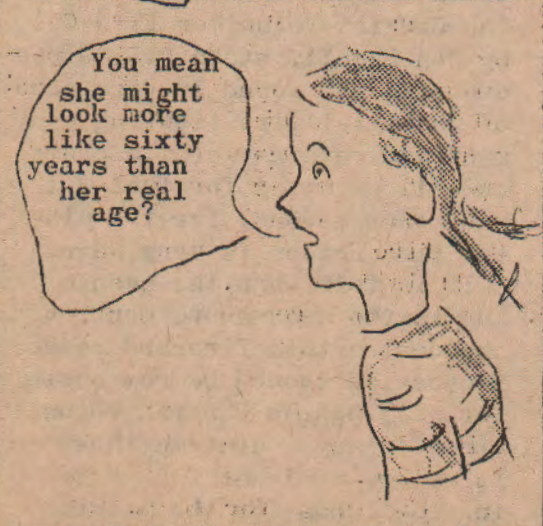
Wallace added, "It is a good idea to have a fire extinguisher handy in your home."

If you have trouble with a meat loaf being too dry, Madeline suggests you try this recipe. It is moist and tangy with barbecue sauce.

BARBECUE MEAT LOAF

- 3# ground beef (or game)
- 2 cups cracker crumbs
- Onion salt to taste
- 2 eggs
- 3 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper
- 2 large cans Hunts Tomato sauce
- 1 cup water
- 6 tbs vinegar
- 6 tbs brown sugar
- 4 tbs prepared mustard
- 4 tbs worcestershire sauce.

MIX first 3 ingredients listed

PLUS 1 cup of tomato sauce

COMBINE remaining ingredients

POUR over meat loaf

BAKE at 350° for 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 hrs.

* This recipe is doubled for a large family. For a smaller loaf, use only half of each ingredient listed.

While living near Seattle for three months, I had to ride the area buses. While riding these buses, I noticed we passed through several school zones. And I immediately noticed that there were speed limits of 20mph during the A.M. and P.M. pick up and returning times of the school children.

This law was in effect on every road and even the smaller highways where children waited for their buses. And it was strictly obeyed. If this law is available to the children of Washington, why can't our children have it?

I'm sure our children mean as much to us.

The next time we are driving through a residential area, why not take one minute and picture a small child running in front of your car.

Not a very pretty picture, is it? Our area from Eagle River Bridge to the Ekiutna Indian Village is well populated on both sides of the highway. Some children must cross the highway to catch their bus and some must cross it to return home. And the majority of all the children must wait beside this highway where the traffic goes whizzing by at 50mph. Most of us cannot watch our children at the bus stop because of the little tots at home.

I feel that our children are entitled to the same speed laws that other states have to protect their children. If we are to obtain these laws for our children, we will probably have to fight and fight hard. Perhaps if we all wrote to our state representative, congressmen and Governor Egan we just might get some results. But we won't know unless we try. I'm sure I'm not alone in this line of thinking, and why wait for more tragic accidents to occur.

I would also like to add that the children who must cross the highway to catch the bus should wait until the bus has stopped. THEN cross the highway. This is the only way to insure full stoppage of traffic. (next col.)

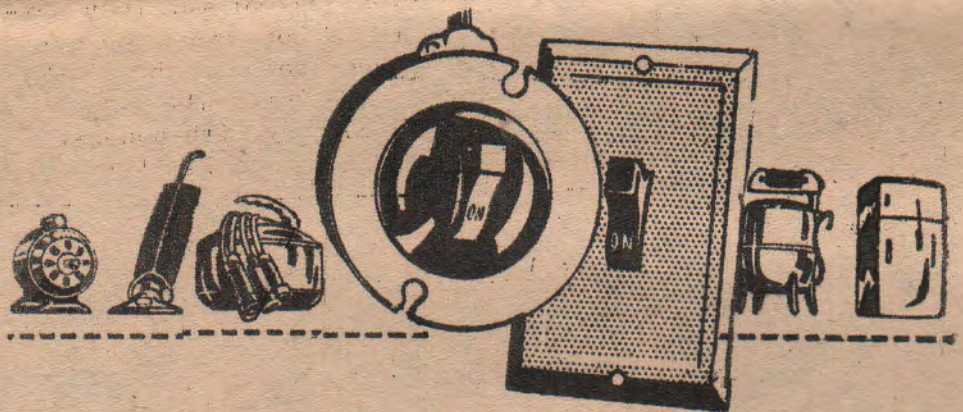

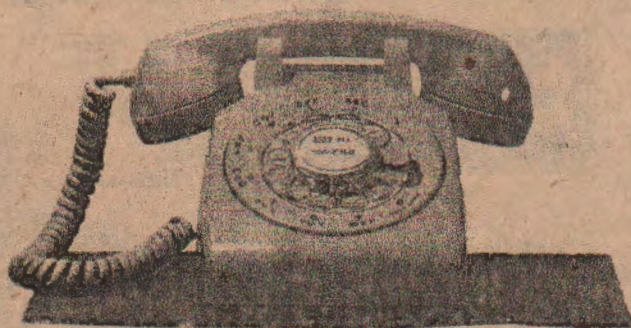
