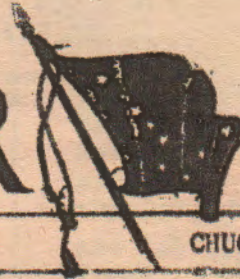

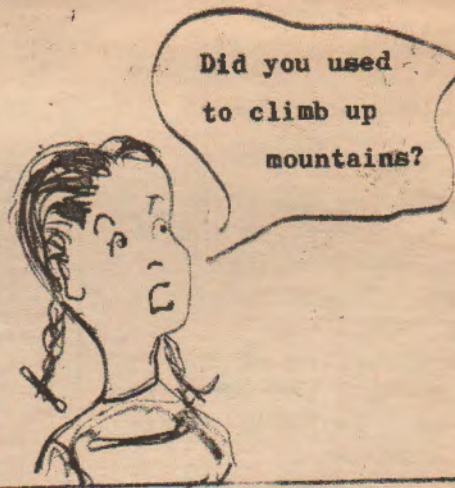
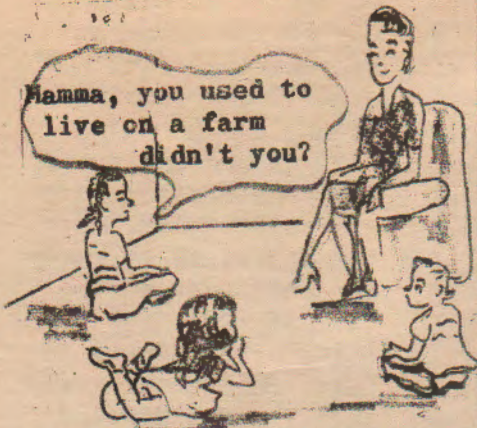

UTTERLY DEADLY PECAN PIE

- 4 eggs
- 1½ cups corn syrup (light)
- 1½ cups broken pecans
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 tbs. butter
- 1 tsp maple flavoring
- BOIL sugar and syrup for 3 minutes
- BEAT eggs, not too stiff
- POUR syrup slowly over eggs while heating
- ADD butter, pecans and maple flavoring
- POUR into unbaked pie crust
- BAKE at 45 minutes at 350°
- SERVE with whipped cream

MILK AND TRIM WAISTLINES

COLLEGE: Girls who are afraid to drink milk because they think it is fattening, don't have a scientific leg to stand on, according to Miss Agnes Sunnell, State Home Demonstration Leader with the Cooperative Extension Service, University of Alaska.

She points to a test at Iowa State University to back up the claim.

The survey showed that the girls with the trimmest figures had drunk the most milk.

Actual results from the Iowa study with 297 teenage girls showed that obesity occurred in almost twice the number of girls who drank little milk, compared with those who drank a quart or more daily.

Other survey results showed that, after age 12, one girl in five fell into the overweight category. Yet, only 16 percent of these girls were from the group that were large milk consumers.

Also, many of these overweight girls felt milk was fattening and most had generally poor diets.

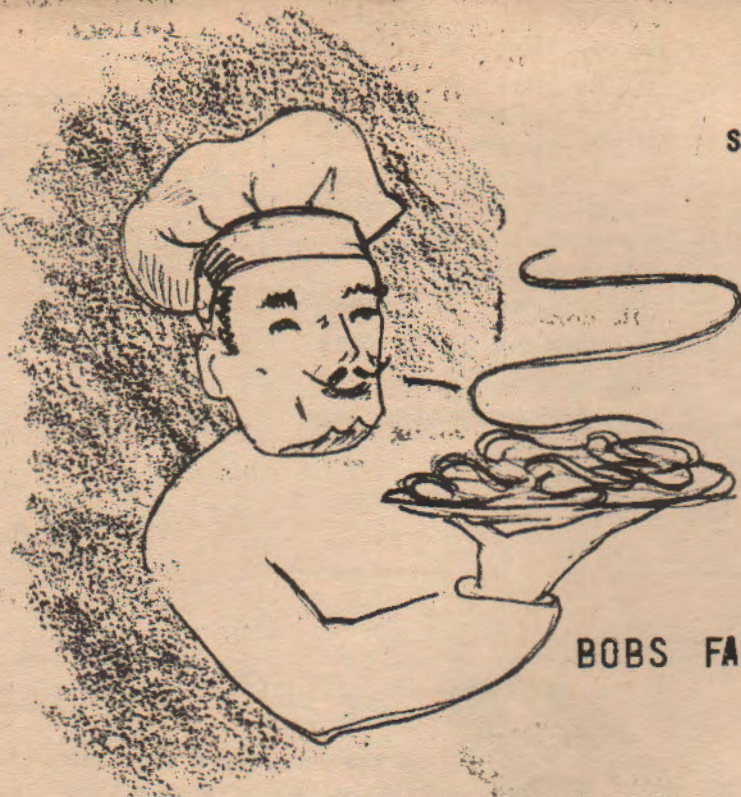

ANNOUNCED

JUNEAU: The Poetry Society of Alaska, Inc is sponsoring "World Poetry Day Contest", 1963 and invites all Alaskan poets to enter.

Rules for entering are as follows:

1. Any person who has written a poem is eligible to enter the contest.

2. There will be three classifications:

a. Narrative, not to exceed 100 lines, any form, Prize award \$25.

b. Sonnet, any of the forms, any serious subject, Prize \$25.

c. Free Verse or patterned free verse, 30 lines or less. Prize award \$25.

3. Entries must not have been previously published or accepted for publication. (next col.)

(Poetry contest)

4. Entries, which must be mailed to the Contest Committee, shall be post-marked no later than August 15, 1963.

5. Judging will be done by qualified judges, selected by the Society.

Winners will be announced on World Poetry Day, October 15, 1963. Each category will receive one prize of \$25.

6. To enter a poem in the contest, send an original and three copies to the Contest Committee Poetry Society of Alaska, Inc., Box 1106, Juneau Alaska.

Only one poem may be submitted in each category (One narrative, one sonnet, one free verse - not more than three in all). Do NOT write your name on the poem entered. Instead on a separate slip of paper, write your name plus the title and the first line of your entry. SEAL it in an envelope which is labeled only with the title and first line of your entry.
