This shop is operated by Jesse Cox and Dick Evans.


Purchases in all departments may be checked out through any of the four check stands, which are located in the protrusion which was built last summer.



The next meeting of the group will be held on October 23rd, at the home of Louise Balzen in Eagle River.


LADIES CLUB TO SELL VANILLA


All the cub scouts received their handbokks and will begin work on their badges at the next meeting.
