CLASSROOM REPORTS

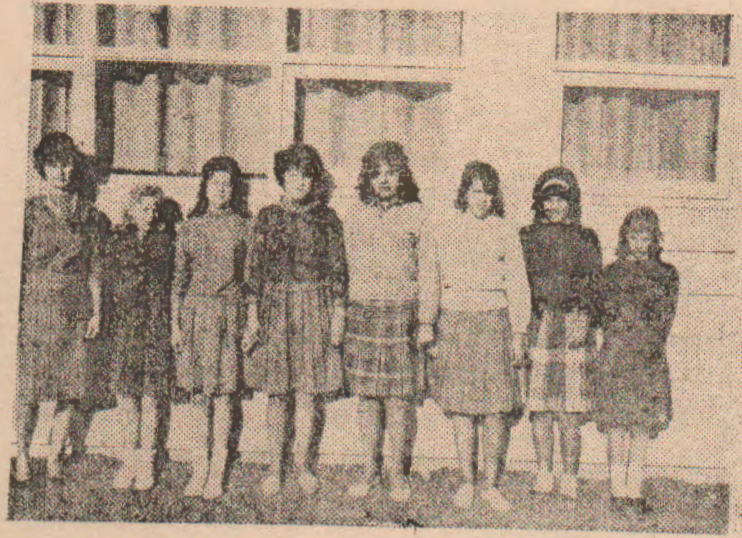

KITCHEN FIRE PUT OUT

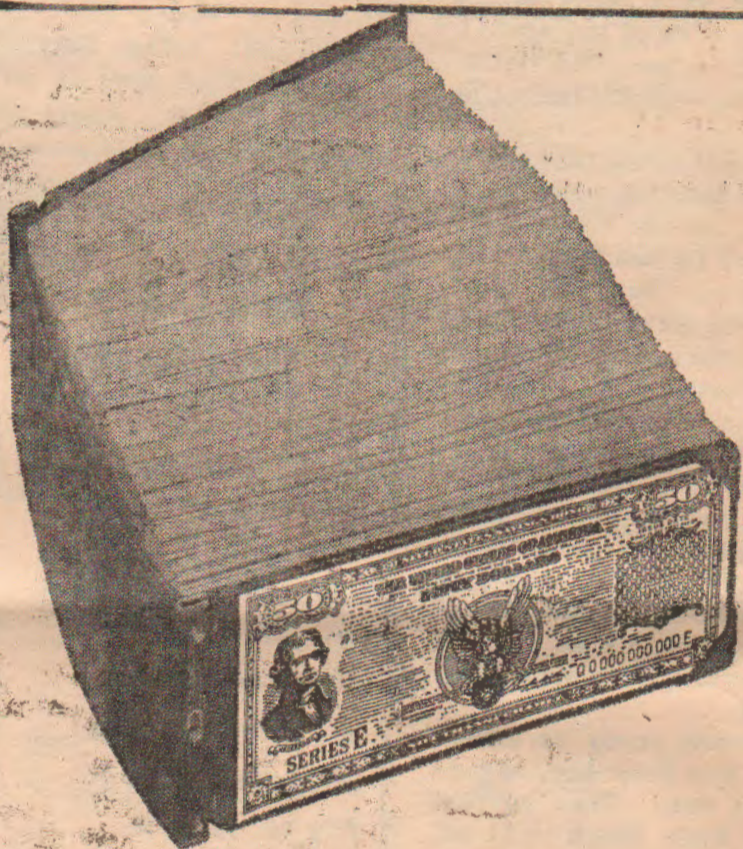

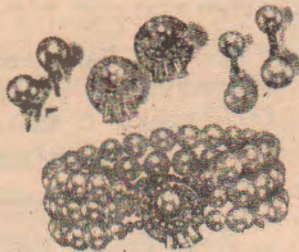

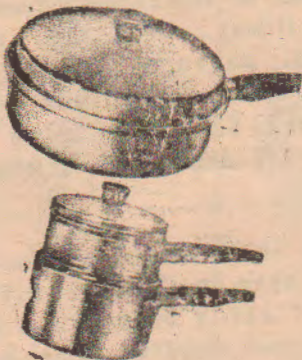
