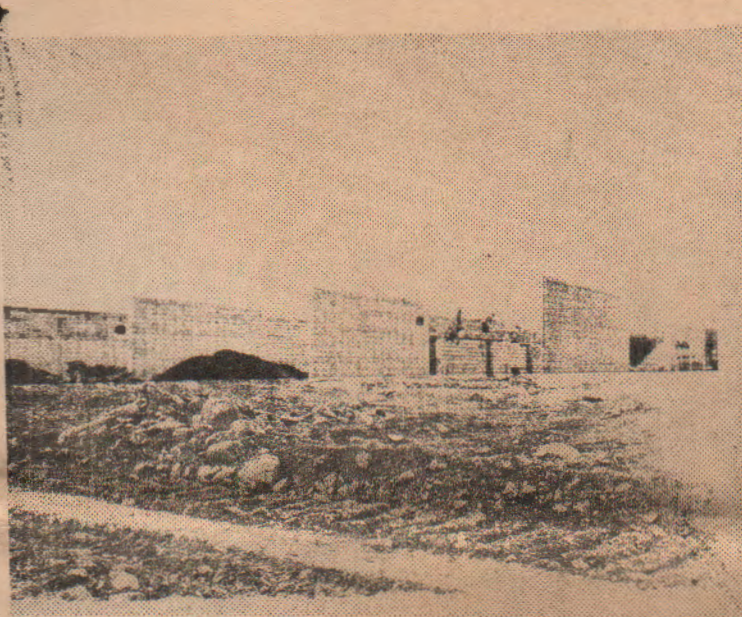

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Health Fund went well over the top as the drive closed last week.

Mrs. Bruce Robinson, President of the Chugiak Health Council, reported that the sum of \$568.03 has been raised locally.

This, along with the pledge from the Matanuska Electric Association to match any locally raised funds up to the amount of \$400, makes a total of \$968.03.

Of this, \$400 must be paid to the State Department of Health and Welfare, as this community's assessment for services of the Health Nurse and other items.

This leaves the amount of \$568.03 to be used in the operation of the local health clinic and for health programs at the schools.

Mrs. Robinson stated that the Health Council, plans to order two Snelling eye testers, one to be used at each of the local schools.

AN ERA CLOSES

WASHINGTON D.C.: Senator Bartlett, September 13, paid tribute in the Congressional Record to the men who carry the mail in Alaska.

Taking the occasion of the end of scheduled dog sled mail delivery in Alaska this summer--the last route was that of Chester Moongwook, who carried the mail from Savoonga to Gambell on St. Lawrence Island--Senator Bartlett

recounted the history of mail delivery in the 49th state.

"Delivering the mails is a large, complex and difficult task today," he said. "in years past it was all this, and more: it was dangerous and courageous."...."In the winter months, in the northern half of Alaska the principal method of carrying mail traditionally has been by dogsled.

Only in receny years has the sled been replaced by the airplane.

On June 13, of this year a melancholy ceremony in Fairbanks marked the end of mail delivery by dogsled. Trucks and planes now carry the mails in Alaska.

The Senator recalled tales and legends about man and dog against the Alaska winter. He told some of the stories which are familiar in Alaska households as tales of the Overland Express in the West. Among these was the thrilling recital of how diptheria serum was taken overland to Nome in 1925.

He recalled the words of tribute Senator Dill of Washington made in the Senate in 1925 with respect to the carrying of the serum who had said, "The classic victory of these dogs and men will probably be the last of its kind and is certainly a fitting finish to the

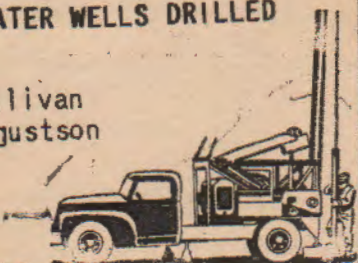

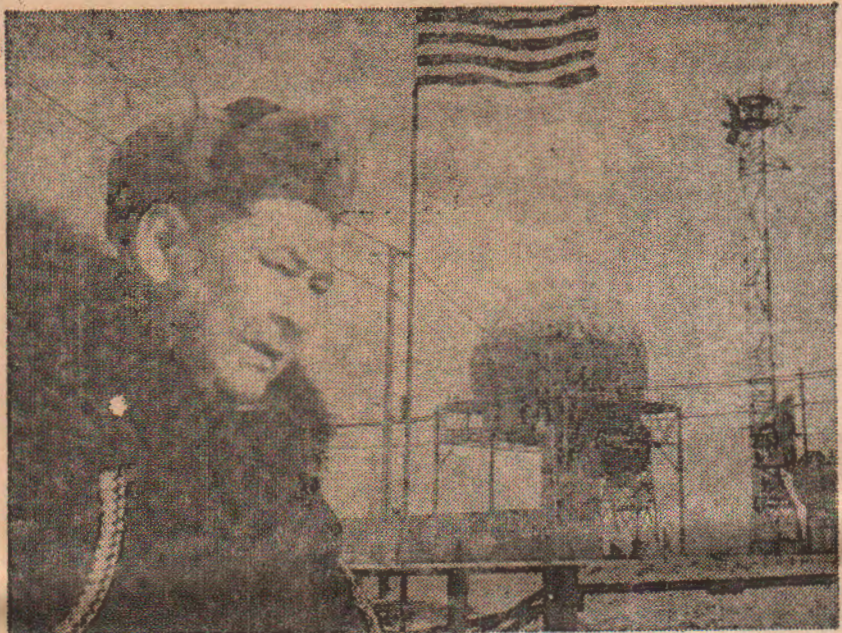

Trees blown against power lines, kept crews busy throughout the night, as arcing wires treated several local residents to an out of season fireworks display.

One tree blew down, across the Glenn Highway at mile 32, but was soon removed by a local State Trooper, who was fortunate enough to flag down a Wasilla homesteader named Frank Turk who just happened to have a chainsaw in the back of his pick-up truck.

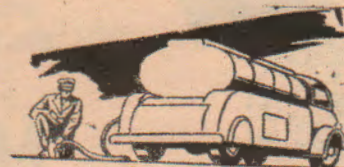

**WELL BEING DRILLED

A new well is needed at the Chugiak School because the one presently in use has proved inadequate and resulted in having to shut down the school on several occasions in past years due to an insufficient water supply.

**BIDS ASKED FOR KNIK-
MATANUSKA CROSSING**

JUNEAU: Advertising for construction of the Knik Matanuska Crossing, the biggest single construction project ever undertaken by the Alaska Department of Highways, will begin October 7, according to Anchorage District Highway Engineer Roy W. Jenkins.

Bids will be opened in Juneau November 7, he said.

This bid call culminates nearly one year of intense work on the part of the Bridge Design Section in Juneau, Jenkins said, and is expected to attract bids from some of the biggest construction companies in the world.

The project involves construction of 2.58 miles

of new roadway and four major bridges over the Knik and Matanuska Rivers.

Relocation of the Glenn Highway will begin approximately nine miles west of the Knik River Bridge and terminate near Matanuska. It will shorten the Present Anchorage-Palmer mileage by nearly eight miles, and will eliminate a slow and hazardous section of this route.

The condition of the present bridge over the Knik River, milepost 38 is considered substandard by the Department of Highways.

According to State Bridge Engineers, the old structure was not designed to carry the heavy loads now allowed on the highways and bridges of Alaska, and during its 27 year life has been damaged many times.

Following the last severe damage - it was hit by an overheight truck in 1962, - a crash program was initiated to build a replacement.

"It is one significant result of this crash program that we are realizing today," Jenkins said, "By being able to bring this major project to the advertising stage in such a short period of time."

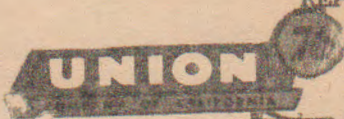
The project cost, including engineering, right-of-way and construction, is expected to exceed \$7 million.
