

The theme of the meeting, was "Architectural Barriers which had to do with making buildings accessable to the handicapped.



Investigation showed that the jeep contained a registration slip which had the name of George Tester of Birchwood.


Neoghbors of the Testers were questioned and it was learned that the whereabouts of the Testers was not know, except that they had moved from the community.




A report of the fund raising drive was given and future projects for the Council were discussed.
